MESSAGE FROM ADMINISTRATION

Spring Break is in the rearview mirror, and we are headed toward the final stretch of the school year. It has been incredibly busy for students, families, and staff, with more to come over the next three months. Kelvin students have had the opportunity to celebrate many successes, and we look forward to what's next.

There are so many highlights that it is impossible to recognize all of them in this space. Students are engaged in meaningful learning and community building every day. We have witnessed student success at the Ethics Bowl (repeat champions!), Indoor Track and Field, basketball, flag football, and soccer, to name just a few. Students are also sharing their learning in powerful ways—from NorthSTAR students presenting polar bear research in Calgary at the ArcticNet Conference and the University of Manitoba, to students launching Kelvin's Aerospace Club (very cool). Our MCEP students continue their learning at Pan Am Clinic and St. Boniface Hospital, and French Immersion students showcased their language skills through Kelvin's version of Dragon's Den.

Student inquiry and learning do not stop at 9:00–3:30 at Kelvin. It happens early in the morning and extends into the evening. Kelvin students have been actively engaged in the community, supporting the Mulvey School skating program at the Winter Club, attending Shakespeare in the Snow at Camp Cedarwood, and participating in ice fishing on Lake Winnipeg and the Red River. Students also travelled with the Kelvin Band to Brandon, and EAL students had the opportunity to skate and ski at Camp Manitou; thank you to the Boys Hockey team for their support. Over Spring Break, Ms. Cerqueira and Mr. Brown led a group of students on a whirlwind tour of Italy and Greece. Looking ahead, our VPA trip to Banff and Calgary will take place in early April with Ms. Brown and the Visual and Performing Arts team. Providing students with opportunities to explore and apply their learning in the community helps strengthen student voice and citizenship.

We have seen many concerning events in our community and around the world over the past several months. The students and staff of École secondaire Kelvin High School are recommitting to ensuring that our school remains a safe and inclusive place for all. Students continue to build community through activities led by Student Council, including the Kelvin Be Kind Campaign, Cultural Day, and an engaging Spirit Week, all of which create opportunities for connection, understanding, and shared perspectives. Many students also participated in the Holocaust and Human Rights Symposium on the morning of March 12. In addition, our Humanities teachers engaged in professional development to support the implementation of Holocaust education in Grade 9 and Grade 11 courses. Our goal is to provide students with the knowledge and experiences needed to become informed global citizens and critical thinkers who use their voice in their communities and beyond.

As always, thank you to all parents and caregivers for your continued support. We look forward to connecting with you at upcoming school events between now and the end of June. CANADIAN MUSIC SHOWDOWN: PAUL ANKA FOR THE WIN!

Students in Mr. Campbell's class, dove into a Canadian identity unit exploring the role of the CRTC and how regulations shape Canadian media content. As part of their learning, students highlighted iconic Canadian songs such as Ironic (Alanis Morissette), Summer of '69 (Bryan Adams), If I Had a Million Dollars (Barenaked Ladies), Hallelujah (Leonard Cohen), Blinding Lights (The Weekend), and Call Me Maybe (Carly Rae Jepsen), reflecting on how Canadian artists have shaped our cultural identity across generations.

To bring the unit to life, Mr. Campbell also hosted a Canadian music round-robin challenge, where students competed to identify and celebrate Canadian hits. After a lively showdown, Paul Anka's Put Your Head on My Shoulder claimed the top spot!

HEHO BONNE FESTIVAL!

Kelvin students volunteered at Festival du Voyageur, guiding students from Manitoba around Fort Gibraltar and sharing insights about the 1815 Northwest Company voyageurs. They donned historical costumes and engaged visitors with fascinating stories about the food and travel of the era. In the playground, they managed activities like tube slides and gained valuable experience by supervising enthusiastic younger students eager to enjoy the beautiful weather.



They explored the festival's rich history, delving into the Festi-museum, which showcases a variety of intriguing and quirky posters, ads, and videos from past festivals. After a quick study, they helped children discover the 57-year history of Festival du Voyageur.

