## Grades 5/6-Rm. 18

Wow! Is it really May already? It seems like just a few days ago that we were starting the school year. We have really worked hard together this year and continue learning while still having lots of fun as well. We continue to go on our regular community walk each day, and when the weather is not cooperating, we find an online fitness video that we can participate with in the classroom. Much of the focus in the classroom this past month has been with regards to the theme of water. Each student is learning about the issues involving water with special emphasis on those issues involving the Indigenous People of Canada. Students were introduced to theme with an inquiry activity that ended up producing the questions that the students are exploring further. While working on this theme, students are having opportunities to refine their individual research skills and get better acquainted with the informational form of writing. Students are also learning how to go to different sources for information and discern whether the source is a reliable one or not. The end goal of our project is to create several informational mini books about the issues of water put together by groups of 3 or 4 or students and share them with the rest of the school (There are no plans to have them for sale on Amazon at this time). With the warmer weather arriving (fingers crossed), we have several field trips planned over the next several weeks. Please make sure your child is dressed appropriately for the different kinds of outings we will be going on. More information will be shared about the field trips when permission slips are sent out. A reminder for the grade 6 students to get in their :application forms for the school they are planning to attend next year. We will be having a grade 6 farewell ceremony during the last week of June. More information will be sent out a few weeks prior to the event.

In April we finished off our Informational Writing piece using the Writing Process! We celebrated by gifting our final product to Mrs. And Mr. Cox since they are visiting the lovely province we studied. We had a Potato party where we ate potatoes in a few different ways. It was a delicious end to our inquiry into PEI.

May brings us to an opinion writing piece about various topics. We will be collecting data from our classmates too which is part of a math unit as well.

In numeracy throughout April we worked with calendars, looked at uses, looked at how Ms. Lylyk uses different calendars to stay organized at home and at school. We practiced ordering months and days of the week and had a blast completing a fun activity in class with a group of our peers. We also continued to practice addition and subtraction which has been an on going through the year. Near the end of April we began a data unit, where we have been collecting data from our classmates on various topics to help us with our writing pieces.

In May we will work with 2D and 3D shapes and will also be reviewing some of the math concepts we studied earlier this year.

In science we moved into learning about Position and Motion and will continue for some of May before moving into a study of Water. In social studied we will begin our study on the Canadian Identity.

> And we are still hoping to round the corner into... spring? We are sure it will arrive soon...fingers crossed! Some highlights in April included continuing to work with watercolors. We are now pretty confident when it comes to understanding multiplication and using arrays so we are getting ready to begin area and perimeter We are also working on fractions and are beginning a pixel drawing which we will use to show our fraction understanding. We continue have been moving our learning forward in reading as well with integrated reading groups along with Room 18. Looking forward, we are excited to see what May brings... warmer weather and NO MORE SNOW!!

The International Day of Pink was on April 12th this year. All students and staff were encouraged to wear pink shirts or something pink to raise awareness and stand up against bullying, homophobia, and transphobia.

## STAYING ALIVE IN WINTER: HIBERNATION

It's time to learn about how turtles hibernate! In the cold winter months, they hibernate. They start in the fall and end in the spring. Do you wonder how they stay alive? Well, they dig a hole in the mud at the bottom of rivers and marshes to stay warm. Their bodies are special too.
Turtles are cold blooded animals and their body
