
Staff Spotlight

I went and interviewed Mrs. Beth, one of our amazing educational assistants at Tyndall Park and it was awesome! She has been nicknamed "Mrs. Best" by room 10 and she lives up to the nickname! The first question I asked her was what she first thought when she came and started to work at the school? She said that when she first applied, it was very frustrating because it was hard to adapt to Canada in general; its culture, its language, etc. The second question I asked her was if she enjoyed to work here, she replied with yes. She said it is very nice to work here, the children are sweet and approachable, and everything is just nice. When I asked her if she had ever worked any other jobs before here, it was suprising! She first worked as a childcare worker for 13 years, then became an educational assistant (EA) at another school for a year, and then finally came to work here as an EA. When Mrs. Beth isn't at school with us, she likes to take walks, and also likes to keep her house clean. I also talked with her about why she moved to Canada and what her journey to Canada was like. She said that she moved for a better future for her family, and her kids. When they decided to move to Canada, it was a very major event in her family and they struggled with leaving their home country, the Philippines. But eventually they moved, and it turned out to be a good thing for her and her family's future. I enjoyed interviewing her, it was really fun!

Bees, this article is ALL about bees! Did you know that there are more than twenty thousand species of bees? There are species of bees without stingers, or bees who don't collect nectar or pollen like most bee species. There are 3 roles of honey bees in every colony, the drones, (which are the male bees) workers, who make up most of the colony which are the females, and the single queen, who lays the eggs for the colony. But how do beekeepers deal with the bees without being stung too many times? Well, to prevent the bees from smelling him, he uses a smoke tool to block his scent so that he can't get stung. In the summer, beekeepers use a beekeeping helmet to block their face from getting stung, it also serves as a way to keep the beekeeper from being uncomfortable in their suit.

The official name for beekeepers are called Apiarists. But where did I get all this information from? I got it from Jordan, the owner of Sweet Makers Honey Company. They participate in local farmers markets, and they sell wax candles, flavoured honey, beeswax, and other products. He also runs the company that installed and tends the beehive up on top of the roof of our school! Jordan was able to come to our school last month and share with all the students all this information about bees, let us see the tools he uses, let us see a whole honeycomb of real bees (they were behind glass and 100% safe!), and we even got to try some honey!

The way the adults at Stanley Knowles handle bullying is that they would talk to the bully and say how they are hurting someone. They also have chromebooks, just like us! I asked if there was a nursing room, they said that children who are hurt head to the office to get ice and bandages. Then I asked some questions just for the Vice-Principal.

I asked her how long she has been at Stanley Knowles, and she said that it was her second year as Vice Principal, and she taught as a teacher there for 14 more years. Lastly, I wondered what her favourite thing about Stanley Knowles was, and she said that it was the students, stating how they are very kind to each other.

The grade sixes are excited to go to Stanley Knowles in the fall and join such an awesome school!

The average age of our school buildings is 70 years old, with 16 buildings over 100 years old.





The cost to install and make all our schools fully air conditioned is approximately

- **32** facilities with full air conditioning
- facilities partially air conditioned (i.e. only in modern school additions or gymnasiums).
- facilities with no air conditioning





Keeping students and staff cool

WSD implements the following techniques:

- Running ventilation systems early in the morning to cool schools before arrival
- Controlling outside air intake during the school day
- Using oscillating fans to create air movement
- Minimizing using overhead lights
- Switching off unused classroom electronics

- Closing shades to block direct sunlight
- Taking cool-down breaks between lessons
- Avoiding excess movement during midday heat
- Encouraging students and staff to stay hydrated
- Checking students and staff for heat-related health symptoms