At the Sugar Shack, students embraced their artistic side by face painting and teaching children voyageur board games, creating a lively atmosphere during lunch. On Sunday, they assisted in Tente Riviere Rouge with robotics projects, offering children playtime while parents enjoyed performances by Al Simmons and other artists. The students had a wonderful experience and look forward to volunteering again next year.

BIG QUESTIONS, THOUGHTFUL ANSWERS

Kelvin students delivered an impressive performance at the Manitoba High School Ethics Bowl, held February 20–21st at the University of Manitoba.

Kelvin was one of the only schools to enter two teams, Team Socrates and Team Plato, highlighting the strong interest and commitment of students involved. In total, 21 teams from across Manitoba competed. Team Socrates placed first after a compelling final round discussion on public discourse and student journalism. While Team Plato did not advance past the first day, they demonstrated strong perseverance and growth throughout their preparation and competition experience.

In preparation for the competition, students met regularly since September, working through 12 different ethical cases. This process involved extensive research, discussion, and collaboration, for these students who have dedicated significant time outside of class to develop and refine their thinking.

The Ethics Bowl is a province-wide academic event where students explore complex, real-world ethical issues, with a focus on critical thinking, collaboration, and respectful engagement with diverse perspectives. This achievement reflects months of dedication, teamwork, and thoughtful inquiry from Kelvin students. Team Socrates is currently preparing for Nationals at the Canadian Museum of Human Rights April 24th - 25th, 2026.

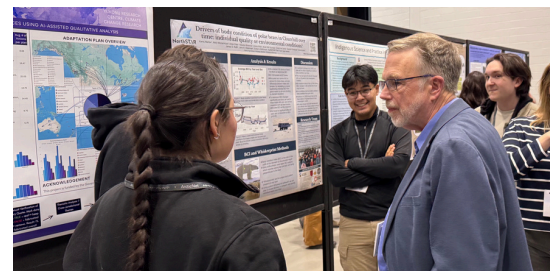


ARCTICNET SCIENTIFIC CONFERENCE

As part of the NorthSTAR (Northern Student-led Arctic Research) program, students travelled to the ArcticNet ASM2025 in Calgary to present “Drivers of body condition of polar bears in Churchill over time: individual quality or environmental conditions?”. Students confidentially talked about their results, fielded questions about their work, and took suggestions on next steps from interested professors.

The highlight of the ArcticNet conference for me was presenting our own research. During our time at ArcticNet we had two poster sessions over two days in which members of our research team talked to people like university students, professors and researchers. This conference brings together wildlife professionals, university students and researchers to share knowledge and strategies to ensure the resilience of wildlife populations in this time of unprecedented challenges.

The students presented their current research in a poster entitled: “Does sea ice break up date affect polar bear body condition measured non-invasively?”

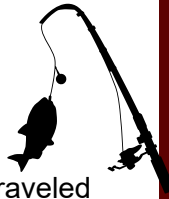
KELVIN MENTORS JUDGE RIVER HEIGHTS SCIENCE FAIR

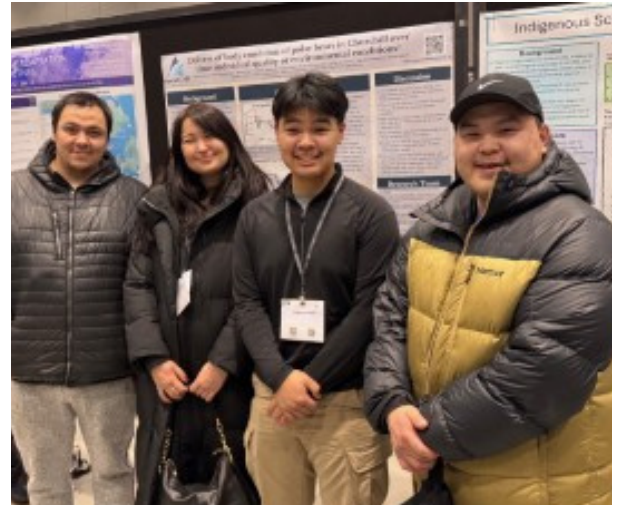


KELVIN ANGLERS FISHING SUCCESS

KANIQ REPRESENTS INUIT YOUTH AT THE NUNAVUT INUIT STRATEGY ON RESEARCH WORKSHOP IN CALGARY



Kaniq Allerton has been studying polar bears for the past two years and recently travelled to Calgary to present at the ArcticNet conference with the NorthSTAR (Northern Student-led Arctic Research) student group. Because of his involvement in this program, Kaniq was invited to be the youth representative at a workshop focusing on long-term research strategy for Nunavut.

