98 - Sistema Concert

Trustee Collins informed trustees that she attend the Sistema Winnipeg Holiday Concert on November 28th, at the Shaw Performing Arts Centre. Approximately 40 students from King Edward School performed with their stringed instruments and it was very impressive performance. These students began their training in the fall and it was amazing to hear them perform such beautiful music. The students received their instruction under conductor Dan Scholz. Sistema Winnipeg is a free, daily after-school program that inspires children to strive to meet her/his potential. Children learn how to play an instrument and experience the joy of being part of an orchestra. The evening also included some wonderful singing by the students. Congratulations to the students and to the organizers on hosting a wonderful holiday concert.

1. <u>Mobile Emergency Boiler Systems</u>

At a meeting held November 18, 2013, trustees received a report advising that The Public Schools Finance Board and the Division have been exploring the possibility of constructing two mobile emergency boiler systems that could be used to provide a source of heat for schools in emergency situations. Each unit would consist of an enclosed trailer and self-contained boiler system that would be connected to a propane or natural gas energy supply. The two mobile units would be available for use by any public school in the Province and be stored in the Winnipeg School Division compound located at Wall St and Wellington Ave.

The Public Schools Finance Board will reimburse the Division for all costs associated with the operation and maintenance of the mobile boiler units.

In correspondence received November 6, 2013, the Public Schools Finance Board confirmed approval to proceed with the design and tendering of the mobile boiler systems.

Tenders were advertised for the project. The following is a tabulation of the bids received:

Recommendation:

That subject to the approval of the Public Schools Finance Board, the tender of Ambassador Mechanical Corp. to supply all material and perform all work in connection with the Mobile Emergency Boiler Systems project be accepted, in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor, for the total amount of \$324,943.49, being the tender price, including Provincial Sales Tax excluding Goods & Services Tax, and that the proper officers of the Division be authorized to enter into a contract with Ambassador Mechanical Corp. for the carrying out of the work.

2. Meadows West School – Roof Replacement Consultant Appointment

In a letter dated February 6, 2013 the Division received authority from the Public Schools Finance Board to proceed with hiring a consultant for the roof replacement project at Meadows West School.

Three architectural consultant firms were invited to submit proposals for the project. Two proposals were received. Public Schools Finance Board has reviewed the proposals submitted.

It is recommended that the firm of MCM Architects Inc. be appointed as consultant for the roof replacement at Meadows West School.

Recommendation:

That subject to the approval of the Public Schools Finance Board, the proper officers of the Division be authorized to enter into a contract with MCM Architects Inc. to provide consultant services for the roof replacement project at Meadows West School in accordance with the Public Schools Finance Board fee schedule.

3. Recognition for Special Accomplishments

The Human Rights and Holocaust Studies Program is held annually in Washington, D.C. This year the program will be from April 27 to April 30, 2014, May 4 to May 7, 2014 and May 11 to May 14, 2014. Students from various schools have benefited from their participation in this program. The Asper Foundation determines the cost per student (travel, accommodations and educational classes) to attend the program. The Asper Foundation charges a lower cost to schools they have identified as having the greatest needs based on their own criteria. Participation in this program is a school-based decision and is voluntary.

a) Twelve grade 9 Sargent Park School students and two chaperones have been identified to participate in the Human Rights and Holocaust Studies Program.

It is recommended that in accordance with Board Policy AGAB - Recognition for Special Accomplishments, each student receive funding in the amount of \$400 (total \$4,800) to support their attendance at the event from April 27 to April 30, 2014 and that funding for substitute costs for two teachers for up to three days (total 6 days) be approved.

b) Twelve grade 9 Tec Voc High School students and two chaperones have been identified to participate in the Human Rights and Holocaust Studies Program.

It is recommended that in accordance with Board Policy AGAB - Recognition for Special Accomplishments, each student receive funding in the amount of \$400 (total \$4,800) to support their attendance at the event from April 27 to April 30, 2014 and that funding for substitute costs for two teachers for up to three days (total 6 days) be approved.

