Syd's Apple Spice Muffins!

Ingredients

½ cup butter or margarine

½ cup brown sugar

½ cup white sugar

½ teaspoon vanilla

1 egg

1 cup applesauce (unsweetened)

1 tablespoon cinnamon

1 teaspoon allspice

½ teaspoon nutmeg

½ tsp. salt

2 tsp. baking powder

1 and 1/3 cups flour



Directions

Preheat oven to 350F. Line cupcake pan with paper muffin cups. Beat the butter and both sugars together until smooth. Beat in the egg, then stir in the vanilla and applesauce. Set mixture aside.

In a separate bowl, combine the cinnamon, allspice, nutmeg, flour, salt, and baking powder. Pour into the other mixture and stir until blended. Fill into the muffin cups, about 2/3 full. (makes approximately 12 muffins). Bake for 12- 20 minutes, or just until a toothpick inserted in the centre comes out clean. To garnish, sprinkle with cinnamon and brown sugar. Serve warm or cool. Music of Summer 2013:

From Macklemore to Ellie Goulding, there was plenty of new music to listen to this past summer. Miley Cyrus and Robin Thicke had the two most talked about songs of the summer with "We Can't Stop" and "Blurred Lines" respectively, Katy Perry and Lady Gaga both released comeback singles within a week of each other, and New Zealand artist Lorde emerged with the breakout song of the summer.

Sixteen year old singersongwriter Ella Yelich-O'Connor (better known as Lorde) wrote the song "Royals" in her room over the course of 30 minutes which resulted in one of the most critically acclaimed songs of the summer. Lyrically, "Royals" deals with frustration over the overly glamorous lifestyles of celebrities and the overly pretentious lyrics of popular songs ("But every song's like gold teeth, grey goose, trippin' in the bathroom / Blood stains, ball gowns, trashin' the hotel room / We don't care, we're driving Cadillacs in our dreams"). "Royals" has been a massive commercial and critical success and Lorde's debut album "Pure Heroine" was released on September 30th.

Another new song that made waves in the summer of 2013 was Montreal based band Arcade Fire's comeback single "Reflektor". Arcade Fire's last full length album was "The Suburbs" back in 2010 with earned them a Grammy for Album of the Year. After a

3 year hiatus, they returned in early September with the disco-infused, seven-and-a-half minute long song

> "Reflektor" which features guest vocals from rock legend David Bowie. The song acts as the lead single and title track for their highlyanticipated new album which will be coming out on October 28th.

Last but not least, "Blurred Lines", the somewhat-controversial Robin Thicke song which seemed to get played pretty much nonstop on the radio all summer. Robin Thicke, son of Canadian actor Alan Thicke, released "Blurred Lines" in late-March and the song quickly became

the biggest hit of his career. The song attracted minor controversy for the "rapey" and "misogynistic" lyrics as while as the racy music video, however this didn't stop the song ROBIN THICKE from topping the charts basically all summer. Robin Thicke brushed off criticism as he is happily married with children.

Beetlejuice (1988)



Beetlejuice, tells the story of Adam (Alec Baldwin) and Barbara Maitland (Geena Davis) who die suddenly in a car crash. When they come back to their old house (as ghosts) they're shocked to find that the Deetz family is planning to buy it. So they use their new-found ghostly powers to scare and haunt the family but all fails, and the teenage goth daughter, Lydia Deetz (Winona Ryder), can see and talk to the Maitlands. When all of their plans, traps and schemes fail, the Maitlands decide to call upon the infamous, "bio-exorcist," Beetlejuice (Michael Keaton) to get rid of the Deetzes for good.

Personally, what I love about this movie is that the scary parts are in what you see as opposed to what you hear. Most horror movies of today are basically 15 minutes of pitch dark silence with a 100 decibel scream that scares you out of your seat or 90 minutes of gore; *Beetlejuice* is the opposite of that. Although it was made in the eighties, this movie captures a different spirit. There's plenty of frightening monsters but there's also a level of comedy. Beetlejuice comes off more as a jokester at the start of the film, but as his demeanor changes for the frightening so does the movie; towards the end, there's more of an emphasis on dark humour. All in all, I'd have to say that if you're looking for a movie that will scare *and* make you laugh then *Beetlejuice* is the right movie for you.

The Silence of the Lambs (1991)



Based on the novel by

Thomas Harris, *The Silence of the Lambs*, is a thriller about F.B.I. trainee, Clarice Starling (Jodie Foster) who is given the job of interviewing former psychiatrist turned cannibal/serial killer Hannibal Lecter (Anthony Hopkins) to get help in searching for a recent serial killer named, "Buffalo Bill," who skins his victims' bodies.

This movie is horrific in its reality. The scariest part is knowing that the F.B.I has to go through several of these cases, as well as solve them. Anthony Hopkins is terrifying in his role as Hannibal Lecter: he's charming with a sense of manipulation, and he gets a look in his eye that disarms you and sends you reeling back. Jodie Foster is perfect as Clarice Starling: she's brave and courageous, while still portraying Clarice with a sense of detachment, knowing that getting too attached will break her emotionally. Both Foster and Hopkins won Academy Awards for their roles in this film and they were definitely well-deserved.

A penultimate scene in a church is where the final battle takes place between Charley, Peter and Jerry ending someone's life forever and bringing back someone else thought to be dead.

Rocky Horror Picture Show (1975)



Thor: The Dark World



and Thor's friends as they defeat an enemy older than time.