“Nunavut Tunngavik Inc. (NTI) held the Nunavut Inuit Strategy on Research (NISR) workshop at the ArcticNet Conference on Treaty 7, in Calgary for Nunavut Inuit post-secondary students, Nunavut researchers, and other research support workers. As an Inuk from Iqaluit, Nunavut nanuq (polar bear) researcher I was invited to attend the workshop along with Inuit from all 3 regions of Nunavut (Qikiqtaaluk, Kivalliq, and Kitikmeot) and urban Inuit from Calgary. We discussed conducting research in Nunavut along with what can Inuit do and to continue to do moving forward within research. One Elder from Iqaluktuuttiaq (Cambridge Bay) suggested that Inuit of all ages (youth, adults, elders) should be part of research. It was a pleasure participating at the NISR workshop and I was happy to contribute from my part.”

STUDENTS HELPING STUDENTS

The Mentor–Grade 9 Study Hall, held in January, was a great success, with strong student attendance and engagement. This initiative was designed to support Grade 9 students in preparing for exams, providing a consistent space for review and mentorship during the January 12–23 exam period. Sessions ran daily at lunch in Rooms 56 and 61. Thank you to all Grade 9 teachers for encouraging students to participate, and to Ms. Devos for generously sharing her classroom space.



KELVIN STUDENTS TACKLE REAL-LIFE ISSUES WITH SCIENCE INQUIRY LABS

Kelvin Chemistry, Physics and Biology students have been designing and performing their own experiments. This inquiry approach to lab work has motivated the students to do an in-depth study of a topic of their choice as they designed, problem-solved, analyzed, verified, and finally presented their results in a month-long project.

Energy was the focus for some students who tried to increase the efficiency of a homemade electrochemical cell battery. Others figured out the best way to electroplate copper. Environment and sustainability was the topic for those testing the effect of changing temperature on the oxygen levels of the water. Some students looked at health and food storage by testing the effect of temperature on milk or the degradation of vitamin C over extended time and increased temperatures.

Whether the topic was the solubility trends of alkali salts, or the temperature dependence of the pKa of a weak acid equilibrium, or how to increase the rate of a chemiluminescent reaction, the focus was on discovery using the scientific method. Throughout the process the students learned to address challenges, trouble shoot inconsistencies, understand uncertainties, and then finally analyze the data and present their results.



HOLOCAUST SYMPOSIUM

On Thursday, March 12th approximately 200 students from across all grade levels had a once in a lifetime opportunity to hear a Holocaust Survivor speak.

Pinchas Gutter was born on July 21, 1932, in Lodz, Poland and grew up in a Hasidic Jewish family with his twin sister Sabina. After the Nazi invasion of Poland in 1939, his family moved to Warsaw and were later forced into the Warsaw Ghetto, hiding during the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising in 1943. They were eventually captured and sent to Majdanek concentration camp, where his parents and sister were murdered, and Pinchas was transferred through several forced labour and concentration camps.

He survived a death march to Theresienstadt Ghetto, where he was liberated by the Red Army in May 1945. After the war he lived in the United Kingdom, Israel, and South Africa before immigrating to Canada in 1985, where he later shared his story as a Holocaust educator.

