Playground supervision

The playground supervision in the morning only begins at 8:50am. Students may arrive at 8:30am for breakfast.



Playground supervision over the lunch hour is limited to lunch program students. If your child does not stay for lunch at school, please do not send them to play on the playground as there is no supervision. Please do not send your children before 1:55 PM.

After school, we clear the playground and ask that all children to “check in” with home before staying to play. Our desire is for all students to be safe.



WHY ARE PATROLS IMPORTANT?

Champlain Patrols...

- Help students get home safely
- Signal the cars to stop so students can cross the street safely
- Protect the students
- Are a visual signal to drivers that students are around
- Are role models who represent our school

Students being street smart

Does your child know how to be **street smart**? It's something we talk about in our classrooms because the safety of our students is very important. It's also a good thing to talk about at home as a regular reminder for your child.

Being street smart means knowing how to keep safe from strangers when we're alone or with other kids. Walking to school, the bus, the playground or riding your bike in your neighborhood, being street smart helps you stay **safe**.

Our school takes it very seriously when a student reports a suspicious person. In most cases, a police report is made and, sometimes, police are able to quickly interview the "suspicious" person and determine that it was a misunderstanding. At other times, however, police are required to conduct a bigger investigation of a more serious threat. We will let you know if we make a report of a suspicious person to police on behalf of one of our students because we believe that an informed community is a safer community.

Parents are encouraged to go to the *winnipeg.ca website and click on Parents – Safe Schools* to find a link called "[Be Street Smart](#)". Here you will find a list of topics to share with your child to help them be street smart and safe, including knowing:

Who are strangers?

Who needs to know where I am and why?

Why should I stick with a friend?

What are my safe spots?

What are the places that aren't safe for me?

What should I do if a stranger asks me for help?

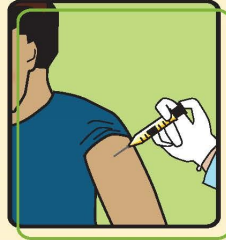
What You Can Do to Fight the Flu



1. Cover your coughs and sneezes.



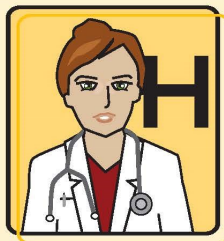
2. Wash your hands a lot.

OR

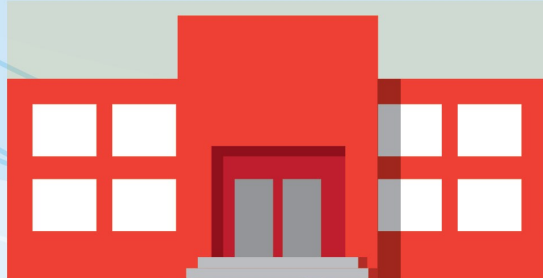


- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue.

- Wash your hands with soap and water. If soap and water are not available, hand sanitizer can be used.



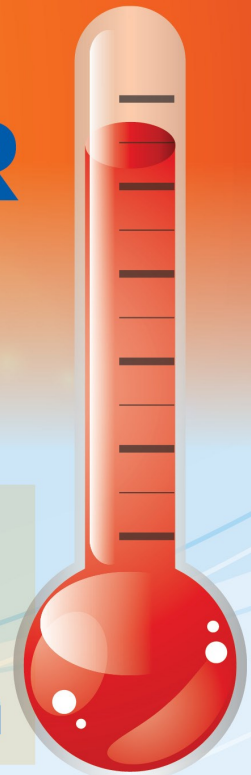
WSD SCHOOLS & HOT WEATHER

Winnipeg School Division has 78 schools, with some being the oldest school buildings in Manitoba. The average age of our school buildings is 70 years old, with 16 buildings over 100 years old.



The cost to install and make all our schools fully air conditioned is approximately

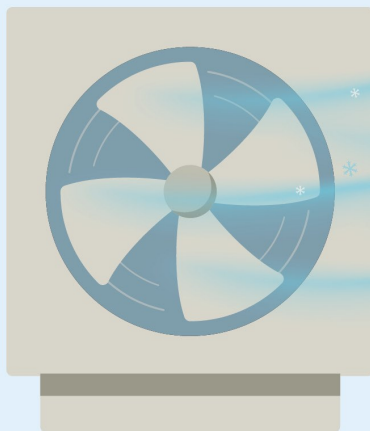
\$130 Million



- 32** facilities with full air conditioning
- 27** facilities partially air conditioned (i.e. only in modern school additions or gymnasiums).
- 19** facilities with no air conditioning



WSD includes air conditioning upgrades in our yearly 5-Year Capital Plan submissions to the Province.



