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ABOUT OUR SCHOOL



Daniel McIntyre Collegiate Institute (DMCI) in Winnipeg's West End offers all courses required for a Manitoba High School diploma. The school population of approximately 1038 students is multicultural and diverse and offers students a positive and inclusive learning environment supporting all backgrounds and needs. DMCI offers an extensive selection of academic courses including Advanced Placement courses. Our Advanced Placement Program includes the international accredited AP Capstone program, a first in Manitoba. DMCI also has a long history in Visual and Performing Arts including a renowned music and dance program, a thriving place for student expression. This was evident in their many performances within the school and the City. For instance, in this year's production of "Sister's Act", "Concert in the Quad" and "Melody and Movement" students were shining stars as the community watched in awe. In addition, a variety of optional courses are offered in Industrial Arts, Home Economics, Social Science, Business Education, Graphics and Information and Communication Technology.

DMCI also has an expansive Medical Professionals Program with partnerships that include WRHA, Pan Am Clinic, St., Boniface Research Center and a variety of private medical practices. Students in this program focus on physiology, human anatomy and medical research. Medical examinations and surgery techniques are explored in their second and third year. In addition, students become certified in First Aid/CPR and explore multiple career options in the medical field through these practical experiences. DMCI Maroon Athletics has long since been a source of pride in the West End. Our successful athletic traditions continue with students being able to participate in a wide variety of extracurricular sports at a highly competitive level. This included multiple top 10 rankings, as well as appearances in Provincial tournaments. We are very proud of the efforts of our committed staff and coaches in making students' connections and passion for athletics a priority in our school community. DMCI continues to offer the students exciting and inclusive opportunities to expand their understanding and skills within the school and the community in preparation for wherever their path may take them. 

National Day of Truth & Reconciliation

National Truth Day for and Reconciliation - September 26, 2024 On a sunny Thursday, September 26, the whole school came together to commemorate the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. The day was led by students who shared facts about the Residential School System. Our Indigenous drum group, Oshkii Ogitichedaa, Young Warriors, shared honour songs. They were joined by Dwayne Gladue and Melvin Starr, leaders and themselves drum survivors. Later, the drummers were joined by hand-drummers from the DMCI band and together they led a traditional round dance. Other activities were led by teachers that acknowledged various aspects of the day, including rock painting, fence ribbon art, orange shirt commitments, and orange ribbon pins. Students from neighbouring schools joined us to participate. The DMCI teepee was raised to be used as a quiet space for people to reflect. The day ended with a feast for the students.

Indigenous Veterans' Day / Remembrance Day - November 8, 2024

On November 8, DMCI recognized Remembrance Day, and Indigenous Veterans' Day with a ceremony in the gym, attended by the whole school. The Indigenous drum group played an honour song and students spoke about Indigenous and Manitoba contributions to the war efforts in Korea and World War II. DMCI band and choir also performed, with Grade 12 student Melwin Agravante playing Taps and Reveille. Students also shared poems, videos, and Grade 11 student, Trayden Maple spoke in Anishinabemowin. DMCI student cadets, Cayden Gillies and Jaden Tayag were honour bearers of the Canadian and Manitoba flags.



Black History Month - February 2025

For Black History month, a display of African cultural items was set up at the front of the school. Daily films focusing on the Black experience were presented in classrooms for students to view. Each day there was an announcement sharing information about a Black Canadian and the contributions made to science, the arts, literature, medicine, and government. Each Friday, our cafeteria, B&B Cafe, offered African based cuisine to students and staff. The Gordon Bell High School African Drum Group came to DMCI and shared their music with our EAL students. Our students were given an opportunity to try playing the djembe and the DMCI choir sang an African song.

