SUMMARY OF DISCUSSIONS – Wednesday, February 16, 2022

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF INDIGENOUS PEOPLES OF CANADA

Committee members were informed that the meeting of the Central District Advisory Committee is take place Treaty One Land and the traditional homeland of the Red River Metis.

2. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Committee members approved the agenda of February 16, 2022, as distributed.

3. 2022/2023 DRAFT BUDGET

The Secretary-Treasurer/CFO was in attendance and provided an overview of the Draft Budget for the 2022/2023 school year.

Committee members were informed that last year the Board of Trustees approved the 2021/2022 Budget in the amount of \$421,039,400. Committee members were informed that the Division was forced to make reductions of \$4,457,395 for programs and services due to a drop in provincial funding of 1.6 percent or \$2,926,520. This also included the direction from the provincial government to freeze the at property tax levies at 2020 levels.

Committee members were informed the Board of Trustees is proposing a budget of \$437,118,200. The baseline funding has decreased by 1.3 percent, or \$2,325,538, while one-time funding of \$13,217,517 has been provided for next year and property tax levies for education will remain frozen at 2020 levels. Committee members were informed that one-time funding for 2022/2023 is intended to cover collective agreement settlements and additional costs related to pandemic staffing. Committee members were informed that the draft budget proposes no additions for 2022/2023 and no further reductions.

Committee members were informed that a large portion of the budget is determined by student enrolment numbers each year. The Province acknowledged that the lower student enrolment was related to the pandemic and implemented a hybrid enrolment calculation that was higher than then actual student enrolment numbers. Committee members were informed that even with the hybrid calculation funding for the division resulted in a 3.14 percent or approximately \$13,700,000 deficit. However, the one-time funding of approximately \$13,000,000 provided by the province, and the ending of the pilot Full-Day Kindergarten program, provided sufficient funding to offset deficit.

Committee members were informed that although the hybrid enrolment calculation and the one-time funding from the province has assisted in balancing the budget for this year, future budgets are still at risk without additional funding for education.

Committee members were encouraged to share their input on the 2022/2023 Draft Budget by email, in writing, or by registering to appear virtually as a delegation to the Board of Trustees at the February 28, 2022, Special Meeting.

4. ENQUIRIES AND ANNOUNCEMENTS AND SCHOOL REPORTS

The Committee member from Daniel McIntyre Collegiate provided a verbal report and informed Committee members that the school had been using a quad-semester system through the pandemic which allowed for a reduced subject load and longer class time, which provided

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additional time for teachers to offer support to students. The school will be returning to the traditional two-semester system for the new school year. Committee members were also informed that the student council of Daniel McIntyre has provided 67 hours of community service since the beginning of the school year. Students in the home economics program engaged in a gingerbread making competition which was also entered in the skills Manitoba competition. Students of Daniel McIntyre have also had their spirits lifted not only by the social media efforts of the student council, but also with the reinstitution of sports programming in the school.

The Committee member from Cecil Rhodes School along with administration from the school informed Committee members that the renaming of Cecil Rhodes is underway. Students are actively participating with creative suggestions such as Unicorn School, Clubhouse School, and Sparkling Waters School, etc. Prior to Spring Break the school will host a virtual assembly where each classroom will present a name for consideration. The school will then submit their recommendations to the Renaming Committee to bring forward to the Board of Trustees for consideration.

The administration from Elmwood School informed Committee members that students have been enjoying activities through the afterschool leaders and the Youth United. The school has also been creating care packages for families in need in lieu of hosting the annual Newcomer dinner at the school. Students from Elmwood have also been working with Dr. Ling at the University of Manitoba measuring plastic. The students have been very excited for the reinstitution of sports programing in the school.

The Committee member from Wolseley School along with the administration from the school informed Committee members that Wolseley School will be celebrating its 100 year anniversary this year. The school is working with a local artist to create a mural to commemorate its centennial. The school will also be collaborating with the dance team at the school as part of the celebration.

Central District Advisory Council School Report February 2022

Principal Sparling continues to support the academic, physical, and mental health of our students. Our attendance rate over the past few months has averaged 84%! Student attendance continues to be important not only for learning but also for mental health as friendships and routine produce positive outcomes.

We had a Holiday Sale for the Children prior to the Winter Break. With all safety measures in place, students happily shopped for presents to celebrate the season.

Our "Wonderful Winter" presentation was provided using a private video link and shared with families through messenger. Analytics show that there were 297 views with 186 individual viewers. On average, each person viewed the video twice. This lets us know the majority of our community watched the children celebrate their learning!

Further promoting the spirit of Principal Sparling School, we hosted an apparel fundraiser through Keener Jerseys promoting the school through t-shirts, hoodies, sweats, toques and facemasks.