Keeping students and staff cool

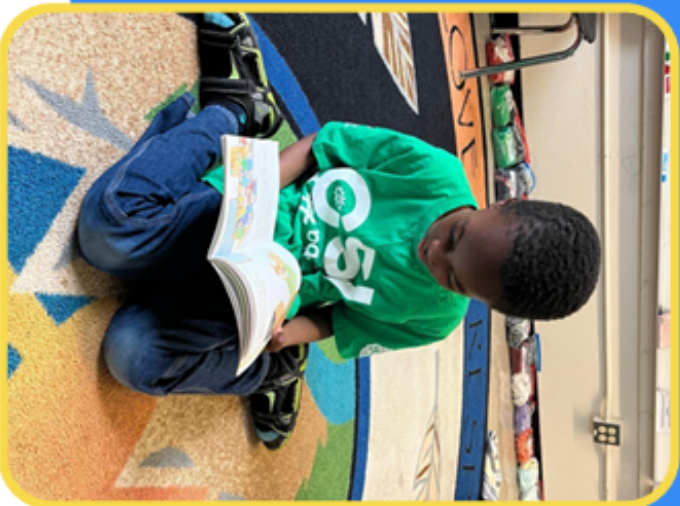
WSD implements the following techniques:

- Running ventilation systems early in the morning to cool schools before arrival
- Controlling outside air intake during the school day
- Using oscillating fans to create air movement
- Minimizing using overhead lights
- Switching off unused classroom electronics
- Closing shades to block direct sunlight
- Taking cool-down breaks between lessons
- Avoiding excess movement during midday heat
- Encouraging students and staff to stay hydrated
- Checking students and staff for heat-related health symptoms

We learned that polar bears eat seals, tiger's strips are patterns, camels can spit far, where bananas come from, and so much more!

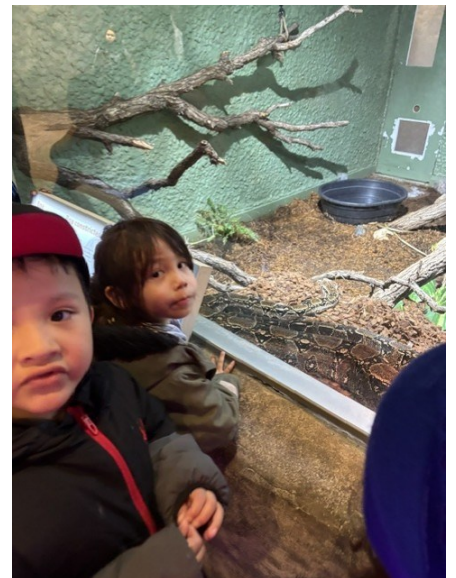

What an Amazing Year it has been! Our lovely grade 1s and 2s in Room 214 had a fun learning, they all bloomed into confident readers and writers! So proud of how hard and dedicated they are to be reading every night, great job parents and guardians for reading bedtime stories to them.

We have achieved our goal as a class. In Math, we worked on our number sense, doubling a number, half of a number, skip counting by 2s, 5s, and 10s, patterns, shapes, measurements, telling time, and problem solving using our mental math strategies. Our grade 2s can sum up numbers up to 3 digits, and also some of the grade 1s. We used multiple manipulatives and number games that made it fun and engaging for everyone to learn about numbers.

In Science, we learned about the Weather, Seasons, Air and Water, growth and changes in animals, and forces this year. Social Studies, we celebrated their identity, made sure everyone is heard, loved, and respected, we learned about the beauty of our community, 7 teachings, medicine wheel, and all about Canada. In Health class, we focused on cognitive processes, reinforcing the idea of self-identity, feelings, and teamwork. We saw growth and the capability of students to work together and strengthen the idea of belonging in our school community and celebrated Indigenous ways of learning incorporated Wahkohtowin every month and sharing circles. Our class had imagined, read, and created beautiful paintings which were based on expressing themselves, thoughts, and feelings in various forms in art class. It was an amazing year. We had a total of 4 field trips including Children's Museum, The MTPY, Assiniboine Zoo, and Morning Sound Farm! Great learning experiences and fun and good memories embedded.
