



Message from Administration

A Warm and Active Start to 2026

January may be one of the coldest months of the year, but at Keewatin Prairie, the learning, activity, and community spirit have been anything but cold. Students and staff have embraced a lively and meaningful start to 2026 through sports, cultural learning, hands-on experiences, and school-wide celebrations.

Basketball Season Heats Up

The new year kicked off with the excitement of basketball season. Our Grade 7/8 boys teams, coached by Ms. Ablao and Mr. Gullden, are off to a strong and determined start. With two practices and games each week, students are sharpening their basketball skills while developing teamwork, resilience, and confidence. Alongside athletic training, players participate in team classroom sessions focused on mental toughness—building confidence, accepting challenges, staying in control, and leading with strong character. Sportsmanship and responsibility as student-athletes continue to be an important focus. We are also proud to have a Grade 5/6 boys and girls team participating in the Inner City Basketball League, gaining valuable experience and representing Keewatin Prairie with pride.

Learn to Skate Program

Our Grade 3 students showed tremendous courage and growth during our Learn to Skate program this month. Many began with shaky steps but quickly built confidence and skill. A team will be selected to represent Keewatin Prairie at the WSD Skate Race at Canada Life Centre on February 18. We are very proud of their progress.

Hands-On Learning Across Grades

January has been full of experiential learning across classrooms. In Electronics & Design, Grade 7 and 8 students explored basic electronics by experimenting with circuits, resistors, and other components. In Graphic Arts, students designed their own custom high-top shoes, blending creativity with thoughtful planning and design principles.

Grade 6 students spent time at Niji Mahkwa School, where they cooked traditional Métis dishes and built a woodworking project using both hand tools and power tools. These experiences strengthened cultural learning and hands-on skills.

Grade 6 classes also visited the Inner City Science Centre for two full days of learning. Students explored microscopes, investigated electricity, and even made homemade ice cream—a highlight of the experience.

Middle Years Book Club Launch

Our Middle Years Book Club launched this month with its first novel, *Hopeless in Hope*. Students are already engaged in lively discussion, deep thinking, and thoughtful questions. Book clubs like this help students share ideas, build community, and explore stories in meaningful ways—complete with snacks to fuel the conversation.

We were honoured to host the Ivan Flett Memorial Dancers, whose phenomenal performance filled our school with energy, talent, and tradition. Students were captivated from start to finish, experiencing culture through movement, music, and storytelling.

Winter Fun at FortWhyte Alive

Grade 5 students embraced the season during their unforgettable day at FortWhyte Alive. They enjoyed tobogganing, snowshoeing, roasting marshmallows, the blanket toss, tug-of-war, and even the seal race. Despite the cold, the day was filled with joy, laughter, and connection with nature.

Staff Learning with Tasha Spillett

Staff had the honour of learning with Tasha Spillett, New York Times bestselling author. She shared her wisdom, stories, and “glimmers,” inspiring us to continue honouring students’ identities, lived experiences, and stories. It was a heartfelt and powerful professional development experience.

School-Wide Olympic Unit

We are excited to participate in a school-wide Olympic Unit this month. Each class from Nursery to Grade 8 has selected a country to represent, and over a three-week period, students will explore movement-based Olympic activities, learning connected to their chosen country, and core Olympic values such as perseverance, teamwork, respect, and fair play. Some activities will take place outdoors, so please ensure students are dressed appropriately on PE and activity days. The celebration will conclude with a Closing Ceremony on **February 26** and an Olympic Field Day on **February 27**. This school-wide initiative promotes spirit, cultural awareness, and active participation.

Festival du Voyageur – February 13

On Thursday, **February 13**, students from Nursery to Grade 6 will participate in approximately 1.5 hours of Indigenous games and winter activities as part of our Festival du Voyageur celebration. Students will also enjoy bannock and hot chocolate. Families are asked to ensure students come prepared with warm coats, mitts, hats, boots, and snow pants so they can fully enjoy the outdoor experience.

Pink Shirt Day – February 25

On **February 25**, Keewatin Prairie will participate in Pink Shirt Day, a day dedicated to standing up against bullying and promoting kindness, empathy, and inclusion. Students and staff are encouraged to wear pink to show their commitment to creating a safe, caring, and respectful school community. Throughout the day, classrooms will participate in learning activities focused on kindness, compassion, the impact of our words and actions, celebrating diversity, and how to be an “upstander” rather than a bystander.
