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School Vision Statement

Our vision at Weston School is to build a foundation that emphasizes curiosity and a love for learning in order to nurture and support responsible, lifelong learners. Weston hawks will be welcomed into a safe, supportive and engaging learning environment that celebrates risktaking while promoting student confidence in order to achieve their full potential.



Weston School is a nursery to grade six elementary school in the Winnipeg School Division. We have a population of 229 students. There are 16 teaching staff and 10 educational assistant staff. We have a Community Worker who provides support to the Weston parents and families. There is a daily parent association supported lunch program. Weston School invites parents to come to our Parent Sharing Hour held once each month from 3:30-5:00 to learn more about how we can work together to support student success.



Achievements From 2022-2023

Instruction and Assessment

- Teachers are involving students in the assessment process; communicating task, intent and criteria, and providing descriptive feedback to move learning forward.
- Teachers and students created visual targets to determine what they were learning and why they were learning it.
- All teachers are a part of a Professional Learning community to develop their understanding of common language and assessment in Mathematics and Language Arts both divisionally and provincially.
- All teachers worked with Math Support coaches to strengthen the Mathematical instruction within the classroom.
- Classrooms teacher are utilizing open ended questions alongside multiple strategies to assist students in modelling their mathematical thinking.
- All students have access to a digital device and utilized a variety of technologies on a daily basis to enhance their learning.
- Dream Box Math was used by all grade 1-6 classrooms within the school and at home to augment the math curriculum.
- Students with diverse needs are fully integrated into all classrooms, with a focus on meeting their individual goals through differentiated instruction and support from E.A.'s. / Resource / Guidance / CSS clinicians.

Indigenous Education

- All teachers integrated Indigenous perspectives in all core subjects as well as Music and Phys. Ed.
- All teachers teach Treaty Education Programs including the history of Residential Schools using Divisional resources.
- Indigenous/multi-cultural diversity through music, dance, storytelling and drama were utilized through the grades
- All classes completed at least one unit of inquiry that highlighted Indigenous perspectives.
- A focus on ensuring that all students are represented throughout the building through books, pictures, morning announcements, shared bulletin board, school assemblies
- We purchased several Indigenous books for all classroom libraries and the school library.
- All students and staff went on a staff wide journey to understand the importance of each of the Indigenous moons and how each moon relates to Mother earth.
- Classrooms partook in the divisional Pow wow.
- We completed Phase 2 of an outdoor classroom that revolves around Indigenous moon calendar and the 28 day cycle.



Education for Sustainable Development

- Grades 5 and 6 students explored themes about the environment, social justice, and Indigenous history. The students then completed stories which were shared at the divisional Pow Wow
- We received an ESD grant for \$1000 which we used to complete phase two of the outdoor classroom.
- 28 Indigenous plants were grown by students within the school and planted to represent the 28 days within the indigenous calendar.
- Planters were built by the students at RB Russel school.
- Healthy nutrition shared in classrooms/Breakfast for Learning.
- Reusable bowls, cups and utensils are used for school snack and breakfast.
- School clean up student committee who participates in weekly clean up
- School wide community clean up
- Monthly school assembly involving ESD challenges.



Celebrations

- Attendance increased due to incentives such as Knock and Walk, the availably of alarm clocks, and attendance Party with the Principal incentives.
- All students participated in our first school wide water fun day! Students wrote persuasive essays for this event to take place- the grade 1-3 went to Seven Oaks Splash pad and grade 4-6 went to Lilac Water park
- 3 whole school Writing Celebrations took place where students shared their writing with other classrooms and parents.
- We celebrated several students monthly who received Weston Hawk awards
- Classrooms received Party with the Principal when they received the most Weston hawk tickets for being responsible, respectful, safe and kind.
- We had 26 school patrols who demonstrated responsibility and safety in grade 5/6. They then trained 16 grade 4 students to be ready for the following year.
- After school Games Night took place where approximately 50 families attended to have fun.
- We had 65 families participate in the Dinner and a Movie night.
- We had 60 families join in on a STEAM night
- 5 grade 5 students took place in weekly Can U Leadership sessions throughout the year and all five received Can U scholarships for Post-Secondary Education.
- We received a First book grant which allowed us to give away books to add to home libraries. In addition, students in grade 4-6 were able to meet an author and receive her book.
- We received an additional Math Support position which allowed us to further focus our Math learning and as a result we achieved our first Math goal by March.

- •Strengthen instructional and assessment strategies for all students using all available resources including the infusion of information technology.
- Improve academic and behavior support services for students with special needs.
- Strengthen and enhance Education for Sustainable Development initiatives that address environment, social justice and economic issues worldwide.
- Integrate Indigenous perspectives in all content areas of learning.
- Further improve school attendance and graduation rates through exploration of additional programs and strategies

The Parent Association operates a daily lunch program and undertakes fundraising activities on behalf of the students; this year contributing to the purchase of trophies and awards for the Grade 6 Farewell Ceremony.
