Children in preschool and elementary school are most likely to get head lice — those tiny, wingless parasitic insects that feed on tiny amounts of blood drawn from the scalp: Lice look like small white specks no bigger than a grain of rice

Getting rid of lice

Use anti-lice shampoo and a fine tooth comb to remove nits (lice eggs). Repeat treatment seven to 10 days later



Lice cannot jump or fly, the only way for them to spread is **direct contact**



Don't hang hats, scarfs, or personal items too close together at school




Wash all sheets, towels, and clothing that you've used in the last two days with hot water

You should be checking your child's hair for lice once a week, whether there is a known infestation or not. That will help prevent spread, and avoid reinfestation if a problem is uncovered.

Room 5 - Mrs. Anciro



Adventures with Room 7 and Mr. Storey

In the month of February, students in Room 7 dived into the world of science writing and experimentation. Our goal was to think like a scientist. What does a scientist need to do before they actually get to the experimentation part?


Well, first, a scientist has to create a question. The students got really creative with their question ideas. One student wondered how long he could stand completely still. Another student asked how far two different paper airplanes could fly. Other students tried to find out how many breaths it would take to pop a balloon.

Once we had all our questions, students needed to write a plan. This was a lot more difficult than creating the question. Students needed to come up with a step by step guide on what they would do to answer their questions. They needed to create a series of tests that would provide them with the data to answer their question.

Once our plans were created, students made hypothesis about their experiments. They needed to make educational guesses about what might actually happen. This was a real test in critical thinking as the students needed to imagine their experiments and predict what might happen.

This last week, we got down to work on the actual experiments. The room got a bit noisy as balloons began to pop. Airplanes flew in the hall. Balls bounced off walls. Students tested their endurance. The room was very lively, and a lot of data was being created.

In the coming weeks, the students will be finishing up their science reports just in time for student led conferences. You can look forward to reading these lab reports and hearing your child talk about this experience.

Mack-I liked it when the police officer visited us.


Matthew-I enjoyed the story that was read to us during the Take Pride Winnipeg presentation.

We are looking forward seeing more snow to play on the sled, to build snow men, snow forts. It seemed like we did not have much snow this winter.






Ms.Bogan
