Their highlight was meeting the premier @wabber ! They left feeling inspired, empowered and grateful! Thank you to the Provincial government for giving the youth a voice.

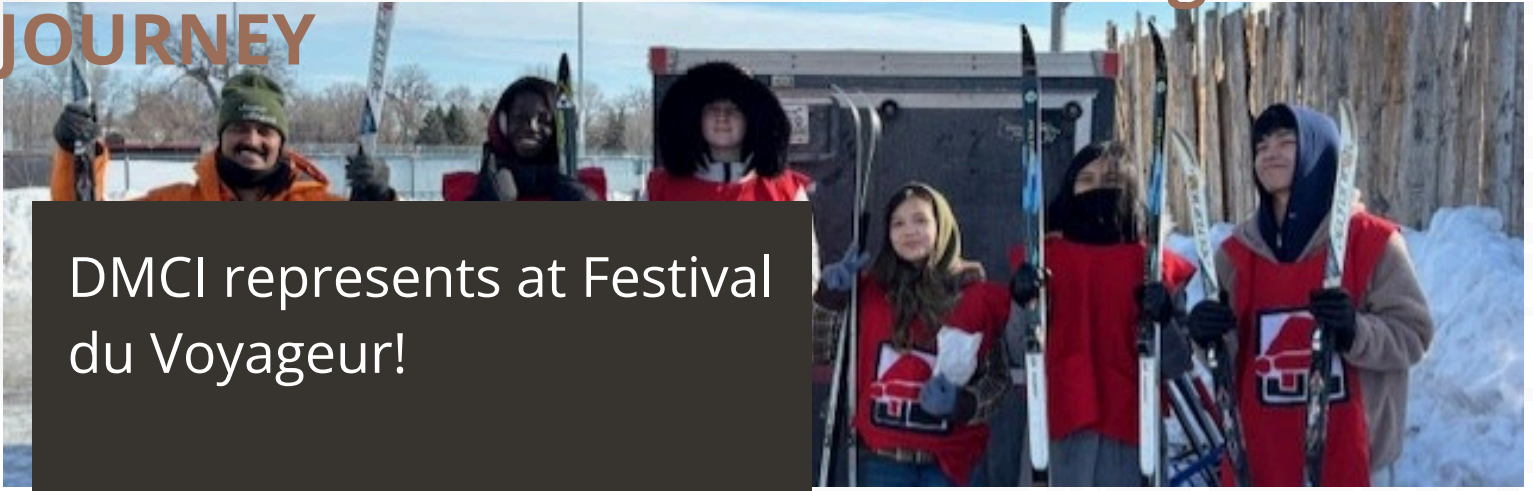

# Duke of Edinburgh



## *Beyond the Classroom*

In a world where technology is growing rapidly and screen time often replaces time spent outdoors, many essential outdoor life skills are slowly fading. Our connection to nature is becoming weaker, and with it, our understanding of the land, biodiversity, ecosystems, and environmental responsibility.

Today, students need more than academic knowledge; they need to be outdoor smart, nature smart, and environmentally responsible. They need to understand survival skills, land-based learning, stewardship of natural spaces, and the confidence to face challenges beyond the classroom.

From May 1–3, 12 DMCI students and 2 staff members took part in the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze and Silver Adventure Journey at the beautiful Epinette Trail in Spruce Woods Provincial Park. This was far more than just a camping trip, it was real-world education in its purest form.



## *Character, Culture, and Connection*

Over three days, DMCI's Duke of Edinburgh students stepped outside their comfort zones and into the wilderness, carrying full packs across demanding trails, learning map reading with a compass, navigation, survival skills, and basic first aid. They built shelters, practiced fire safety and starting campfires, prepared their own meals, managed fire watch, and responded to emergency evacuation scenarios. They also learned drone flying, adding a modern skill to their outdoor learning experience.

The journey challenged both body and mind. Students carried water like seasoned expedition members, hauled heavy loads up steep hills, and pushed through the Scottish Mile and Canadian Mile runs, activities that tested endurance, discipline, and mental strength. Beyond survival skills, students participated in scavenger hunts, cultural activities, friendship band making, and land-based learning that helped them better understand Indigenous plants, biodiversity, and environmental stewardship. They learned the importance of respecting nature, practicing "Leave No Trace" principles, and becoming protectors of the environment rather than just visitors.

Evenings were spent around the bonfire, making s'mores, sharing stories, reflecting on lessons learned, and building stronger friendships. Sleeping in cabins and tents created a true sense of adventure and self-sufficiency. Some of the best memories came from fire-making attempts that required more patience than expected, a reminder that success often comes after a few smoky failures and plenty of laughter.

