#### Poetry Review: North End Love Songs

You may not be a fan of poetry, but as a Winnipegger you should be proud of the fact that Katherena Vermette's *North End Love Songs* is the recent winner of the Governor General's Award for Poetry, and the "North End" Vermette is referring to is Winnipeg's own.

I don't go to the North End very often, but I know that it has its problems, and maybe isn't the safest place to walk alone on a Friday night. Then again, if all you ever read is the paper, you'll likely only get to see one side (the negative one) of a complex story.

The North End is made up of people, just like any other neighbourhood, and sometimes it's easy to forget that and just simplify the place into that broad term of "The North End." Vermette's poems smash that generalization. Each one focuses on a person, unnamed, living life, running, laughing, making mistakes – living. In part 1, Vermette sees these people (most are women) as birds, and names each poem after a different species. The metaphor is interesting, as Vermette may be suggesting that the women all possess the power to fly away, yet don't.

The poems are beautiful in their composition. Each has a rhythm that seems to match the topic, and the line breaks are such that they create a sense of suspense, culminating in a final phrase which – more often than not – is breathtaking, both because it is surprising, and because it is amazing how much Vermette can imply with so few words. One gets the feeling while reading that each word has been carefully selected, loaded with intention, and placed in the poem. It is up to the reader to interpret and decide the true meaning of the piece as a whole.

North End Love Songs paints a different picture of the North End: one of beauty hidden in its inhabitants, in the rhythm of daily life. There is no glamorization of the neighbourhood: just a direct discussion on how life really is – through the eyes of Vermette, of course. Poetry lovers will enjoy the compilation, and those who fear the sight of stanzas and rhyme schemes may just change their mind after experiencing how something that is known to all Winnipeggers can be made into a series of illuminated, loving words.

### INTO THE MUSIC

In the spirit of the recent film awards season which started with the New York Film Critics Circle Awards, which took place on December 3rd, and ending with the Academy Awards which will take place on March 2nd, this article will be dedicated to ten of the most iconic uses on music in film and best songs from movie soundtracks. In no particular order:

- 1. Don't You (Forget About Me) by Simple Minds from "The Breakfast Club": This song which plays during the opening and closing credits from John Hughes's critically acclaimed masterpiece would go on to become one of the most iconic song of the eighties. "Don't You (Forget About Me)" epitomizes everything about the movie in one song and is a perfect example of exactly how effective the right song at the right time in a movie can be.
- 2. Skyfall by Adele from "Skyfall": A relatively recent one, but still a good one. Adele's "Skyfall" joined such classics as Paul McCartney's "Live & Let Die" and Shirley Bassev's "Goldfinger" as some of the best songs from James Bond films. It's a classy, seductive, dramatic, orchestral pop piece that instantly

screams "Bond" and won Adele an Academy Award for Best Original Song.

3. Where is My Mind by Pixies from "Fight Club": David Fincher's 1996 movie "Fight Club" starring Edward Norton, Brad Pitt and Helena Bonham Carter would go on to be a massive cult classic and

features this song by the Pixies during the film's shocking final scene. The song would go on to be used in more films like "Mr. Nobody" and "Suckerpunch".

- 4. My Heart Will Go On by Celine Dion from "Titanic": It may become extremely annoying very fast, but there's no doubt that Celine Dion's signature song from James Cameron's "Titantic" soundtrack is one of the most iconic songs from the movies. The song, which plays during the end credits of the film, went on to become Celine Dion's biggest hit as well as to win her multiple Grammys, including Song of the Year and Record of the Year.
- 5. Girl, You'll Be a Woman Soon by Urge Overkill from "Pulp Fiction": Quentin Tarantino is undoubtedly the master of the movie soundtrack, using a wide variety of music to suit the voice and style of his stories, so it's hard to pick just one song from his movies. Although it was hard to choose between Urge Overkill's cover of Neil Diamond's "Girl, You'll Be a Woman Soon" used in "Pulp Fiction" and

6. I Will Always Love You by Whitney Houston from "The Bodyguard": "I Will Always Love You" was originally written and recorded by country singer Dolly Parton in 1973, but her rendition does not compare to that of late singer Whitney Houston who recorded an intensely emotional version of it for the 1992 film

- "The Bodyguard." The song would go on to become her signature piece of music.
- 7. Take My Breath Away by Berlin from "Top Gun": The soundtrack of the 1986 action film "Top Gun" starring Tom Cruise and Kelly McGillis went on to become one of the most successful movie soundtracks of all time, selling over 9,000,000 copies in the US, and is led by this love song by Berlin.
- 8. Bohemian Rhapsody by Queen from "Wayne's World": Although Queen's "Bohemian Rhapsody" would be well-known even without it's appearance in the 1992 comedy "Wayne's World," starring Mike Myers and Dana Carvey, the scene in which it appears has gone on to be one of the most iconic music moments in movies and is without a doubt the standout scene.
- 9. Unchained Melody by The Righteous Brothers from "Ghost": This 1990 romantic fantasy-thriller is probably most well known for the scene in which Demi Moore sculpts a vase with help from the ghost of her dead lover played by Patrick Swayze while this haunting song by the Righteous Brothers from 1965 plays in the background.
- 10. Falling Slowly by Glen Hansard and Markéta Irglová from "Once": "Once", the 2007 Irish musical would go on to be one of the most surprisingly successful films of the year, was met with critical acclaim, and featured the song "Falling Slowly" which won an Academy Award for Best Original Song. The emotional song is so moving that it led even Bob Dylan to request Glen Hansard and Markéta Irglová as an opening act on his World Tour.









