Dear Wolseley Families,

What a great September! Our students and staff have had a great start to the school year. Way to go Wolseley Wolves!

This year we had our Meet the Teacher on September 11th. I hope you all enjoyed meeting our staff and seeing the inside of our school and classrooms. We sure enjoyed having you!

On September 27th our school participated in Orange T-Shirt Day, as we now are observing September 30th as a national day for Truth and Reconciliation. We wore orange in recognition of the harm residential schools had on children and to express the message that everyone around us matters. Thanks for the overwhelming support!

Our Wolseley beliefs are: Be Respectful, Be Responsible and Be Safe. These beliefs help guide students when they are at school so they can learn and interact with others in a healthy, positive way. Please remember to call the school office to report any absences for your children. At Wolseley School the bell rings at 8:55 am for students to enter the building before school starts at 9:00 am. Please do not send your children too early as there is no supervision outside until 8:45 am. After lunch, the bell rings at 12:55 pm for students to enter the building so teachers can resume class at 1:00 pm. Any late students are to sign-in in the office before going to class. Please make sure your child(ren) arrive on time to class to avoid interruptions to learning.

Teachers in grade 1-6 have begun to conduct elementary assessments. This assessment assists teachers in planning next steps for learning to meet the individual needs of each student. Reading, writing, math, physical education and social emotional skills are the areas assessed. Teachers use the information they learn about students during this process to program for them and plan targeted reading, spelling and math groups, as well as to identify challenges and learning gaps.




Room 17 Grades N / K PM

We have created some anemometers to find wind speed, barometers to check barometric pressure, wind vanes and rain gauges. We will be tracking the weather with our instruments throughout October and comparing them to Environment Canada's weather at the Forks.

We have also been listening to Origin Stories from different First Nations as a way to begin learning about Canada. We are sharing the Novel The Barren Grounds, written by Winnipeg author David A Robertson and writing down our wonderings as we read through the novel.

Room 8 students have been discussing Math strategies daily and problem solving as well as working through place value.

It isn't all work! Our class has been enjoying STEM challenges, like Saving Sam, making towers out of cue cards and using different math manipulatives as building materials. This group can really think outside the box!

Room 10 Grades 3/4

Welcome to a new school year!


We started the year by reading stories that illustrate the power of acts of kindness. We made blueberry muffins, inspired by the book, "Ordinary Mary's Extraordinary Deed." This activity introduced the students to



reading informational text (recipes) and understanding different units of measure in math.

We investigated patterns and the attributes of different objects, and jumped right into strategies to solve addition and multiplication problems. We took our science learning outdoors as we began to learn about food chains, beginning with plants. We sketched trees in the schoolyard and

identified the parts and their functions. We then dissected petunia blossoms to look more closely at the parts of a flower.



We had a close up look at honey bees and bumble bees in the school garden. Students used crayon melt to create a sun, in response to the book, "You are Living Sunlight." We are happy to have Clare Schellenberg, a teacher candidate, working and learning with us this year. Clare has already taught us some group games to enhance

our co-operate skills and science learning. We look forward to a wonderful year of learning.



Room 9 Grades 5/6

This month the students of room 9 have gotten a quick start on their IN, (Interactive Notebook) a.k.a their social studies book.

Getting off the ground with a study on Beringia, the ancient land bridge that allowed early humans to cross from what is now Russia, to Alaska. Then, making a fun advertisement starring North America.

They have also begun their first science unit, learning about the human organ systems in their booklets, including the Respiratory System, and the Circulatory System.

They kicked math off to a good start with place value, from hundredths to millions, three pages at a time. And to get those who are not so keen on reading hooked, they are participating in a friendly reading challenge to see if everyone can snag a 500 minute monthly goal, at school and at home.

And finally, writing. With creative story ideas to get them a base, they wrote about controllers that could control time, fish in the washing machine, and much more.... Room 9 has had a great start to the year.

Choir will be starting soon - looking forward to a great year of performing arts!








Room 21 Adapted Skills Program...

We are really excited for swimming to start on October 7!














REMINDERS:


