About our School

Daniel McIntyre Collegiate Institute (DMCI) in Winnipeg's West End offers a vast array of courses leading to high school graduation. The school population of approximately 950 students is multicultural and diverse.

DMCI offers an extensive selection of academic courses including Advanced Placement (AP) courses. This year we have continued to expand our academic courses to include the internationally accredited AP Capstone program. The school has a long history in the Visual and Performing Arts (VPA) including a renowned music and dance program. In addition, DMCI has a variety of option courses available including Industrial Arts, Home Economics, Social Sciences, Business Education, Graphics and Information and Communication Technology Courses.

The school has expanded our Medical Health Professionals program. In this program students focus on physiology and anatomy, becoming certified in First Aid and explore multiple career options in the medical field through our community partnerships that include WRHA, Pan Am Clinic and other private practices.

Maroon Athletics have long since been a source of pride in the West End. Our successful athletic traditions continue with students being able to participate in a wide variety of extracurricular sports.

Students:

-Provided enrichment opportunities for all students in order to maximize their full academic potentials (e.g. After-School Learning Hub)
-Provided extra-curricular opportunities for all students to be able to develop, demonstrate and diversify their interests and passions (e.g. fishing, canoeing, kayaking, biking, before and after-school/intramural sports/games etc.) and to showcase their leadership and community involvement

Learning Outcomes:

- -Focused on re-engaging students after the pandemic in order to increase student presence and engagement
- -Promoted mental health and wellbeing initiatives through Huddle Norwest (a drop-in counselling program)
- -Advanced Indigenous education -Supported students with diverse needs

Addressing Barriers to learning:

-Ensured that disadvantaged and atrisk students continue to be able to access school-based academic and socio-emotional supports in Resource, Credit Recovery, mental health and counselling through clinical support, inclusion support, professional support services, school-based guidance counselling/Resource support /peer tutoring program and WSD nutrition/health programs with our community

Employees:

-Provided targeted PD for staff (e.g. programming for appropriate education, Provincial Framework for Learning and Global Competencies etc.) and opportunities for professional learning conversations (PLC's), with WSD PSS on formative assessment practices to support teachers' pedagogical practice

Sustainability:

-Incorporate PD and learning of Treaty Education and ESD initiatives into school plans and PD days to support teachers' understanding, preparing students to reach their full potential to live "The Good Life" and how they could be integrated into the curriculum

Priorities for 2023-2024

Students:

- Focus on establishing routines, classroom norms and course expectations through teacher advisory groups (TAG) to support students academically and emotionally and help them succeed in school with a focus on relationship building, academic support, personal development, improved attendance and behavior management skills
- Establish proactive intervention systems to respond to chronic attendance issues and mental health of students following the aftermath of the pandemic (e.g. student specific plans, behavior plans, snack/breakfast program at school etc.)

Learning outcomes:

- Continued growth and expansion of our Advanced Placement Program (AP) to support highly academic, skilled and motivated students
- Continued improvements and revamping of our Credit Recovery Model to support complex academic needs of our diverse learners
- Continued support and interventions for Indigenous students through on-going academic, social and emotional supports/resources

Addressing Barriers to Learning:

 Continued development of initiatives and innovative approaches to address academic, social, emotional needs and accessibility requirements, student presence and engagement, mental health issues and nutritional needs of students through student specific planning, proactive intervention strategies and school-based initiatives

Employees:

- Continuation of a Department Head PLC model to support school-wide continuous improvement planning, instruction and assessment to support teaching and learning
- Continue to expand and strengthen understanding of high impact teaching and assessment strategies (e.g. Outcome-Based Assessment and Thinking Classrooms, Universal Design for Learning etc.) amongst faculty at DMCI
- Focus on the guiding principles of the framework for learning (equity, access, cohesion, flexibility and agility) and the global competencies as essential elements of teaching and learning in order to improve student achievement and engagement

Gjana Millar's project was just 1 of 3 to not lose a single point in the College Board's grading system, which puts her in the top 1.14% of AP Research students globally.

DMCI's Medical Professional Program (MPP) - On Friday, January 6th students in our Grade 12 Medical Professional Program took part in some skills workshops arranged through a DMCI alumnus, Dr. Francis Diaz. The day started off with lunch and a panel style Q & A with Dr. Diaz and 4 other young healthcare professionals.
