Absence Reporting

Just a reminder that Shaughnessy Park School uses the Safe Arrival system to notify parents of student absences. We are working towards having all absences recorded by parents so they do not receive phone calls. With Safe Arrival, you are asked to report your child's absence in advance by using any of these methods:

1 Using a mobile device, download and install the School Messenger app from the Apple Store or the Google Play Store. The first time you use the app, select Sign Up to create your account. Select Attendance, then Report an Absence.

2 Use the Safe Arrival website, <http://go.schoolmessenger.ca>. The first time you use the website, select Sign Up to create your account. Select Attendance then Report an Absence.

3 Call the toll-free number 1-855-278-4513 to report an absence using the automated phone system.

These options are available 24 hours/day, 7 days a week. Absences can be reported at any time.

WALKING SCHOOL BUS

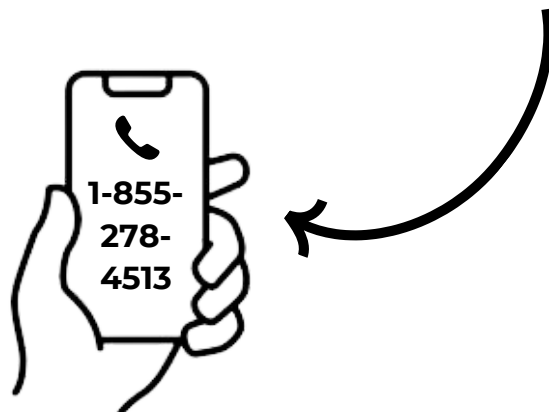
Please have children ready at the door and dressed for the weather by 8:25 AM. WSB will be cancelled when temperatures are too cold.

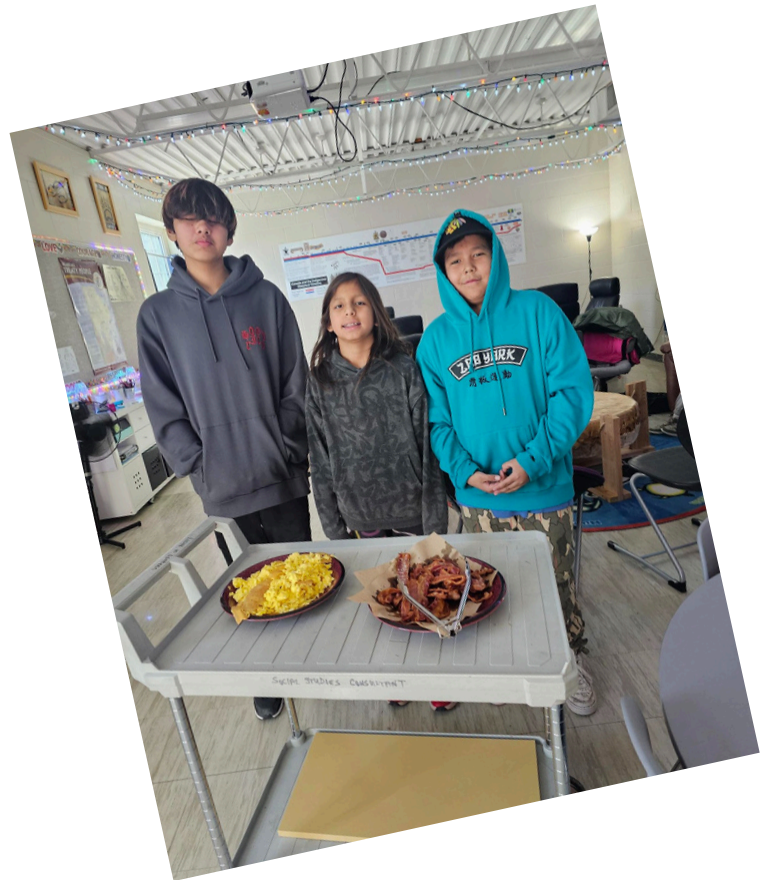
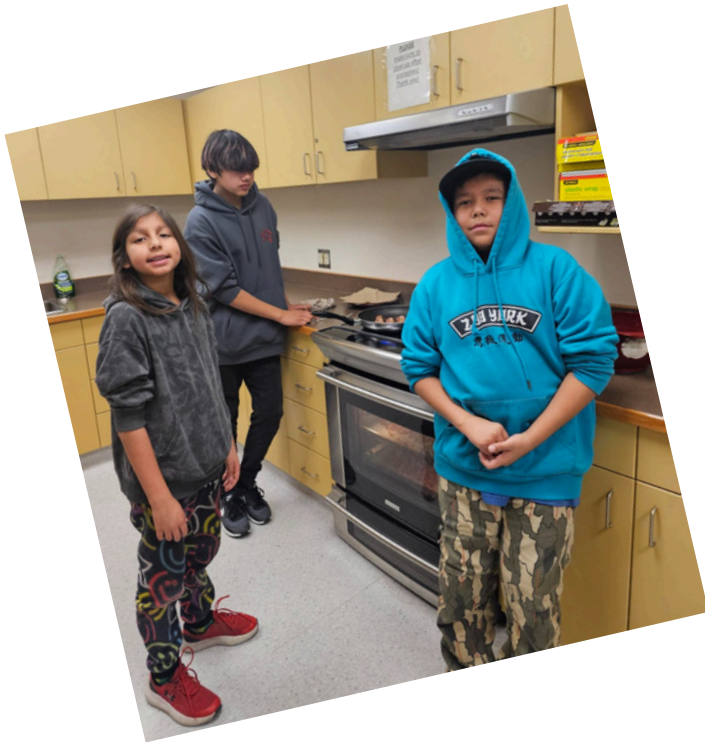