It teaches problem-solving under pressure, leadership during uncertainty, teamwork when energy is low, and perseverance when the trail gets difficult. It builds resilience, confidence, and character.

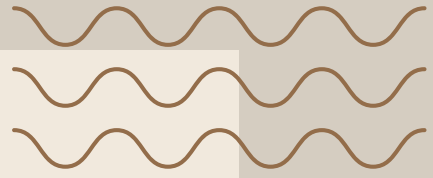
Throughout the journey, leadership appeared in quiet but powerful ways. Some students naturally took charge during navigation tasks, others supported through cooking, camp setup, and helping teammates who were struggling. Everyone contributed. Everyone grew.

What stood out most was not just the physical challenge, but the transformation in mindset. Students discovered that adventure is not about comfort, it is about courage, responsibility, discipline, and trusting both yourself and your team.

“Not everyone chooses the hard path, but those who do return stronger”.

We are incredibly proud of our DMCI students for setting such a strong example of leadership, resilience, and environmental stewardship. They did not simply complete a trip, they built character, created lifelong memories, and gained practical life skills that will stay with them far beyond the trail.

This is the true purpose of outdoor education: preparing young people not just for awards, but for life. And after three days in the woods, it is safe to say that a hot shower felt like the greatest luxury of all.

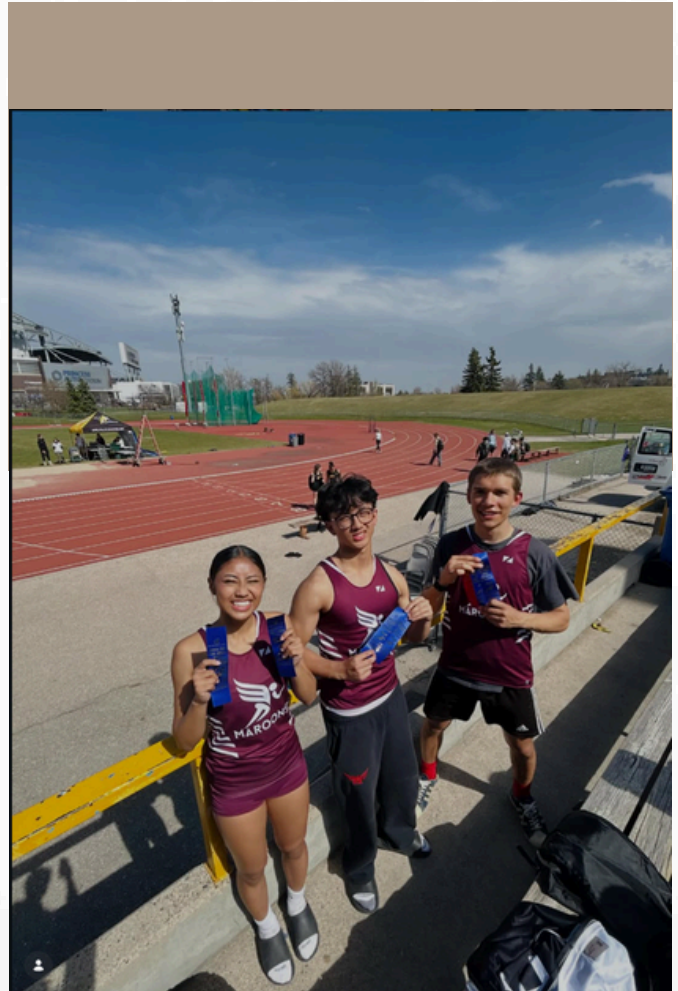

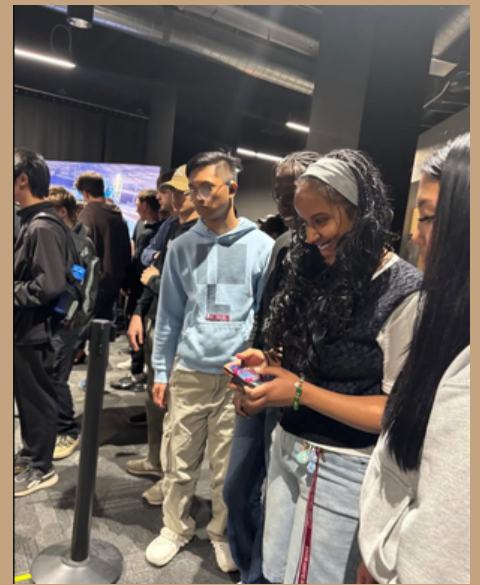


# DRONE TECHNOLOGY

# MMIWG2S+ EVENT



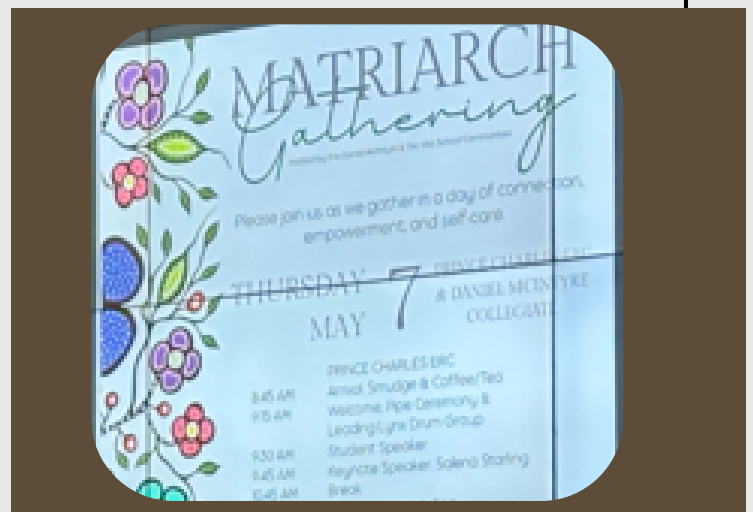

# DMCI CAFETERIA GRAND OPENING ✨



On May 20, 2026, the halls of Daniel McIntyre Collegiate Institute were filled with excitement, music, laughter, and the smell of good food as students, staff, and guests gathered to celebrate the grand opening of the newly revitalized DMCI cafeteria.

What began as a classroom idea in the Grade 12 Business program grew into a full-scale real-world project focused on improving one of the busiest and most important spaces in the school. Often called the “heart of DMCI,” the cafeteria is a place where students gather every day to eat, connect, study, laugh, and recharge. The goal of the project was simple: to create a welcoming space that students would genuinely enjoy being in.

The grand opening ceremony welcomed distinguished guests from the Winnipeg School Division Nutrition Department, Building Department, the Assistant Superintendent’s Office, along with school administration, teachers, support staff, and students from Grades 9–12.

Principal Ms. Woloschuk praised the efforts of the students and staff involved in the project and highlighted the importance of creating spaces where students feel connected, supported, and welcomed. The event also recognized the tremendous support of the cafeteria team, including Chefs Ms. Wanda and Mr. Carl, whose daily work and encouragement helped bring warmth, positivity, and community spirit to the cafeteria environment.



