What's happening in the classroom?

ROOM 105

Nursery/Kindergarten has had a very busy Sepgetting to know each other. We've had a lot of the last 4 weeks.

One of the highlights was making apple sauce for snack time. Some wonderful friends from grade 5/6 came to help us make our treat. It was fun to learn about where apples come from and how we use them. Best of all, the apple sauce

was delicious!





Another highlight of September was making fall leaf fossils out of clay. It sure was messy but it was a great way to learn about leaves and how fossils are made!

ROOM 103

French Immersion Kindergarten students have been studying the changing seasons. They created an art project titled "les arbres en automne" and used sponges, bubble wrap, Q-tips, and forks to paint the leaves on their trees! The students also used real leaves to make impressions in clay. We will be painting our clay leaves using fall colours in the coming weeks.

ROOM 204

September has been a busy month in room 204. We have been reviewing and learning the expectations in all areas of our school. We learned a little bit about everyone as we shared our All About Me bags. In math we are working on counting past 20 both forward and backward. We are exploring apples this month in science as living things, in math adding and subtracting, in reading and also in writing. We tasted and graphed our favorite kind and made applesauce to try as well.



Room 207

has been reviewing the French alphabet letters and sounds with songs, activities and games. Students have been practicing counting using manipulatives and making groups of 2s, 5s and 10s. They have been learning to build numbers using blocks for tens and ones. In English Language Arts we have begun the UFLI program and identifying short vowels in cvc words. We will begin October with learning about bats and starting our first novel study. It has

been a great start to the school year.

- has had a busy, noisy, productive month of getting back into the routine of school and getting to know one another. We've had an excellent field trip where the students got to learn about livestock farming (including cattle, pigs, and chickens). In math, the students have done work on number patterns and tables (which will serve to transition us into basic algebra in the coming weeks), we've reviewed spelling and verbs in French, and gotten into some narrative writing and news reflections in English. In science, the students are learning about organ systems and nutrition, and in social studies they are reading and reflecting on indigenous creation myths and the origins of indigenous people in North America. The school year feels to be in full swing, and the students seem to be back in the grove and enjoying themselves.

301 is starting to come together as a classroom community. I look forward to the students' opportunities for and celebrations of learning in the weeks to come.

Room 304

- has started off the school year very well. The kids are energized after a glorious summer and the projects have started. We have begun our yearly Choose Your Own Adventure group project. As it is in English and at the beginning of the year, the students are more than excited to work on this ELA/technology project.

We have also begun our Chimera project which involves every elementary subject imaginable to varying extents. Both projects will be done and demonstrated by parent/teacher interviews at the end of November.

Also, we have introduced a new concept into 304 this year, where parents are invited to share and teach technology used in their careers. Among many activities, we will look at expanding our ideas for creating presentations with Canva, experimenting with electricity, working with computer programs for architecture and graphic design, and having parents simply come in to enjoy learning some technology with the kids. We're looking forward to these.


Room 309

 have been busy getting back into classroom routines and activities. We have spent time talking about our classroom community and learning about each other through questions and discussions. Students had a wonderful time creating board games to practice skip counting as we review our numbers in French.





Room 310



September was a month of beginnings and a quick start to learning in Room 310. We have been working on developing positive classroom habits, routines, and teamwork. Some of the activities we have started include increasing our reading stamina, math problems and drills, spelling, and learning the provinces, territories, and capital cities of Canada. More importantly, we have worked hard to establish a welcoming, understanding, patient, and safe space for learning. And finally, with September 30th having been the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation, students in Room 19 have studied the book Fatty Legs, the story of Olemaun Pokiakwho went to residential school in Aklavik, Yukon Territory,

starting when she was eight. The books are written in a manner appropriate to grades 4, 5, and 6, and have led to much discussion and reflection on what Truth and Reconciliation means to us.

MUSIC NEWS




Our grades 1-6 students are off to a wonderful new year of learning together in music class. This month we expanded our choral skills with our song of the month: "The Best Things in Life are Free." This song was written in 1927 for the musical "Good News" and is a challenge to sing with its chromatic melody line and large interval leaps. I am most proud that even the youngest students met these challenges and were able to sing this lovely song.

We enjoyed reading the book "Sweet Child O' Mine" based on the lyrics written by Axl Rose and illustrated by Jennifer Zivion. Students listened to a cover version by the Capital Children's Choir and then the original. It was most interesting that tempo, instrumentation and the timbre of the singer's voice play such an important role in how a song feels for the listener and how the text is interpreted.

We look forward to beginning work on our Remembrance Day songs and work with the Orff and unpitched percussion instruments in the month ahead.

Our 34 voice grades 5&6 Chamber Choir look forward to our first rehearsals together and the adventures this year will bring.



Éducation physique / Physical Education

We have been working hard on revisiting Fundamental Locomotor and Manipulative Skills. A main theme has been returning to moving our bodies safely through space with, and around others. Staying/playing/moving inside the boundary line, cooperating with others in large group activities with a focus on kicking and running technique have been. Students are looking forward

to our Marathon de l'espoir Terry Fox Marathon of Hope on Thursday, October 3rd. Within a few hours, *Ratons laveurs* have alread raised \$150 in support of Cancer research. We look forward to 'Trying like Terry!'.



Junior Leadership Program

Junior Leadership is an optional program that Grade 5 & 6 students (and select Grade 4s) can opt to join over the extended nutrition break (lunch) from 1-2 pm. The goal of junior leadership is to encourage positive interactions between all ages at ERS and to create a supportive environment during the extended nutrition break. It also allows junior leaders to develop supervisory skills, and to gain some responsibility and independence.

Junior Leadership role include:

Classroom Monitors:

2 junior leaders supervise per classroom (minimum 1 per Grade 5/6 rooms).

Bartlett Door Monitors:

2 junior leaders manage traffic for bathroom visits and minor injuries heading to the office.

Indoor Red Bin Monitors:

2 junior leaders oversee the movement of the indoor red bin containing snacks and cutlery, reducing the need for adult escorts to the office. Adults on the floor will hand out snacks from the bin.

Activity Leaders:

Approximately 6-10 junior leaders assist in the second half of the break on the playground, focusing on promoting kindness, managing conflicts, and organizing games between the younger years.

FAQs (Frequently Asked Questions)

When do Junior Leaders eat lunch?

Junior leaders eat their lunch at 1 PM with students in their assigned classroom.

Is there more supervision than just the Junior Leaders?

Adult supervisors (EAs, teachers, administration and volunteer parents) are also on the floor at all times, actively supervising and assisting students during the extended lunch break. Continuous check-ins are conducted by the adult supervisors.

How do parents know when their child does Junior Leadership?

Students sign up for Junior Leadership on a weekly basis to build connections with their assigned classrooms.

Does Junior Leadership affect a student's participation in other clubs that happen over the extended health break?

No. If students sign up for other extracurricular activities such as choir or intramurals, they can attend those activities in addition to Junior Leadership. Schedules are arranged and accommodated by the supervisory adult staff.

Grade 5/6 Riverview Raccoons/Ratons-laveurs Ultimate Team: Set to Influence Climate Change in October?

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
