

Physical Education: Reaching New Heights!

One of the most enjoyable units to teach in Physical Education is the High Jump unit!

Now, we know what you're thinking.... why High Jump?

That seems so HIGH SCHOOL!

Every student whether Grade 1 or Grade 6, can learn a lot by practicing and perfecting their running start, approach, take off on one foot, twist in the air and land on their backside on one of our crash matts. It sounds like lot of stages to learn but even the youngest student's benefit from this practice.

We now use a soft rope (instead of a metal bar) so that when a student hits the rope it softly moves off the resting poles and there is no chance of injury to the student.

One of the most enjoyable things about high jump is that it is co-operative in nature because students will encourage and cheer on each other on as they attempt their own personal bests!

We tell the students that the most important thing to remember is that this takes courage for students to try in front of their classmates, and that courage should be celebrated! Well done students. This is the Way.

The Learning Lens

Room 104 shares their learning about the Phase of the Moon

Room 104 has been learning about the phases of the moon. We have watched a lot of videos through Science Learning Media, read a lot of books and discussed what they noticed and wondered about the moon. All these helped us gather information and built a foundation to understand the changing appearance of the moon as viewed from the earth. During discussions, the students learned that the moon rises in the east and sets in the west each day just like the sun. They learned that the moon gets its brightness from the sun and it is visible both during the day and night.







They also learned that the moon takes about 30 days to complete one orbit (move around) to earth. To further understand why the moon has different shapes, we did an experiment using a ball and a flashlight. We turned off all the lights, closed all the blinds and left us only with the light coming from the flashlight. The moon was the ball, the earth were the students and the sun was the flashlight. In addition, we also made a moon slider as an art activity and used oreo cookies to model and name each of the lunar phases.

The students were also asked to observe the moon every night if they can; and to share their observation with the class based on what they saw with their naked eye.


An In-Depth Look into Classroom Learning in Room 209

Over the last few weeks, room 209 has been working on the unit, Canada: 1867 to 1914. The children have reviewed compass directions and learned about the seven continents and the oceans of the world. They have read books, done research, listened to stories, viewed videos, and drawn pictures, maps and illustrations, on Canadian Confederation, the provinces and other important events in the life of CANADA to 1914. They have been making use of atlases, charts and wall maps to locate information.

This unit will give our children the opportunity to continue to practice high level questioning techniques, as well as to undertake a research project on a Canadian prime minister and to organize prior knowledge and researched information in the form of webs, timelines and paragraphs. Through inquiry and research, they will learn about the people that came to Canada after 1867, as well as their daily life, culture, legends and beliefs.

In Science, we have now concluded the unit, Forces and Simple Machines. Through minilessons, read-alouds, class discussions, video presentations, investigations and research, the children have been able to describe a variety of simple machines and





compare devices that are variations of simple machines. In small groups they have also participated in a variety of hands-on experiments in order to help them understand how pulleys and levers make work easier.

The new unit, Properties of Substances, will provide many opportunities to explore the three states of matter – solids, liquids and gases – and to describe the properties of each. In small groups, we will investigate how the characteristics and properties of substances are altered during physical and chemical changes...


In writing workshop, the children have been concentrating on producing highly descriptive informational text. We have been bringing a variety of fruits into the classroom (apples, oranges, pineapples...) in order to help with this task. The children have been using their senses (see, touch, taste, smell...) in order to write about them. Whatever is missing, they find it through research. They are becoming real experts (description, world's best producers, health benefits...) and in this type of writing.


Students have continued to work hard in their Music classes. In April the Grade 1/2s continued learning about the terms accent, staccato and legato (e.g., short or smooth sounds in music) through listening, playing instruments and games. They also began exploring the different ways we use our voice (e.g., whisper, call, talk, sing) The Grade 3/4s continued working on their recorder skills which include reading pitches and rhythms. They have been working hard on the Recorder Karate program. In the program a "belt" is earned for playing increasingly difficult songs. The Grade 5/6s completed their work with drums and have been learning about different parts of song analysis (e.g., tempo, dynamics, style...).