We continue to expand our knowledge and understanding of Indigenous Culture by further learning about smudging. Currently six of our ten classrooms smudge with the children. Smudging has been used to calm any anxiety children (and adults) feel and prepare to learn for the day. We find this mindful exercise has assisted students to be more focused during learning.

We are encouraging parents to focus on comprehension by having children think beyond the text during Home Reading. This further supports one of our school priorities reflected in our Continuous Improvement Plan.

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School Culture

Students and staff participated in a whole school activity to commemorate Remembrance Day. Classroom work and projects dedicated to the theme of Remembrance Day was digitally collected and compiled to create a video that was shown to all classes that fostered many rich discussions. The amazing work and effort it took by all really brought a unique experience to the presentation.



I Love to Read Month at Sargent Park began Tuesday, February 1st. It is a month-long celebration to encourage reading, writing and sharing in the joy of literacy. Our theme this year is "Reading is Everywhere!" This theme encourages readers to try new books and take part in engaging activities. Students sharing their love of reading at home by trying to complete a reading activity each day of the month. At school, students are participating in a Book Bingo, guessing games, and reading activities. The students will also be asked to always have a book with them and be prepared to read throughout the school day. Many of the activities are adapted to work with our current learning situation. As such, our theme of "Reading is Everywhere!" was also chosen to help inspire and encourage students during these unusual times to reach out, step up and stay positive.

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Academics

Grades 4, 5 and 6 students across Canada were invited to submit a poem or essay explaining what home means to them. The Meaning of Home contest, in support of Habitat for Humanity, was a great opportunity for students to learn about giving back to their community and the importance of having a safe home while improving their creative writing skills and raising money for their local Habitat organization. Each submission entered in the contest provides our local Habitat with a \$10 donation to help build safe and affordable homes for families in the community. The contest is an activity that students will see as meaningful. It will challenge them to think creatively about a topic that directly impacts their lives—the meaning of home—and ultimately improve their writing skills. Sargent Park grade 4, 5 and 6 students all participated in the contest and have submitted their writing pieces

The grade 8 students took travel and learning to the next level by taking a virtual field trip to the Lascaux Cave II in France. Students engaged in a cross-curricular activity combining a myth written by the students with a cave drawing using the inspiration from their trip. The Myth had to explain a phenomenon in nature. The cave drawing had to be in the style of the art in Paleolithic Era.



Grade 6 students created place value posters to visually represent the culmination of all the different ways to learn how to represent a number (standard form, expanded form, number sentence, base ten blocks, roman numerals, money, using pictures/symbols/shapes, bar graph, and number line). The posters also allow understanding of the different ways to represent a number but also provides them with a visual representation of their own understanding of the different ways we can represent





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
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numbers in our lives. Doing this opens their minds to see mathematics concretely, visually, and symbolically which is a major pillar in the mathematics curriculum. To bookend the project, posters were put up onto the classroom bulletin board so they could each admire one another's work and act as a reminder to how you can come to the same result or answer in mathematics using different ways and strategies.

Our grade 6 students also are actively engaged in lunch hour intramurals with the current focus on basketball skill development.


What is a Crisis?

Parent Tips to Support Remote Learning








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PTA

Report for the Central District Advisory Council February 16, 2022

Elmwood Highlights:

- 1. A student has been selected to SHAD Valley Program that may be in person this year.
- 2. Two students are doing environmental research with Dr. Pflugmacher Lima at the U of M. Using coconut husks their project will look at screening microplastics out of washing machines to prevent them from getting into the water system and they will also develop a green filtration system to filter out chemical pollutants.
- 3. Two students took part in the provincial After School Leaders program MTYP Winter Program and will be continuing with the Spring Program.
- 4. The Youth United Team will be creating Care Packages for those in need with the support from the United Way.
- 5. Our students have enjoyed the MBTI Try the Trades tours of the new Trades Hall.
- 6. Our Elmwood Supply Company is creating Elmwood branding highlighting community icons such as the Louise Bridge and the La Salle Hotel. Funding form the Teachers' Idea Fund, the Elmwood Legacy Committee and the Chalmer's Neighbourhood Renewal Corporation are appreciated.
- 7. Three of the four Sr. High Basketball teams will be going to the AAA Qualifying Play-offs and the League Play-offs.
- 8. We will be hosting our school-wide Health and Wellness Expo this spring. The Healthy Schools funding is appreciated.
- 9. We are very pleased that the Verna J. Kirkness Science and Engineering Program at the U of M will be running again this year in most likely an in-person format.
- 10. Our Student Success Centre continues to support a wide array of students 455 of 550 Sr. High students have joined the SSC Google Classroom to stay in touch. The ongoing Provincial and Divisional supports are greatly appreciated.