Carrie





Tuesdays with Morrie is a philosophical/biographical memoir written by Mitch Albom about his old college professor, Morrie Schwartz. The novel was published in 1997 and is still widely read to this day.

Morrie Schwartz was born in 1916 to working class Russian immigrants and would often, to have enough food on his plate, have to work instead of go to school. He loved learning more than anything, and was determined to fill his mind with information until it overflowed, and so what better way would there be to achieve that than to be a teacher. What exactly is it that makes him so different from any other University professor that there should be a book written in his honour? The reason is that he was going to die. Even though it is certainly a known fact that we all die eventually, none of us really knows when. Schwartz was one of the few people on this world who had some idea of when his time

was to come, and the answer for him was soon. So he spends the last years of his life preparing for that moment. He is diag-

nosed with ALS at the age of 76, and from then on he decided to live life differently. He could be considered a philosopher to some, but to Albom he was so much more than that, he was his role model, his hero, and his friend.

Albom, after parting ways with Schwartz in University, had gone on to become a sports columnist for the Queens Tribune and had realized how unsatisfactory his

life was, although he had everything he wanted, a nice car, a nice house, a nice job. He knew something was missing. Fate had its way and after years of not having seen each other, he decided to contact his former col-



The Book Thief By Markus Zusak

Markus Zusak is an Australian author who captures the captivating tale of a young girl living during WWII. This specific book is much different from others of a similar theme, because of the narrator of the book: Death. Death unravels the tale of a young orphan girl, Leisel, and her foster family, the Hubermanns. That's what the first day for me was like. High School's not that scary.



The cod industry in Newfoundland was what brought people there in the first place. For most of the Newfoundland families, codfishing is all they've ever known. That's their livelihood. The moratorium put approximately 30 000 people out of work—some estimate it affected as many as 50 000. I still had the chance to get my hands on a big cod though!

We ended our trip off in Bonavista, a scenic place with a great little café—Neil's café, where they make some delicious crepes. Once again, the scenery of the ocean, the tall grass, and the sea breeze put me in such a relaxed mood that I didn't ever want to leave.

Newfoundland cannot be described by words. I have been to many places all over the world, but Newfoundland definitely tops my list of favourite trips. I hope that everyone has the chance to visit this gem in our own country one day!

An Introduction to Syria

Syria, a country which many might not have even heard of before March 2011 is now constantly in the news. To fully understand the Syrian conflict we must put it into context.



Bashar Al-Assad is the current president of Syria, however he was preceded by his father Hafez Al-Assad. After the death of his father, Bashar Al-Assad was placed as president turning the democratic system into a monarchy but to cover such accusations the government had an unopposed election in which Bashar Al-Assad was "voted" in with a majority of 97%. Syrians were upset with their government, they felt deprived of their electoral rights. They lacked their essential right to democracy. Al-Assad and his administration were corrupting the country. However to the surprise of many, Tunisia, another country in the middle east also suffering under similar corrupt conditions as to those existing in Syria had its very own revolution! Tunisians together protested for a demand of their rights and the resignation of their dictator president Ben Ali in January 2011. The success in Tunisia inspired another country in the Middle East, Egypt. Just like Syria and Tunisia, Egyptians had been suffering extreme corruption and lack of rights, and together on January 25th 2011 revolted against their dictator president Hosni Mubarak. After 18 days of revolting, they succeed in overthrowing their dictator. The world was shocked. This led a wave of inspiration across the middle east.

One country especially inspired and motivated was Syria, where on March 15th 2011 the Syrians decided to protest against Al-Assad and against the corruption he led. They protested for their rights and political freedom, demanding an end to police brutality, state of emergency laws, lack of free elections, and lack of

freedom of speech. They also protested against the economic situation of hunger, price inflation, and low wages. The Syrians wanted an end to the corruption and poor living conditions that they had been enduring. However, instead of resignation, Al-Assad deployed the army to suppress the demonstrations. They had the full right to kill and torture. Although the protesters did try to resort to self-defense, in no way was it in comparison with the power of the army. As the world watches the Syrian uprising, Al-Assad kills Syrian protesters everyday, showing no mercy, to this day.

According to the United Nations, the death toll in Syria has surpassed 120,000 and over two million Syrians have taken refuge. According to many international organizations, the Syrian Conflict is the number one humanitarian issue. Every day there are people dying, worse yet, the Syrians regime has used chemical weapons.

The usage of chemical weapons as Obama had claimed last year, is a red line. The Syrian regime launched its chemical massacre on August 21st 2013. It launched rockets with a chemical gas which can kill within the first minute of inhalation. This chemical gas is classified as a weapon of mass destruction yet the Syrian regime was free to use it in Syria against civilians killing more than 1400 civilians. The Syrian regime is committing a mass genocide against its people.

What message are we as global citizens sending across when all we can do is sit and watch. What message does this send to other countries? That the usage of chemical weapons is acceptable? That every country is free to due as it wishes to its people and that no other nation would disagree or take measurable actions to ensure such inhumane actions never happen again?

When thinking of activism, Mahatma Gandhi can be a great inspiration, "You may never know what results come of your actions, but if you do nothing, there will be no results." We can start here in Kelvin High School; there are many things we can do to try helping. To begin with we should try to educating ourselves more about the Syrian revolution. After gaining awareness, we can share it with others! We can spread awareness and let others know of the huge violations the Syrian regime is committing. 
