


Staff Spotlight

What do you think about when you hear the word Thanksgiving? Maybe you imagine eating a warm slice of pie, or digging into a delicious turkey dinner with your peers, happily chatting at the dinner table. Maybe you imagine walking around a park with the leaves crunching under your shoes. This is the original version of Thanksgiving.

Obviously, Thanksgiving wasn't made last week, and it definitely wasn't made last year. It all started back in 1578. Although there are multiple different stories about Thanksgiving's origins, I will only focus on one. In 1578, a man named Sir Martin Frobisher ventured on a journey to seek out the northwest passage. On his first voyage, he discovered an unmapped bay, which soon bore his name; Frobisher Bay, but was later on changed to Iqaluit, which is now the capital of Nunavut. The year after, he gathered a second crew to mine ore which he thought was valuable gold, but instead was a cheap and worthless ore. 1587 marked his last voyage to the region. This expedition was yet another mining focused exploration. On his third voyage, he held a celebratory feast of salt beef, biscuits, and mushy peas, as appreciation for their safe arrival in the territory we now call Nunavut. That very feast was the creation of Thanksgiving. Though, in Canada, Thanksgiving was marked as a national holiday in 1957 on the second Monday of October. In 1863, Abraham Lincoln declared the US's Thanksgiving to be on the last Thursday of November, and in 1941 it was finally given the set date countrywide.

I studied a lot to ensure this article is full of truths, but even then, I am still unsure. It's nice to see how much traditions change over the years, especially ones that have stuck around for quite a bit of time. As always, I sincerely hope you have enjoyed this article through and through, and appreciate it as much as I do. Farewell!

Indigenous Veterans' Day

Indigenous Veterans Day was first celebrated on November 8th, 1994. For a long time, the First Nations, Inuit, and Métis veterans (people who fought in wars) were not fully recognized on Remembrance Day. They faced many challenges, including learning new cultures and new languages. Why do we celebrate this day? Indigenous Veterans Day is important and separate from Remembrance Day for several reasons. It makes sure that the brave actions of Indigenous soldiers are never forgotten. Before 1994, their service was often overlooked; these days helps to correct that. For many years, Indigenous veterans were not treated fairly after returning from war. They often faced difficulties getting the same benefits as other soldiers. Indigenous people who joined the military showed incredible bravery. They left their homes and communities far behind. Many had to learn English, as it was the main language in the military. They also needed to adapt to a new way of life and culture. Despite these challenges, thousands of Indigenous people volunteered to serve and were very good at it. They served as some of the best Code Talkers (they'd use Cree as most people didn't understand it outside of their own culture), snipers, hunters, and information scouts. They fought for Canada's freedom and peace around the world, and for that, we honour them, thank them, and remember them.
