Playground supervision

The playground supervision in the morning only begins at 8:50am. Students may arrive at 8:30am for breakfast.



Playground supervision over the lunch hour is limited to lunch program students. If your child does not stay for lunch at school, please do not send them to play on the playground as there is no supervision. Please do not send your children before 1:55 PM.

After school, we clear the playground and ask that all children to "check in" with home before staying to play. Our desire is for all students to be safe.

NURSERY/KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION

Just a reminder, registrations for Nursery and Kindergarten for 2025-26 school year are available at the office.



If your child was born in 2021, you may register them for Nursery. If your child was born in 2020, then you may register them for Kindergarten. Winnipeg School Division offers Nursery School free of charge to all residents of the Winnipeg School Division.

Residency is determined by where the parent/legal guardian lives. We will require a copy of your Manitoba Health card with your current address along with either a property tax bill, Child tax credit assessment, or tenant/rental agreement. Also, please make sure you provide a birth certificate for your child.

Safe Arrival call back system.

Reporting your child's absence? Make sure you call our Safe Arrival line
If you have already activated an account you must make the following changes

If your child is ill, or you know your child will be away for various reasons, you <u>must</u> report it by 9:00 AM through our

automated system. There are various ways to do this:

- 1. call into an automated interactive telephone system via a toll free number (1-855-278-4513),
- 2. use the mobile app
- 3. through the Safe Arrival website.
- If parents/guardians are using the Safe Arrival mobile app, they must download a new School Messenger app for Safe Arrival.
- Instructions for parents are available on the site.
- School Messenger Safe Arrival will not automatically send an invitation email to parent/guardians of new students.
- Safe Arrival web site for parents to report absences will be go.schoolmessenger.ca. ***
- The toll free number for parents to report absences will remain as 1-855-278-4513.

The system will be available 24 hours/day, 7 days a week, but you must report the absence by 9:00 AM. Future absences can be reported at any time. By reporting your child absent in advance using SafeArrival, you will NOT receive a call.

<u>Please remember, you MUST wait until the end of the call to get your confirmation number, or the system will</u> call you.

Students being street smart

Does your child know how to be **street smart**? It's something we talk about in our class-rooms because the safety of our students is very important. It's also a good thing to talk about at home as a regular reminder for your child.

Being street smart means knowing how to keep safe from strangers when we're alone or with other kids. Walking to school, the bus, the playground or riding your bike in your neighborhood, being street smart helps you stay **safe**.

Our school takes it very seriously when a student reports a suspicious person. In most cases, a police report is made and, sometimes, police are able to quickly interview the "suspicious" person and determine that it was a misunderstanding. At other times, however, police are required to conduct a bigger investigation of a more serious threat. We will let you know if we make a report of a suspicious person to police on behalf of one of our students because we believe that an informed community is a safer community.

Parents are encouraged to go to the *winnipegsd.ca website and click on Parents – Safe Schools* to find a link called <u>"Be Street Smart"</u>. Here you will find a list of topics to share with your child to help them be street smart and safe, including knowing:

Who are strangers?

Who needs to know where I am and why?

Why should I stick with a friend?

What are my safe spots?

What are the places that aren't safe for me?

What should I do if a stranger asks me for help?

Land-Based Learning

This year Champlain school is creating space to support all learners to participate and engage with **Land-based learning**. Land-based learning is an educational approach that encourages students to use the natural environment as a classroom to connect with the land, foster a deeper understanding of Indigenous cultures, and enhance wholistic well-being.

Foundational learning will be centered around Mamahtawisiwin -The Wonder We Are Born With (An Indigenous Education Policy Framework from Manitoba Government) that provides guiding principles, strategies and actions.

Learning will be outdoors at every opportunity in the school yard/field, front of the school, in/around community, in the school, and land-based field trips.

As we grow with this new learning opportunity for all students at Champlain School, the learning will be driven by seasonal changes, students' natural wonderings and curiosity, commemorative dates, and community events. Each classroom will have 30 minutes with 1 x per cycle, and further planned time for in-depth collaborative learning with the classroom teacher will be allocated.

Looking at the Winnipeg School Division Strategic Plan 2025-2030, one of the high level strategies is to seek Truth & Reconciliation by answering the Calls to Action related to the cultivation of culture, community, language, and land in our schools.

Champlain is committed to doing this heart work.

What's Happening in Room 209

It's been a wonderful start to the school year in Room 209! Our class has been busy learning, connecting, and building a strong community together. We've focused on getting to know one another, learning how to work as a team, and creating a classroom where everyone feels valued and respected.