THE BEAR STONE TEACHING LODGE

Students participated in a meaningful act of remembrance by tying red ribbons outside the school, symbolizing our commitment to honoring those who are missing and those whose lives have been taken. The day was further enriched by a powerful walk through the community, led by one of our dedicated teachers Mr. Honer, and his drum, which created a space for reflection, respect, and unity. 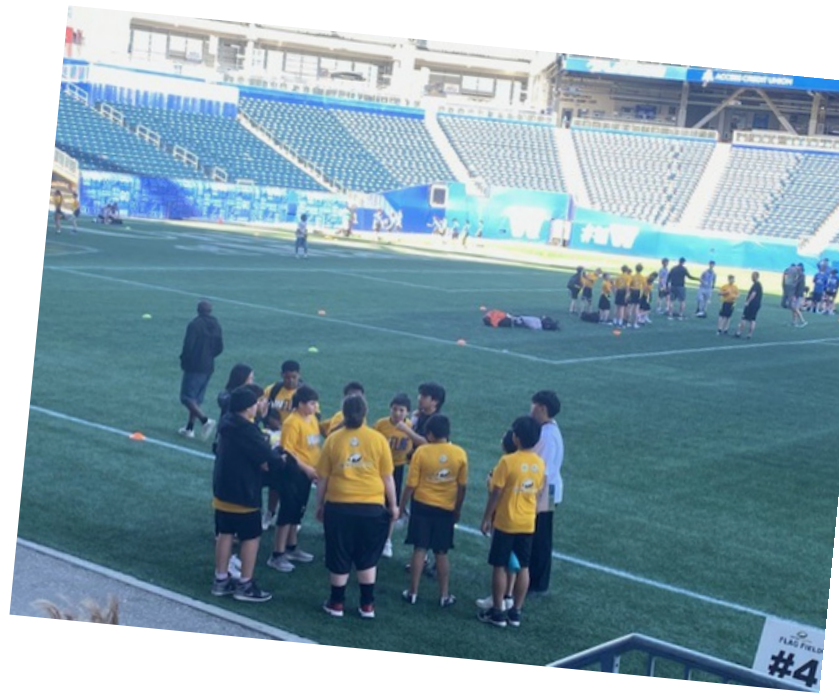
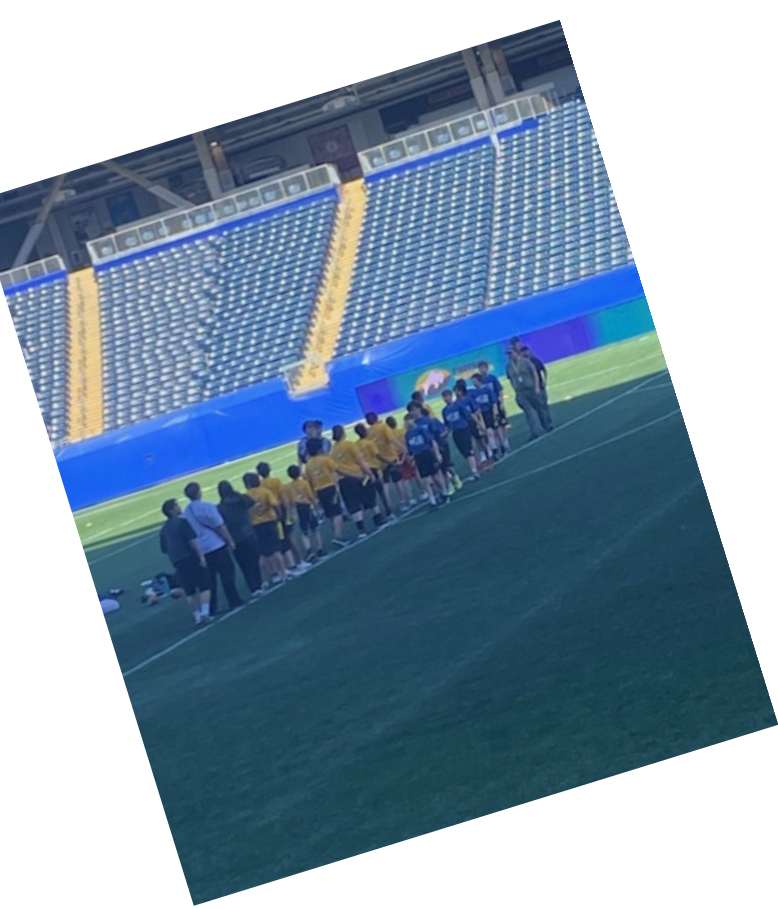
FLAG FOOTBALL

