Churchill High School is nestled in the leafy neighbourhood of Riverview in south Winnipeg. We provide comprehensive programming for our 470 grade 7 – 12 students in a caring, secure learning environment which maximizes the aspirations, achievements and abilities of all students.

As a UNESCO designated school, we foster a strong sense of community and this is evident in the many programs and extra-curricular initiatives that are available to our students. We have exceptional visual and performing arts

programs and athletic programs. We also provide an apprenticeship program, student leadership courses and numerous Education for Sustainable Development opportunities.

Our school motto is "Pride and Tradition" and we are certainly proud of our little school that can.





## **Priorities for 2015-16**

Strengthen instructional and assessment strategies for all students using all available resources including the integration of technology.
