It is so important, as educators and parents, to empower children to deal effectively with bullying. Although there is a zero tolerance policy for bullying in schools it does not mean that bullying never happens. It is imperative that bullying is discussed at school as well as at home so children know what to do if it ever happens to them. They need to be aware of what bullying is, the types of bullying (verbal, physical, social, and cyber), and ways to prevent and stop the occurrence of bullying. Although bullying can happen when children are at school, it can also happen in person outside of school or through online platforms. It has been proven that bullying can have long-term lasting negative effects on children. We need to ensure that children feel empowered and properly equipped to stand up to and stop bullying when it occurs. Children need to know that standing up for themselves or others being bullied and/or telling someone is a way to keep themselves and/or others safe and prevent the bullying from continuing. Children also need to know that there are adults in their lives that they can trust to listen to them, support them, and actively involve themselves to stop bullying when it occurs.

It is hard to believe that the month of October has already come and gone! The weather has been cooperative, and it has allowed to go for many enjoyable sunny walks as part of our self regulation activities which we continue to do each morning. When the weather has been uncooperative, we continue to do our morning walks by walking on the spot to one of the many YouTube videos that promotes daily walking and fitness. If students are ever away from school, we encourage them to continue with these walks at home.

A highlight in the past month also involved being outdoors during our day of outdoor learning at St. John's Park. Students participated in literacy, numeracy, art activities, and got lot of healthy exercise by playing games and walking to the park and back. We hope to visit the park three more times this school year. Back at school, students were assigned the task of writing a report on their individual experiences at St. John's Park. We are looking forward to participating in the November assembly, along with the students from Rm. 23, where we will have the opportunity to share some of our learning from our day in the park.

Much of October continued to focus on assessing students in Math and Language Arts. Students reviewed what was involved in writing a basic paragraph by completing an assignment focusing on Halloween (The Most Frightening Thing). Students were introduced to our Listening Log routine in which they summarize and illustrate important details from read aloud novels or special school presentations. We are currently reading Touching Spirit Bear, a wonderful novel that deals with Circle Justice and other Indigenous issues.

We wrote about Thanksgiving and animals. We also did fun art! It's been a fun October. I made a lot of new friends and everyone is nice to me. – Penny

We had an Earth Rangers assembly. There were some cool animals! They showed us Sonic the bird. It flew over my classmates. They also gave us a challenge to guess the animals in the picture. It was hard because they were camouflaged. – Adrian

I did a Thanksgiving water colour painting with Thanksgiving food like turkey. We did research on clams and eels. We also ate popcorn and had a movie about community building to celebrate. – Aiden

In October we did painting about Thanksgiving and we did thank you notes to Penny's grandparents. We did Science experiments about glue to see which glue was the strongest. We wrote about Thanksgiving and researched about Thanksgiving as a group. In math we did collaborative camping math. We read lots of books. – Alaine

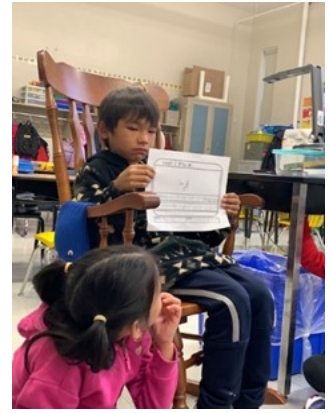

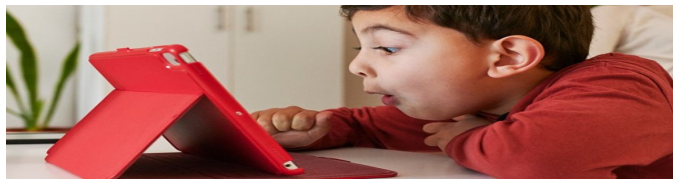

Thank you to all of the students who have been completing their Seesaw activities! These extra activities provide additional practice on skills that we are working on in the classroom. In Math, we have been sharpening our addition and subtraction skills by practising various strategies that enable us to add and subtract quickly in our head. Learning from their peers has been very eye opening for some! We all compute numbers differently and we are realizing that there is no wrong way – just different ways. In ELA, we are learning how to revise and edit our written work by checking for punctuation, spelling, grammar, and the organization of our stories so that they make sense to others. We are also learning how simply thinking of small moments first, helps us develop a good piece of writing. In Science, we are learning how to research on a device and conduct experiments with a partner. In Social Studies, we are learning about the geography of Canada. As a class, we continue to develop good relationships with each other by appreciating and accepting our differences. We also try hard each day to follow our three main classroom rules: Be Kind, Be Respectful, Be Honest.

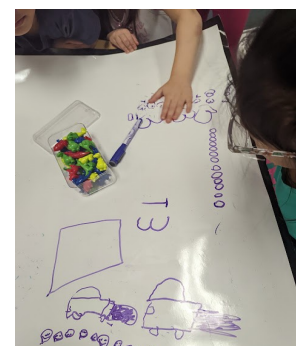
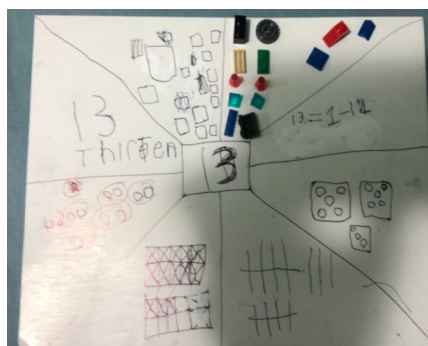
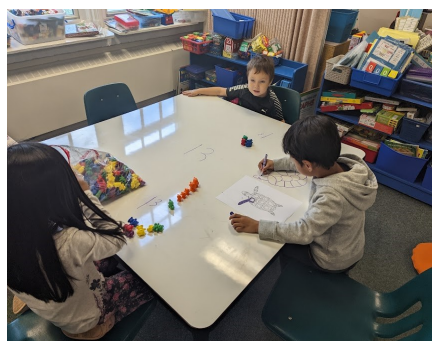
Hello Everyone,