RED DRESS DAY - MAY 5th 2025

National Day of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls also known as Red Dress Day, was May 5. This day honoured the thousands of missing and murdered Indigenous women, girls, 2 spirit, and gender diverse people in Canada by encouraging learning and building awareness to end violence against Indigenous women, girls, 2 spirit, and gender diverse people. DMCI is committed to answering Calls to Action 41(i), and (ii), and to begin the path of restoring broken relationships through the conduit of education. The whole school walked in solidarity. The intent was to bring awareness to the community about The National Week for honouring and remembering Missing Murdered Indigenous Women, Girls and Relatives. Our drummers sang an honour song and we offered smudge for those present.

HEALTH & WELLNESS COMMUNITY OF PRACTICE

DMCI's Health and Wellness Community of Practice in 2024/25 emphasized school community building and mindfulness opportunities, while providing time management awareness strategies to students. By focusing on a strong, in-school community building opportunity in the first week of school students were able to connect with students and staff exploring the extracurriculars that DMCI has to offer. Throughout the year, students had access to mental health and wellness community resources through the school monitors, in addition to the resources offered through student services. Almost 50 students were involved in the show, including singers, actors, dancers, stagehands, stage managers, lighting crew, sound crew, art department, hair and makeup artists, and more. The students worked diligently for four months to pull the show together, and their hard work and talent shone on stage through their heartfelt performances. Bravo to everyone involved!
DMCI's Young Warriors Traditional Drum Group	In just over a year, a dedicated group of students have come a long way as a traditional drum group. Since their first official performance at the Canada Life Centre in front of an audience of 3,000 +, the Young Warriors have been in high demand and have showcased their talents and hard work for events all over the city. Locations include various high schools and community centers, Aviation Museum, Victoria Inn, Holiday Inn, and WSD Powwow. In addition, the drum group has participated in community building events such as teaching K-5 students and walking with the Bear Clan, singing and giving out food to the homeless. One of this years' highlights will be drumming at the Graduation ceremony in June.

POWERFUL CULTURAL JOURNEY

Masen, a Grade 10 student at DMCI, reflects on his transformation: "At the start of the Young Warriors drum group, I was scared about performing in front of people, but then the other drummers helped me to be comfortable and proud to be a part of this group. Drumming has made my stress and anxiety much better. I shouldn't be worried about singing in front of others; I need to let my voice be heard, and I feel proud to be here."

Grade 12 DMCI student, Trayden shares the deeper meaning: "Being a part of a traditional drum group has built my confidence in singing and practicing my cultural traditions. Drumming supports me by making me feel like I'm encouraging other Indigenous students to be a part of their culture and reclaim some of the traditions we lost."

"I have always been involved in my culture since I was a kid. I feel proud to share our culture with others who are not familiar or who have not grown up in our traditions," said Cory, a DMCI student,

The drumming group represents more than musical ensembles. They are a powerful vehicle for cultural preservation, personal development, and community healing. By providing students with opportunities to learn, perform, and connect with their heritage, the Winnipeg School Division is supporting a profound journey of cultural revitalization.

The drumming group "Oshkii Ogitichedaa" continues to inspire, educate, and connect—one drumbeat at a time.

On March 12, 2025, DMCI's Young Warriors Traditional Drum group performed at the Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs. The purpose of this event was to showcase Indigenous culture and specifically, how traditional Pow Wows are conducted. DMCI students displayed their talents in front of an audience of community members from various cultures around the Portage Avenue area. Below is DMCI's Cory K proudly dressed in traditional regalia, leading a men's traditional dance for a Pow Wow's Grand Entry. BEAR CLAN WALK OF GENEROSITY

In collaboration with approximately 70+ students from other schools, a few students volunteered on Wednesday, March 26th, to serve food on the street to struggling pedestrians. The day began with an Indigenous teaching on the importance of generosity, followed by students making bagged lunches, and finally, walking the streets near Portage Avenue with the Bear Clan, serving food to local members of the community.