In September, our learning centered around **Truth and Reconciliation**. Students have been exploring the history of **Residential Schools** in Canada and the impact they had on Indigenous children, families, and communities. Through stories, videos, and class discussions, we've learned why it's so important to listen, reflect, and remember. As part of **Orange Shirt Day**, students shared what "Every Child Matters" means to them and created artwork to show kindness, empathy, and respect for all children. These conversations have helped students understand that learning about the past helps us make a better, more caring future.

Building relationships has also been a big part of our classroom life. We've played team games, taken part in circle talks, and worked together on challenges that help us practice cooperation, patience, and understanding. Our class came up with shared agreements about how we want to treat one another, making sure everyone's voice is heard and everyone feels they belong.

In our day-to-day learning, we're reading stories about friendship and identity, solving math problems together, and encouraging each other to take risks and try new things. It's been amazing to see students cheer one another on and celebrate each other's successes.

As we move into the next part of the year, Room 209 will continue to focus on kindness, curiosity, and community. We're so proud of the empathy and enthusiasm our students are showing each day — it's clear that Room 209 is full of learners who care deeply about each other and the world around them.

I am excited to be part of the amazing team of educators at Champlain School. Many thanks go to the students who welcomed me with bright eyes and welcoming hearts. And of course, it has been great to begin to get to know their families too. As we start our year together, I have been struck by just how curious and engaging each student is. It is obvious that they have had a great start to their educational journey, and I look forward to being part of their lives this school year.

In the ten days I have spent with the class we have sung, danced, raced in the field, played with loads of playdough, recited our ABC many times, ran for Terry Fox Day and prepared for Orange Shirt Day. We have been reading books on kindness, courage and also Phylis Websted's book called Today is Orange Shirt Day which is an age-appropriate introduction to Residential Schools and includes a call to creating a brighter future through open hearts, kindness and the knowledge that every child matters. If you were to join us in the classroom you would hear excited squeals, a lot of off-key singing (by me!) and plenty of happy chatter as the students play and learn together. We even have Harry the Hedgehog who comes to visit when the children are especially attentive. (Don't wor-

In the month to come we will solidify our daily routines and add some new activities like leaf hunting, line dancing and dinosaur research as well as begin to explore the Seven Sacred Teachings. We will observe the changes in our environment by getting outside to pay close attention to the leaves on the trees (and the ground!) so that our artwork can capture the Fall season.

It is a joy to see each class member each day, and I look forward to sharing more with you about what I notice in their learning journey.

Winnipeg School Division Cold Weather Guidelines



Here are some guidelines in order to help you during the winter season when your child is getting ready for school.

Check the wind chill before going outdoors in the winter, and individuals are to make sure they are well prepared for the weather. Even moderate wind chill values can be dangerous if individuals are outside for long periods.

Wind Chill	Risk of Frostbite	Other Health concerns	What to Do
0-9	LOW	Slight increase in discomfort	Dress warmly, with the outside temperature in mind Stay dry.
-10 to-2	LOW	Uncomfortable Risk of hypothermia if outside for long periods without ade- quate protection.	Dress in layers of warm clothing with an outer layer that is wind resistant. Wear a hat, mittens or insulated gloves, a scarf or neck warmer and waterproof footwear
-28-39 INDOOR RECESS	RISK: Exposed skin can freeze in 10-30 minutes.	Risk of frostbite Risk of hypothermia	Dress in layers of warm clothing with an outer layer that is wind resistant. Wear a hat, mittens or insulated gloves, a scarf or neck warmer and waterproof footwear Stay active.
-40-47 INDOOR RECESS	HIGH RISK: exposed skin can freeze in 5-10 minutes	High risk of frostbite. Risk of hypothermia is outside for long periods of time without adequate clothing or shelter.	Dress in layers of warm clothing with an outer layer that is wind resistant. Wear a hat, mittens or insulated gloves, a scarf or neck warmer and waterproof footwear Stay active. Cover all exposed skin.

Guidance corner



Why is Sleep so Important?

Sleep is so important for all people, but especially for school age children and adolescents. Sleep helps us solve problems, react quickly, form memories, and learn. Children who do not get enough sleep have a more difficult time focusing and regulating their behaviours the next day.

How much Sleep does my Child need?

Children ages 3 -5 need between 10 and 13 hours of sleep per night. Children ages 6 - 12 need between 9 - 12 hours of sleep per night.

When should Children stop using screens before bed?

In order to allow the mind to settle and be ready for sleep, it is advised that screens are avoided 30 minutes before planning to go to sleep. Reading, drawing or listening to music and audio books are activities which will help prepare your child for sleeping.

The changing sounds of the TV, tablet or video game, even at a low volume, can break up the quality of sleep. Programs will keep kids interested and their minds will have a hard time letting go to relax, and may even lead to nightmares.