- c) Twenty grade 9 Cecil Rhodes School students and four chaperones have been identified to participate in the Human Rights and Holocaust Studies Program.
 - It is recommended that in accordance with Board Policy AGAB Recognition for Special Accomplishments, each student receive funding in the amount of \$375 (total \$7,500) to support their attendance at the event from April 27 to April 30, 2014 and that funding for substitute costs for four teachers for up to three days (total 12 days) be approved.
- d) Ten grade 9 Elmwood High School students and two chaperones have been identified to participate in the Human Rights and Holocaust Studies Program.
 - It is recommended that in accordance with Board Policy AGAB Recognition for Special Accomplishments, each student receive funding in the amount of \$400 (total \$4,000) to support their attendance at the event from May 11 to May 14, 2014 and that funding for substitute costs for two teachers for up to three days (total 6 days) be approved.
- e) Fifteen grade 9 Isaac Newton School students and three chaperones have been identified to participate in the Human Rights and Holocaust Studies Program.
 - It is recommended that in accordance with Board Policy AGAB-Recognition for Special Accomplishments, each student receive funding in the amount of \$400 (total \$6,000) to support their attendance at the event from May 12 to May 14, 2014, and that funding for substitute costs for two teacher for up to three days (total 6 days) be approved.
- f) Ten students from École secondaire Kelvin High School and one chaperone have been identified to participate in the Human Rights and Holocaust Studies Program.
 - It is recommended that in accordance with Board Policy AGAB Recognition for Special Accomplishment, each student receive funding in the amount of \$400 (total \$4,000) to support their attendance at the event from April 27 to April 30, 2014 and that funding be approved for substitute costs for one teacher for up to three days (total 3 days) be approved.
- g) Approximately 55 Inner City students from five schools, General Wolfe, Gordon Bell, Hugh John Macdonald, R.B. Russell and Children of the Earth High School have been invited by the Asper Foundation to participate in the Human Rights and Holocaust Studies Program. The only required funding is for ten staff members to chaperone the students on the trip from May 4 to May 7, 2014.
 - It is recommended that in accordance with Board Policy AGAB Recognition for Special Accomplishment, that funding for substitute costs for 10 staff members for three days each (total 30 days) be approved to support their attendance at the event.

Recommendations:

That in accordance with Policy AGAB – Recognition for Special Accomplishment authority be given for:

- e) Fifteen students from Isaac Newton School to each receive funding in the amount of \$400 (total \$6,000) to support their attendance in the Human Rights and Holocaust Studies Program in Washington, DC from May 12 to May 14, 2014 and that funding for substitute costs for two teachers for up to three days (total 6 days) be approved.
- f) Ten students from École secondaire Kelvin High School to each receive funding in the amount of \$400 (Total \$4,000) to support their attendance in the Human Rights and Holocaust Studies Program in Washington DC from April 27 to April 30, 2014 and that funding for substitute costs for one teacher for up to three days (total 3 day) be approved.

PENSION COMMITTEE REPORT NO. 6-2013

Your Pension Committee reports and recommends as follows:

1. Cost of Living Adjustment

Your Committee has given consideration to a report from the Actuary dated November 2013 regarding the increase to pensions to provide a cost of living adjustment. The adjustment would be paid from the supplementary pension account which is a sub account of the Pension Fund, established for this purpose. Your Committee discussed the balance in the Supplementary Pension Account and the importance of taking the necessary steps to sustain the Account and provide pensioners with an increase to offset increased costs.

Recommendation:

That a cost of living increase of .38% of the basic pension be approved effective January 1, 2014 for those pensioners whose pensions commenced on or prior to June 30, 2012, such increase to be applicable to all categories of pensioners, including beneficiaries of former employees entitled to a pension, and deferred pensioners.

At a meeting held November 18, 2013, the Board of Trustees adopted a motion to receive First Reading of Bylaw 1219 advising that effective with the next regular election of trustees for The Winnipeg School Division, the existing boundaries of Wards 1, 2, and 3 of the said Division be altered to a 9 Ward Boundary system.

Your Committee discussed two options with slight variations of the boundaries for consideration prior to second reading of By-law 1219. In accordance with The Public Schools Act – Section 57 states that in fixing the boundaries of any ward there may be a variation in the population requirement of any ward where, in its opinion, those considerations or any of them render a variation desirable but in no case may the representation quotient of any ward in the school division or school district as a result thereof vary from the quotient obtained under subsection (3) to an extent that is greater than 25% or to an extent that is less than 25% of the quotient.

Attached are maps outlining the revised boundaries which meet the requirements of The Public Schools Act.

