

#### **Happy November!**

It's hard to believe we're already in our third month of learning and nearing the end of our first term. If you like to think about math like I do, you might appreciate knowing that we're one-fifth of the way through the school year—only four-fifths left until June 30! One of our key focuses this year is continuing to strengthen our students' critical thinking and problem-solving skills in mathematics.

Another goal we're embracing this year is exploration. As a whole school inquiry, we've been asking ourselves whether to continue our long-standing Winter Concert tradition or to try something new. Many of our students experience anxiety when faced with large group performances. In the past, months of preparation often went into practicing for one night instead of enjoying the creative process itself—the joy of making "rainstorms," exploring different musical instruments, and expressing themselves in new ways through the arts.

This year, students have been participating in art challenges and creating tableaus in drama, stretching their imaginations, taking risks, and filling classrooms with laughter. After thoughtful discussions and a community vote that included input from both students and families, the majority decided to try something new. We're excited to explore this fresh direction together and will share more information soon. Thank you for being open to new ideas and for supporting our students as they learn through creativity and exploration.

On Monday, November 10th, at 11:00 a.m., Weston School will hold our Remembrance Day Service. Our Grade 5-6 students will lead this solemn ceremony, and each class will provide a wreath as part of our tribute. Families are warmly invited to join us as we take time to remember and honour all who have served and sacrificed. Poppies will be given to each child and will also be available for parents.

We've had a wonderful start to the school year and have worked hard to get to know each child's strengths and areas for growth. Report cards will go home on November 19th, and Student-Led Conferences will take place on November 20th from 4:00-7:30 p.m. and again on the morning of November 22nd. Please note that there will be no classes on the afternoon of November 21st, as teachers will be participating in professional development with other schools focused on mathematics. During conferences, your child will have the opportunity to share their learning, reflect on their growth, and set goals for the next term.

To help you understand your child's report card, if your child is one year or more below grade level, you may see an ND (Not Demonstrating). In this case, the teacher will provide an Academic Learning Plan (ALP) to support skill development. This plan will be discussed in detail during conferences. If a "1" appears on the report card, it means your child is currently accessing about 50% of the grade-level curriculum. In this case, an Adapted Education Plan (AEP) will be created to outline the adaptations that will help your child access learning more effectively. If you have any questions about these plans, please reach out to your child's teacher.

As November brings colder weather, please help your child dress appropriately for the walk to and from school and for outdoor recess. Ensure your child has proper indoor shoes for gym and classroom activities. We also ask that you remind your child to cross the street only at Patrol-Controlled Crossings. Safety is everyone's responsibility, and we want all Weston students to be safe and cared for as they come to and from school each day.


#### **WESTON VOTES ARE IN**


meaningful experiences for families and students:

#### Tips for a Positive and Calm Morning Routine

WHAT IS A MORNING ROUTINE?

Different habits and actions to help you prepare for the day.



WHY IS A MORNING ROUTINE IIMPORTANT?

"Kids thrive on routines because time is really difficult for kids to understand" (Gratton, 2024)

Having a regular morning routine in place can help children feel more ready to learn and play at school. It also support socialemotional development, self-regulation, and mental health (Raising Children Network, 2025).

Morning routines also help kids feel safe, reduces stress and provides a sense of security and familiarity in their busy days.

PLEASE PACK LUNCHES THAT ARE SAFE, READY TO EAT, AND DO NOT REQUIRE HEATING.



#### Literacy

We are learning lots about the sounds in words to practice reading and spelling. With the help of our sound wall, we are experimenting with our voices and mouth shapes as we say words.

We've connected literacy and art as we explore textures in our world and drawings, descriptive adjectives (like crunchy and smooth), and poetry writing!

#### Math

Students are showing their comfort with Cuisenaire rods as we practice ten pairs and building big numbers using little numbers.

We are beginning to take this learning to our number lines, thinking about where numbers go and how to order them.

Students are also practicing skip-counting to master their self-chosen goal!

#### Inquiry

We have used our imaginations to invent our own living things, being sure to follow the criteria for what makes something alive!

As we consider ourselves as living things, we are also exploring the idea of belonging by thinking about the groups and communities we are a part of.

Our school identity, the Weston Hawks, will give us a fun opportunity to continue exploring our learning in both of these areas!

#### MATH

Our students have been practicing making groups of objects in order to see and make sense of bigger numbers. We've also practiced breaking down large collections into smaller parts. We've practiced the strategies of skip counting and counting on. We also learned the Patterns Are Everywhere!! Which is also a name a game show that happens in room 6. Ask about it

and Challenge US!!!

#### **SCIENCE**

Our unit about living things is nearing completion. The students final projects are models of animals in their habitats. These should show that living things get all they need to survive from their habitats. Findings include some animals eat other animals, some eat plants, some animals breath air and some water.

#### **SOCIAL STUDIES**

We are working on making a community map. It should have all the important places that we like to go and help us to stay healthy. What places are important to you?

#### READING AND WRITING

Everyday students in room 6 write about something they like, care about or find interesting. It's part of our Sharing Circle. We've written about wishes, favourites, Halloween candy, places to visit, things to do and a whole bunch of other topics. We can't wait for you to read them at student led conferences.

We've also practiced letter recognition, letter sounds, and short words. More reading to come!

#### THEME: BIOMES

October has been a month of growth and excitement in Room 10! Students have settled into their routines and are learning what it means to work and learn together. We've spent time exploring how to share ideas, listen to one another, and collaborate as a team. In writing, students have been filling their books with ideas and stories, finding their voices as young authors. Our STEAM challenges have inspired creativity and teamwork as students shared their thinking through hands-on projects.

In math, students have been using place value blocks, Cuisenaire rods, and Mathletics to explore numbers in fun and meaningful ways.

They've also been discovering new books and interests through Epic Books as we continue to build a love of reading.

Room 10 is excited to carry this curiosity and teamwork into November













#### What We Are Learning

We've had a busy and exciting month of learning in our classroom!

In science, we are studying animal habitats and discovering how animals depend on their environments to meet their needs for food, water, shelter, and space. We created our own Pokemon inspired cards to share our learning. Our class also talked about how our human actions can positively impact the world around us.

Our Grade 4 students completed their swimming lessons, which was a great opportunity to build water safety skills and confidence in the water.

This month, our class also learned about bus safety through bus ridership. Our class went inside a school bus and talked about the importance of following rules while riding the bus, such as sitting properly, speaking quietly, and knowing how to load and unload safely.

Next month, we'll keep working on fractions and problem solving in math, continue our exploration of local animal habitats, and make more community connections through art and inquiry.

As the weather continues to get colder, please remember to dress for the weather. Students should come prepared with jackets, hats, and appropriate footwear for outdoor play and recess. We go outside regularly to enjoy fresh air and movement, and being dressed warmly helps everyone stay comfortable and ready to learn.

#### Literacy & Math

In mathematics, students are using open number lines for subtraction up to 100 000.

They are learning to identify benchmark numbers to make subtraction efficient.

We also explored different kinds of maps in social studies. Then, we applied what we learnt to create a school/community map. We had fun using the talebots to code the directions to go different designated spots.




# Arts Class

#### Building Community Through the Arts