# UNIVERSAL NUTRITION PROGRAM

The Universal Nutrition Program (UNP) ensures that food is available to all students in every school in Winnipeg School Division, at no cost to families.

The UNP provides meals and/or snacks to students during regular school hours. It does not support food for extra-curricular activities, after-school programs, classroom events, staff, or families.

All schools in WSD must offer a daily snack and/or meal program to all students throughout the school year.

## What does “universal” mean?

“Universal” means universal access, not universal participation. Students are not required to take part, but all students must be able to access food at school without barriers, at no cost, and without showing proof of need.

This approach follows Manitoba’s Public Schools Act, Bill C-17 (“Nello’s Law”).

## Program details

The type and level of meal and/or snack service at each school depends on community need, staff capacity, kitchen facilities, budget, and divisional policy.

School administrators work with divisional and school staff to design a program that best fits their school community.

The UNP can support breakfast, lunch, and/or snacks. Food is served only during school hours and only to students.

## Informing families

School administrators must share information about their school’s UNP throughout the school year using established school communication channels such as their student handbook, website, and/or newsletter.

Schools must also regularly share menus so families can make informed decisions about participating in the program.

School administrators, food coordinators, and support staff should gather feedback from students and families through surveys, student projects, or other engagement opportunities.

## Providing safe food

Food served through the UNP must align with:

Schools are encouraged to include culturally relevant foods and dishes whenever possible.

All staff share responsibility for maintaining safe food environments and handling food in ways that reduce risk to students.

Winnipeg School Division has publicly tendered contracts with food suppliers. A UNP must purchase food only from approved vendors.

All schools are registered with Manitoba Health to operate the Universal Nutrition Program.

## Funding

UNP funding is intended to supplement a school’s existing nutrition program, if they have one. Schools can still apply for community grants such as Breakfast Club of Canada (BCC), Child Nutrition Council of Manitoba (CNCM), and others.

Community grants follow the same nutrition standards, guidelines, and processes as the UNP.