Your Committee agreed to revise the boundaries for Wards 1 through 9.

Recommendation:

That the Ward Boundaries for Wards 1 through 9 be amended for the purpose of the second reading of By-Law 1219 as follows:

Ward 1:

From South Division boundary (Wilkes Ave), north on extension of Morpeth Blvd, north along Morpeth Blvd, continue north along Edgeland Blvd to Assiniboine River, east along Assiniboine River to Kenaston Blvd, south along Kenaston Blvd to Corydon Ave, east along Corydon Ave to Cambridge St, north along Cambridge St to Dorchester Ave, east along Dorchester Ave to Stafford St, south along Stafford St to Pembina Hwy, south along Pembina Hwy to South Division boundary (south side of Parker Ave), west along extension of Parker Ave (south side) to Heatherdale Ave, west along north side of Parker Ave to Hurst Way, south along Hurst Way to south side of Parker Ave, continue west along extension of Parker Ave to Waverley St, north along Waverley St to Wilkes Ave, west along Wilkes Ave to extension of Morpeth Blvd (Division boundary).

Ward 2:

From South Division boundary (south side of Jubilee Ave), north along Pembina Hwy to Stafford St, east along extension of Stafford St to CNR Mainline, north east along CNR Mainline to Osborne St, north along Osborne St to McMillan Ave, south along Pembina Hwy to Corydon Ave, west along Corydon Ave to Nassau St N, north along Nassau St N (both sides) to McMillan Ave, east along McMillan Ave to Osborne St, north along Osborne St (both sides) to Gertrude Ave, west along Gertrude Ave to Daly St N, north along Daly St N to Wardlaw Ave, west along Wardlaw Ave to Wellington Cr, south along Wellington Cr, west between properties 231 and 237 on Wellington Cr (property border) to Assiniboine River, north along Assiniboine River to Red River, south along Red River to South Division boundary (south of Jubilee Ave), west along south side of Jubilee Ave to Pembina Hwy.

Ward 3:

From Corydon Ave, north along Kenaston Blvd to Assiniboine River, east along Assiniboine River to the property border between 231 and 237 Wellington Cr, east between 231 and 237 Wellington Cr, north on Wellington Cr to Wardlaw Ave, east on Wardlaw Ave to Daly St N, south along Daly St N to Gertrude Ave, east along Gertrude Ave to Osborne St, south on Osborne St but not including properties on Osborne St to McMillan Ave, west along McMillan Ave to Nassau St N, south on Nassau St N but not including properties on Nassau St N to Corydon Ave, east along Corydon Ave to Pembina Hwy, north along Pembina Hwy to Osborne St, south along Osborne St to CNR Mainline, south west along CNR Mainline to extension of Stafford St, west along extension of Stafford St to Pembina Hwy, north along Stafford St to Dorchester Ave, west along Dorchester Ave to Cambridge St, south along Cambridge St to Corydon Ave, west along Corydon Ave to Kenaston Blvd.

Ward 4:

From Assiniboine River, north along extension of St. James St to Portage Ave, east along Portage Ave to Spence St, south along Spence St to St. Mary Ave, east along St. Mary Ave to Memorial Blvd, north along Memorial Blvd to Portage Ave, east along Portage Ave to Fort St, south along Fort St to Graham Ave, east along Graham Ave to Main St, north along Main St to William Stephenson Way, east along William Stephenson Way to CNR Rivers, north along CNR Rivers to Red River, south along Red River to Assiniboine River, west along Assiniboine River to extension of St. James St.

Ward 5:

From Portage Ave, north along CPR La Riviere to Wellington Ave, east along Wellington Ave to Ashburn St, south along Ashburn St to Sargent Ave, east along Sargent Ave to Erin St, north along Erin St to Wellington Ave, east along Wellington Ave to Wall St, south along Wall St to Sargent Ave, east along Sargent Ave to Young St, north along Young St to Notre Dame Ave, east along Notre Dame Ave to Balmoral St, south along Balmoral St to Cumberland Ave, east along Cumberland Ave to Kennedy St, continue east along Cumberland St (including properties on both sides of street) to Hargrave St, north along Hargrave St to Notre Dame Ave, east along Notre Dame Ave to Fort St, south along Fort St to Portage Ave, west along Portage Ave to Colony St/Memorial Blvd, south along Memorial Blvd to St. Mary Ave, west along St. Mary Ave to Spence St, north along Spence St to Portage Ave, west along Portage Ave to CPR La Riviere