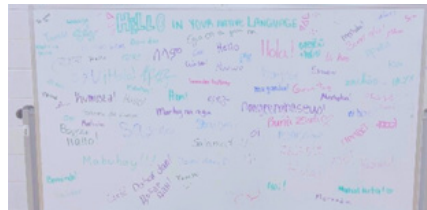

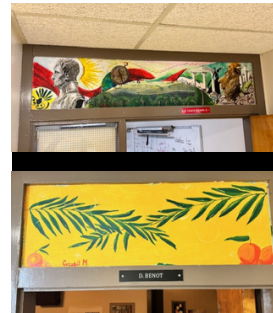
The event created a welcoming space for connection, reflection, and celebration, and was made possible through the participation and enthusiasm of students and staff.

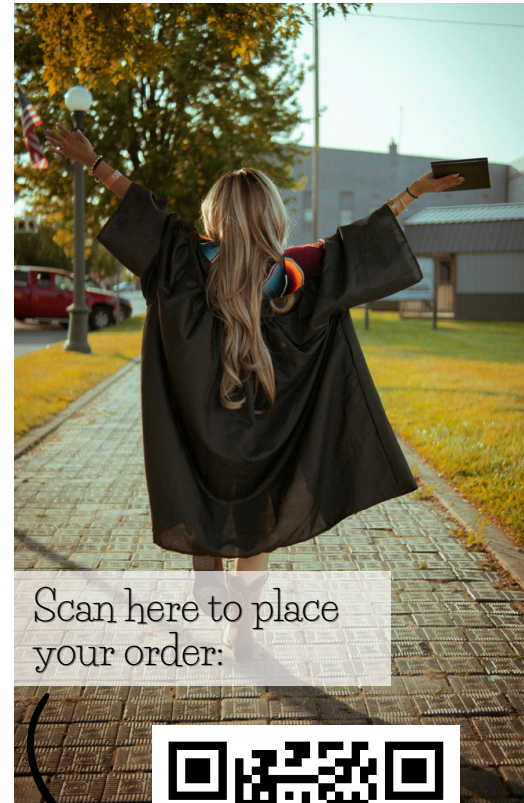
CAP AND GOWN RENTAL INFORMATION

As we settle into the second semester of the school year, preparations for graduation celebrations are well underway. Part of these preparations include plans for a traditional convocation ceremony at the University of Winnipeg on Thursday, June 25th at 4pm.

To participate in this event, students must be outfitted with a Cap and Gown Rental at \$40.00 per graduate. This fee includes the black gown and red stole rental, as well as a cap and tassel for the graduate to keep as a souvenir. Cap and gown combinations will be distributed ahead of the ceremony on Monday, June 22nd, and returned immediately after the graduation ceremony on Thursday, June 25th.

To order using the online payment method, please note that there is a \$2.60 service charge added to the \$40.00 rental fee. Alternatively, payment can be made in person with cash or cheque payable to Kelvin High School, and submitted to our guidance clerk, in the guidance office. Regardless of payment method, the order form must still be completed online.

Please note that gown sizes are based on height. To ensure the correct fit, be prepared to select the gown size that corresponds with the graduate's height using the sizing chart below.

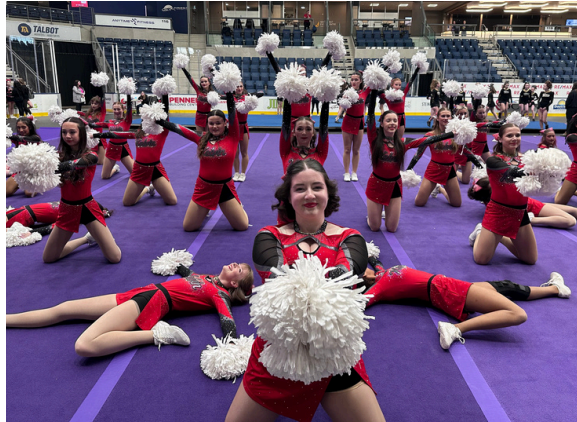

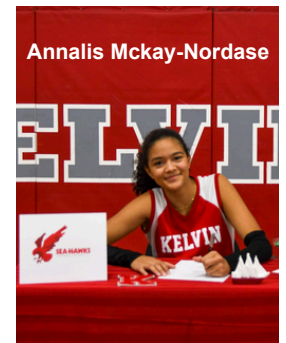
