HAFU? WHAT IS THAT?

At first glance you think he's full Japanese, with the pale skin, black hair and Asian eyes but look closely and you find that he's not. His skin is a little darker, his little comprehension of Japanese counteracts his fluency in English. People who are half-Japanese are called "Hafu". The term "Hafu" comes from the English word which means "Half" indicating the half foreignness. This name emerged from the 1970s in Japan, commonly used, and a preferred term of self-definition. Half-Japanese people would commonly introduce themselves saying "I'm Hafu (Hafu desu)". In modern Japan there is an ideal Hafu image:English fluency, western physical features such as tall and long legs, a small head/face and yet they look "Japanese enough" to fit within Japanese society. The Hafu name highlights the genetic makeup of half Japanese people with the emphasis of foreign blood in them.

Recently a documentary was released this year called "Hafu", and it covers unique Hafu experiences from five people, who are all determined to coexist with both mixed identities while living in Japan. The documentary is directed by Hafus themselves, Lara Perez Takagi (Spanish-Japanese) and Megumi Nishikura (Japanese-Irish American). The featured hafus consist of David (Ghana-Japan), Sophia (Australia-Japan), Edward (Venezuela-Japan), The Oi family (Mexico-Japan) and Fusae (Korea-Japan). Each, have their own personal story of what they experience as a hafu and the difficulties of being halfu while truly discovering themselves through a modernized and growing Japan. It provides narration and interviews by the hafus themselves, and explores different topics like race, diversity, multiculturalism, nationality, and identity within the mixed-race community of Japan.

And so what does it mean to be Hafu? For me personally I've been really thankful to learn about my ethnicity of Japanese-Filipino heritage. It was a shock to me, as I was raised and believed that I was completely Filipino and I definitely looked like it more than a Japanese person. Now, I fully accept and continue to explore my Japanese heritage as well as the language, culture and unique concept of being Hafu. People should watch this documentary because not only does this provide insight to what it's like being half/mixed in Japan, but also keeping in mind that this world is changing.

MISSING AND MURDERED Aboriginal Women

Often we hear of issues facing the world, facing other people and other countries. Often we feel like there is nothing that we can do because of the distance or magnitude of the issue. Well, here's one issue that can be faced and that we can do something about: missing and murdered Aboriginal women. Thousands of people across Canada have protested and have called for a national inquiry into the disappearances and the violence against hundreds of Aboriginal women. Stephen Harper refused to launch a national inquiry, stating that he believes "we should not view this as sociological phenomenon. We should view it as crime. It is crime, against innocent people, and it needs to be addressed as such." Statistics have suggested otherwise.

According to the RCMP, in 2011 there were 1.4 million people in Canada that identified as Aboriginal, approximately 4.3% of the population. Disproportionately, between 1980 and 2012 the homicide rate for Aboriginal women was four times higher (with 1017 homicides) than the homicide rates for other women in Canada. 120 homicide cases for Aboriginal women remain unsolved, and the RCMP admits that there may be more cases too, seeing as there are some victims of murder and violent crimes in which it was not recorded whether the victims were or were not Indigenous women. The Native Women's Association of Canada collected information on 582 cases of missing and murdered Aboriginal women, of which 67% are murder cases, 20% are disappearances, 9% are cases where it is unclear whether the women were victims of murder, domestic violence, or whether they are missing, and 4% are cases of "suspicious deaths" which are deaths that the family and community members label as suspicious despite the police regarding them as natural or accidental. The NWAC's research also points out that Aboriginal women and girls make up 3% of the female population and 10% of all female homicide cases in Canada.

There have been and continue to be cases of Aboriginal women (young women in particular) in Canada who have been victims of a violent crime, and there will be more if we as the public do not speak up. This is not something that is happening somewhere else. No, this is happening now, and it is happening in Canada, here in Winnipeg. Amnesty International, a human rights organization, states that the disappearances and murders of so many Aboriginal women are "human rights tragedies", and urge the public to take action and to write letters to the government. THE SECRET'S OUT!

The recipe for the famous "Cracker Crunch" sold at Kelvin bake sales

It's the holiday season, and that means baking, baking, and more baking! One of my favourite recipes to share this time of year is "cracker crunch." It's the strangest recipe (or at least it might seem like that - saltine crackers?! What?) but it's also the most delicious and SO easy to make. So go ahead -make it at home, and I promise you won't be disappointed!

Cracker Crunch

Ingredients:

- 1 cup butter
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 1/2 cups chocolate chips
- 40 saltine crackers (salted tops needed!)
- 1 cup Smarties/M&M's, crushed (put them in a plastic bag double bag it and use a glass measuring cup or meat pounder to break them up)

Directions:

- 1. Spray a baking sheet with non-stick cooking spray.
- 2. Lay crackers in a single layer on baking sheet.
- 3. In a double boiler on the stove, melt sugar and butter until it is foamy and toffee coloured.
- 4. Pour over crackers and spread to coat.
- 5. Bake for 10 minutes in 350°F oven.
- 6. Remove from oven and sprinkle with chocolate chips. They will melt from the heat. Spread the melted chocolate evenly over the baking sheet.
- 7. Sprinkle with Smarties/M&M's.
- 8. Refrigerate/freeze (I just put mine outside if it's cold enough) until hard and brittle.
- 9. Break into pieces and enjoy!
