


In Math, we have been focusing on multi-digit multiplication and long division with decimals as well as calculating area and perimeter of regular and irregular shapes.

We will also be preparing a plant based meal using roots, leaves, stems, flowers and fruits! When we return, we will be using the design process and all we've learned at The Leaf to design a perfect habitat for plants. Mme. Bouchard and I are so excited to be able to take students on this land/place based field trip to explore, learn, and create together.



If you have a modest income and a simple tax situation you may qualify for this program*.

Modest Income: Single household income under \$35,000 or

Couple household income under \$45,000 (+\$2,500 per dependent)

Simple tax situation excludes:

- Professional or business income

- Investment income over \$1,000

- Farming or fishing income
- Deceased returns
- Pre and post bankruptcy return
- Foreign property


Sleep routines can be tricky.

Below, is a list of Sleep Hygiene recommendations shared by Specialized Services for Children & Youth (SSCY Centre).

SLEEP HYGIENE

- 1. Scheduling bed time at the same time every night (including weekends)
- 2. Limit time in bed to when child is ready for sleep (ie: no tv, snacks, or playing in bed)
- 3. Limiting snacks and drinks after dinner (except water)
- 4. Limiting screen time such as TV and iPad for 1-2 hours before scheduled bed time
- 5. Completing the same "bed time routine" calming activities 30 minutes 1 hours before the scheduled bed time. (ex: puzzles / colouring / play-dough – brush teeth – bath – read story)
- 6. If the student gets up in the middle of the night, provide calm objects such as books and stuffed animals. Try to avoid alerting activities, food, sleeping in parent's bed as these may keep them awake longer.
- 7. You can also consider a white noise device for their bedroom

It is recommended to trial these suggestions consistently for 2-3 weeks. Changing routines and sleep patterns can be a slow process, don't get discouraged!!



A MESSAGE FROM GUIDANCE

Basic Head Lice Treatment

- Getting Head Lice is not related to how clean/dirty a person, or their home is.
- Head Lice move by crawling- they cannot jump
- Head Lice do not carry disease.
- If you spot any lice, even 1, you need to treat it.
- You must treat the hair and other environments such as jackets, and blankets

Treating the Hair:

- Treat all household members with lice/nits (lice eggs) at the same time
- Lice Treatment product (either over the counter or prescribed by doctor.) Gather all supplies you will need
- Towel- to cover child's face when washing
- Tixtues or paper towels- to wipe comb on to remove nits and lice

o Bowl of hot soapy water- to ringe off the lice comb between sections

- Nit comb- for removing lice and nits (However, metal combs work best)
 - Mair clips or large bobby pins- to section the hair during combing
- o Clean clothing- to change into after treatment.
 - Something to entertain child during combing.
- ☐ Apply Lice Treatment to unwashed hair. Follow the package directions.

 After treatment, DO NOT wash hair or go swimming for 7 days!

Using the Nit Comb can take 1-3 HOURS in order

to get out all nits and lice from the hair.

- Lift a small section of hair (about 1 to 2 inches wide).
 - Comb through this section starting at the roots
- Clean Lice Comb Frequently -Wipe eggs and nits from the teeth of the comb with a tixtue or paper towel and then rinxe comb in the hot xoapy Firmly pull the comb ALL the way through the hair. water before moving to the next section. 0000
- Clip the combed section of hair out of the way before moving on to next 1-2
- Repeat this process until the entire head has been combed through

Other tips:

KENT ROAD SCHOOL

- Follow the package directions for re-treatment and contact your doctor if lice are still precent after two treatments.
- By checking the hair and combing with a nit comb every 2-3 days after treatment, for Don't use a hair dryer after treatment because lice could get blown into the air
 - 2-3 weeks, you can lower your chance of lice coming back. Don't use more than one lice medication at a time.


Treating the Environment:

- Items that can't be washed in the washer can be dry-cleaned OR be placed in a realed plantic bag for 2 weeks.



 Soak combs, brushes, hair barrettes/clips/ties in hot water (130°F) for 5-10 minutes.
