Attendance Facts

- Students need to be present to learn. Attending regularly helps children feel better about school.
- Students who miss only 15 days a year will end up missing a full year of school by grade 12.
- A student with 90% attendance (missing 2 days a month) will miss 4 weeks of school per year! This can make it harder to learn to read.
- Being only 10 minutes late each day equals 6 missed days of instruction over the year.
 Children who miss too many days in kindergarten and grade one often have trouble mastering reading.

Hello parents and guardians of room 3 students! We have begun our learning journey for the 2025-2026 school year! We have already begun to learn about some exciting and interesting topics.

Now, a little bit about what we are exploring in different subject areas. In Math we have begun a unit on number (addition, subtraction, multiplication and place value) by using some math games and online programs to strengthen mental math strategies we have begun to learn. In ELA, we have already completed several creative writing assignments using our new Google Classroom and have begun our levelled reading groups. In Science, we are exploring structures and materials through experiments, demonstrations and hands-on \$TEM (\$cience, Technology, Engineering Math) activities. In Social Studies, students are excited about our study of life and the peoples of ancient Egypt. We are also preparing for our Remembrance Day assembly. In Health, we are learning about the brain, emotions and positive mental health strategies.




Thunderbird Poppy


Room 10 Learning Update


