Our Purpose




Our Vision

About Carpathia

Carpathia School is located in the North River Heights neighbourhood in Winnipeg School Division on Treaty 1 Territory. We have 192 students. Our diversity is our strength! About one-quarter of our students are First Nations or Métis, while another quarter come from households that speak a language other than English at home. Some students come from families that are connected to Canada's Armed Forces.

The school offers the Grades 1—6 English programme in six classrooms with combined grades. In addition, the school offers two combined nursery/kindergarten classes (morning and afternoon). The school has several itinerant teachers, including a half-time Physical Education teacher, a half time Music teacher, a half-time Reading Recovery teacher, and a full-time guidance counsellor. The school also has a full-time Resource Teacher and a principal.

The school is supported by a head clerk, ten educational assistants and two custodial positions. We have clinical services provided by the school division from a Psychologist, Social Worker, Speech & Language Therapist and Reading Clinician.

The school features a lunch program operated by the Parent Council, hosts a private daycare (Down to Earth) inside the building, and is home to the division's South Area Clinical Support Services.




Highlights

Academic

Carpathia teachers are innovative and collaborative! Here are some of the highlights from this year's efforts to get even better at helping all children learn:

- Conducted whole school inquiry with a focus on plants, including reading, research, presentation, and a whole-school field trip to Fort Whyte
- Enacted booster programs to support students achieved in math and reading that had lagged after the pandemic with the Strengthening Student Success Grant
- Engaged in professional learning with Inclusion Support Services to teach math to diverse students so all may succeed
- Integrated systematic approaches to early literacy that help students learn letters and sounds
- Celebrated I Love to Read Month with schoolwide reading challenges, and reopened our library after renovations with fanfare

- Choral performance returned with a winter concert, a performance at our Volunteer Tea, and participation in an interdivisional choral festival
- Hosted a dance performance by Winnipeg's Contemporary Dancers and mounted an outdoor Dance in the Field Day with schoolwide participation in multiple styles of dance
