# SUMMARY OF DISCUSSIONS - Wednesday, February 8, 2023

#### 1. ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF INDIGENOUS PEOPLES OF CANADA

Committee members were informed that the meeting of the Central District Advisory Committee is taking place on Treaty One Land and the traditional homeland of the Red River Métis.

# 2. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Committee members approved the agenda of February 8, 2023, as distributed.

#### 2023/2024 DRAFT BUDGET

Committee members received a copy of the 2023/2024 Draft Budget for review.

Committee members were informed provincial funding has increased in the amount of \$8,314,777 or 4.1%.

A parent representative shared concerns regarding the availability of an off-campus option for children who require inclusion support while transitioning from elementary to junior high. The parent representative recommended that there should be an option to open Grade 7 and 8 schools to accommodate children transitioning from elementary school.

Committee members discussed the need for additional bus drivers and improved service for transportation, crossing guards, nursery programs and mental health and learning supports for reading and math recovery. Committee members discussed the recovery of post-COVID and how it has affected the children and parent's mental health. It was also discussed that multiple children are falling behind in school as there is not enough Educational Assistants to support children. Committee members recommended that more Educational Assistant support is required for children who are undiagnosed and require support. Committee members recommended that the allocation of Education Assistants should be based on equity.

A parent representative recommended not spending the budget on wages, new programs (unless it's sustainable) and suggested leaning towards infrastructure in schools including purchasing new buses, fixing windows or insulation. Committee members were informed that it takes \$30,000 to assess a school for repairs.

Parent representatives recommended that schools should be offering the lunch program instead of parent councils. Committee members also suggested that lunch programs should not be fee based and that lunch program staff should be trained to supervise children in the lunch program. Committee members were informed that the Board of Trustees received a lot of information and feedback from schools and parent councils regarding lunch programs. The feedback on lunch programs will be received by the Board of Trustees at a future meeting.

A parent representative informed Committee members that the Seven Oaks School Division does not charge fees for lunch programs and suggested that WSD obtain information on how they manage their lunch program. Committee members were informed that each lunch program runs differently and that school divisions spend their budget depending on their priorities.

Committee members also discussed the School Resource Officer program and requested that this be added to the agenda for discussion at the next meeting.

A parent representative commented that there is not enough Educational Assistants (EAs) in schools to support the inclusive classrooms. Committee members were informed that additional funding has been allocated to assist with hiring staff.

Committee members discussed the grade levels in schools and agreed that middle schools (Grade 7 to 8) should be separate from high school (Grade 9 to 12).



# **DMCI Capstone Student Honoured at University of Manitoba**



A DMCI grade 12 AP Capstone student from last year was honoured at the University of Manitoba on February 16th based on her original research and discovery of rare Ordovician fossils embedded within architecture at the University of Manitoba and DMCI's quadrangle. Gjana Millar's project was just 1 of 3 to not lose a single point in the College Board's grading system, which puts her in the top 1.14% of AP Research students globally. In partnership with the Dean of Clayton H. Riddell Faculty of Environment, Earth and Resources, a 3-panel museum float of Giana's research will be officially unveiled in the Cretaceous Menagerie in the Wallace Building, where it will be permanently located. The ceremony will feature various university dignitaries and professors as well as invitations to the media including various newspapers and CBC News.

The unveiling took place at 2:30 pm on Thursday, February 16th. In addition to the display, the U of M's first-year paleontology curriculum will also be revised going forward to include Gjana's findings with an assignment where students will have to re-discover and re-classify fossils on campus and duplicate her research.

# **DMCI's Medical Professional Program (MPP)**

On Friday, January 6<sup>th</sup> students in our Grade 12 Medical Professional Program took part in some skills workshops arranged through a DMCI alumnus, Dr. Francis Diaz. The day started off with lunch and a panel style Q & A with Dr. Diaz and 4 other young healthcare professionals. The students then went into the Clinical Learning and Simulation Facility, where the professionals and our students completed a number of specific medical skills.

# "Campus Visit Exposes High School Students to Rady Faculty Programs"

After listening to a panel of recent University of Manitoba medicine and nursing grads speak, Grade 12 student Isabella Dalisay had a better sense of what it takes to become a health-care professional. Dalisay was one of 24 Daniel McIntyre Collegiate Institute (DMCI) students who visited the Bannatyne campus in January for an afternoon of health-care-related activities.





The students are enrolled in DMCI's Medical Professionals Program, a three-year program which prepares learners for post-secondary education in the health sciences, and to work in careers related to health care and the biomedical industry. 