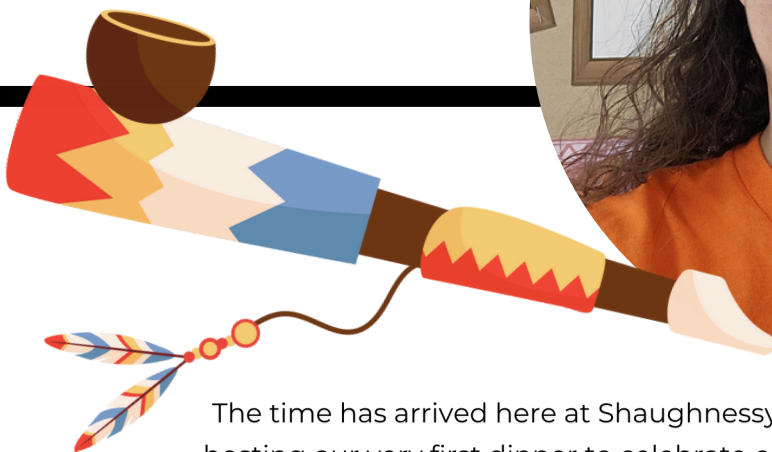

IS YOUR CHILD ON WALKING SCHOOL BUS?

DID THEY MISS THEIR PICK UP?



Mornings are tough for some of our students! If your child missed their Walking School Bus pick up time ... **get them ready to come to school anyway!**

Mary will be there to pick them up at a later time with the **Secondary Walking School Bus** - a new initiative at Shaughnessy Park School that we hope will help more students get to school!

If you'd like to sign your child up for Walking School Bus, there are forms available in the school office.

TREATING LICE

Cases of head lice have increased at Shaughnessy Park School. **Head lice do not cause disease.** Anyone can get lice; they are not a sign of uncleanliness. In order to stop the spread of lice we are asking that you please check your child's head for head lice and their eggs today and weekly on a regular basis. Itchiness of the scalp may be a sign of lice.

If your child does have lice, please treat him or her immediately. They may return to school after the first treatment. The treatment is a lice-killing shampoo that can be bought at any drug store or pharmacy. Follow the instructions on this shampoo exactly.

Wash things that have touched the child's hair such as combs, brushes, scarves, hats, jackets, pillowcases, shirts/tops with collars in hot water. Hot water or the heat cycle of the dryer will kill any live lice or nits. Things that cannot be washed should be dry-cleaned or placed in a plastic bag, sealed and left for 10 days.