Ward 6:

From Portage Ave, north along St. James St to Notre Dame Ave, east along Notre Dame Ave to Keewatin St, north along Keewatin St to CPR Carberry, south east along CPR Carberry to Red River, south along Red River to CNR Rivers, south west along CNR Rivers to William Stephenson Way, west along William Stephenson Way to Main St, south along Main St to Graham Ave, west along Graham Ave to Fort St, north along Fort St to Notre Dame Ave, west along Notre Dame Ave to Hargrave St, south along Hargrave St to Cumberland Ave, west on Cumberland Ave but not including properties on Cumberland Ave to Kennedy St, continue west on Cumberland Ave (including north side properties) to Balmoral St, north along Balmoral St to Notre Dame Ave, west along Notre Dame Ave to Young St, south along Young St to Sargent Ave, west along Sargent Ave to Wall St, north along Wall St to Wellington Ave, west along Wellington Ave to Erin St, south along Erin St to Sargent Ave, west along Sargent Ave to Ashburn St, north along Ashburn St to Wellington Ave, west along Wellington Ave, west along CPR La Riviere to Portage Ave, west along Portage Ave to St. James St

Ward 7:

From CPR Carberry, north along Main St to North Division boundary (north side of McAdam Ave), east along North Division boundary to Red River, south along Red River to Elmwood Park, east along North boundary of Elmwood Park to Henderson Hwy, south along Henderson Hwy to Harbison Ave W, east along Harbison Ave W (both sides) and Harbison Ave E (both sides) (Division boundary), continue east along extension of north side of Harbison Ave E to Panet Rd, south along Panet Rd to Division boundary (south of Thomas Ave extension), west along Division boundary (south of Thomas Ave) to Archibald St, north along Archibald St to CPR Carberry, west along CPR Carberry to Main St.

Ward 8:

From CPR Carberry, north along McPhillips St to Pritchard Ave, east along Pritchard Ave to Sgt Tommy Prince St, continue east on Pritchard Ave (including properties on both sides of Pritchard Ave) to Battery St, north along Battery St to Alfred Ave, west along Alfred Ave to Sgt Tommy Prince St, north along Sgt Tommy Prince St to Aberdeen Ave, west along Aberdeen Ave to Radford St, north along Radford St to College Ave, east along College Ave to Radford St, north along Radford St to Mountain Ave, west along Mountain Ave to Radford St, north along Radford St to Machray Ave, east along Machray Ave to Radford St, north along Radford St to Atlantic Ave, continue north along extension of Wiginton St (crossing between properties 1019 and 1023 on Atlantic Ave), continue north along Wiginton St to Carruthers Ave, east along Carruthers Ave to McGregor St, north along McGregor St to McAdam Ave, east along McAdam Ave (both sides) to Main St, south along Main St to CPR Carberry, west along CPR Carberry to McPhillips St

Ward 9:

From CPR Carberry, north along Keewatin St to Selkirk Ave, west along Selkirk Ave, continue west along extension of Selkirk Ave to CPR Carberry, north west along CPR Carberry to Brookside Blvd (West Division boundary), continue north along Brookside Blvd to Mollard Rd, east along Mollard Rd to Ritchie St, south along Ritchie St (Division boundary) to Templeton Ave, south west along Division boundary to CPR Arborg, south along CPR Arborg to Division boundary, east along North Division boundary (extension of Carruthers Ave) to Wiginton St, south along Wiginton St, continue south along extension of Wiginton St to Atlantic Ave (crossing between properties 1019 and 1023 on Atlantic Ave), continue south along Radford St to Machray Ave, west along Machray Ave to Radford St, south along Radford St to Mountain Ave, east along Mountain Ave to Radford St, south along Radford St to College Ave, west along College Ave to Radford St, south along Radford St to Aberdeen Ave, east along Aberdeen Ave to Sgt Tommy Prince St, south along Battery St to Pritchard Ave, west along Pritchard Ave (but not including properties on Pritchard Ave) to Sgt Tommy Prince St, continue west along Pritchard Ave to McPhillips St, south along McPhillips St to CPR Carbery, west along CPR Carberry to Keewatin St