DMCI'S MEDICAL PROFESSIONALS PROGRAM (MPP)

Several students volunteered in numerous capacities at the Children's Hospital Foundation's Teddy Bears' Picnic on Sunday, Sept. 8th. The event featured more than 20 activity tents, including the Dr. Goodbear Clinic put on by frontline staff from HSC Children's Hospital, where kids' teddy bears are triaged and go through a variety of medical tests and treatments including MRIs, X-rays, and casting.





Discovery Days AT THE Health Sciences

A large group of twenty-seven grade 12 students took advantage of an amazing opportunity to attend the Canadian Medical Hall of Fame "Discovery Days in Health Sciences" on Thursday, Nov. 7th at the University of Manitoba Bannatyne Campus.


The event provided students with the opportunity to explore a variety of career options in medicine and the health sciences. They gained a clearer picture of what it would be like to be a health professional by interacting with researchers, clinicians and educators in their real-life work setting.





MEDICAL PROFESSIONALS PROGRAM - STUDENTS AT THE INNER-CITY SCIENCE CENTER - GMO LAB

Students had the opportunity to complete laboratory activities on genetically modified organisms at the Inner-City Science Centre on November 20th and 21st. This included being mentored by a few University of Manitoba graduate students. They were engaged in a complete investigation in which they analyzed sample food items, extracting DNA from the samples, amplifying the DNA using polymerase chain reaction (PCR), and using agarose gel electrophoresis to determine if the food has been genetically modified.





MEDICAL PROFESSIONALS PROGRAM - STUDENTS AT THE RED RIVER COLLEGE -ASL BIOTECHNOLOGY PROGRAM

Fourteen students have been completing the "After School Leaders – Biotechnology Program" at Red River College every Tuesday and Thursday evening from October 10th to November 28th. During these 90 hours of learning, the program has provided the students with hands–on opportunities to explore fun facts of science and biotechnology. Aside from gaining technical experience, students also developed personal skills like time management, following directions, and working collaboratively in a group. The program concludes with a graduation ceremony, where the students present their experimental results and receive a certificate.





MEDICAL PROFESSIONALS PROGRAM - INTERNATIONAL MEDICAL SCHOOL FAIR

Many students attended the International Medical School Fair at the University of Winnipeg on November 18th. The event provided the opportunity to meet with admissions advisors from across the globe and learn about their different programs, campus life, and application process.



ST. BONIFACE RESEARCH CENTRE YOUTH BIOLAB

Two grade 10 students took part in activities over 4 full days in a two-week period in November at the Youth BlOlab located in the Albrechtsen Research Centre at St. Boniface Hospital. Students had the opportunity to experience how research scientists approach heart disease, stroke, Alzheimer's disease, diabetes and a host of other complicated problems through physiology and molecular and cellular biology.



DMCI'S SOCIAL STUDIES DEPARTMENT

The Geography students of DMCI attended a morning at the Bruce D. Campbell Farm and Food Discovery Centre in May. The field trip gave students an opportunity to see up close the inner workings of a research farm and learned more about how food is processed before it makes it to their table. The event was equal parts of fun and education, as students toured the farm, learned about the different treatment of animals and even prepared their own muffins as a tasty treat.











DMCI'S VISUAL ART PROGRAM

On June 2nd and 3rd, five DMCI art students were selected to participate in the WSD's second annual Senior High Arts celebration at the Quamajuq Winnipeg Art Gallery. On the first day, the students, along with their Visual Arts teacher and high school students from across the division, were introduced to Takashi Iwasaki, a Winnipeg (West End!) artist, who started off the celebration with an artist's talk. We then toured his exhibition at the nearby Plug In Institute of Contemporary Art, before heading back to the WAG and being taught by Takashi how to embroider. We all designed out our ideas and then got straight to work, with a pizza lunch to give us energy to focus on our creations for the remainder of the day. Day two consisted of more intense embroidering alongside Takashi, another pizza lunch, a tour of the WAG, and then a gallery walk of all our work to celebrate all that we accomplished together over the past two days. It was a wonderful way mark the end of another successful artmaking schoolyear!
