Collège Churchill High School is "One School with Two Distinct Programs", located in the Riverview neighbourhood in south Winnipeg. We offer comprehensive programming for our grade 7-12 students within a nurturing learning environment that inspires their aspirations, abilities and achievements.

Collège Churchill High School has approximately 800 students enrolled in two distinct programs. Along with academic courses that include AP and Indigenous- focused classes, CCHS has created specialized programs that attract students from all over the province such as the Hockey and Softball Academy. CCHS also provides optional classes like band, guitar, choir, Spanish and practical arts.

As a UNESCO designated school, we foster a strong sense of community. This is evident in the many programs and extra-curricular initiatives that are available to our students. We have exceptional visual and performing arts programs and athletic programs. We also provide opportunities for students to gain leadership skills, learn about environmental issues and contribute to the surrounding community.

Our school motto is "Pride and Tradition", and we take great pride in our school community. Our dedicated staff foster a learning environment that upholds strong values, community activism and most importantly, promotes kindness.

As a UNESCO school, we will ensure that peace is at the core of all that we do as a community by using the four pillars of learning: Learning to know; Learning to do; Learning to be; Learning to live together. Students will complete a minimum of 30 credits to earn their High School Diploma.

CCHS offers a range of programming from Grades 7-12. This includes a range of curricular and extra-curricular courses and options. Inclusion is a priority in classes, and support and Advanced Placement course opportunities are available.

FRENCH MILIEU PROGRAM

Our vision is to develop bilingual students, aware of the multi-cultural Canadian reality and conscious of the challenges of an ever-changing, global village. The goal of the French Immersion Program is to develop proud, confident, engaged, plurilingual global citizens.

Guiding Principles for French Milieu:

Grades 7-12 will be the range of instruction.

Students will complete 21 of 30 credits in French instruction to earn the French Immersion High School Diploma and CCHS Milieu Certification. This will require a range of courses to be offered in French at each grade level.

A designated French Milieu centre will continue to support the immersion in French language where French is the primary language of instruction and communication. Daily announcements are completed in French.

As part of developing the French language, unique learning activities, both in-class and extra-curricular will be offered in French.

The administration team will always require at least one French-speaking administrator.

Highlights

Belonging:

CCHS students had numerous opportunities to engage in **cultural learning**. School wide teachings on Orange Shirt Day and Red Dress Day to honour MMIWG2S, ribbon skirt and shirt making, full moon ceremonies, and sweat lodges were offered.

Black History Month learning activities ran throughout the month of February, which culminated with a school wide celebration.

An emphasis **on student voice, choice, and leadership** empowered students to take an active role in organizing school-wide events such as the Black History Month celebration, Red Dress Day, Spirit Week, and Pride celebrations. Student representatives from various groups including the UNESCO Club, Student Council, Queer Quarters, Indigenous Student Advisory Council, and the Black History Month Committee—collaborated to plan and coordinate these inclusive and meaningful initiatives.

Progress continues with the school's **Inclusion** model, which is dedicated to ensuring that all students can reach their full potential by actively participating in mainstream classes and engaging in the broader school community. To reflect the diverse interests and identities of students, a wider range of extracurricular clubs was offered, including Dungeons & Dragons, Ribbon Skirt Making, Fishing, Esports, Rock Music, Chess, and Queer Quarters. These offerings aimed to foster engagement, promote inclusion, and support personal growth beyond the classroom.

Creativity:

Senior High Performing Arts students staged a successful production of *Legally Blonde*, while Middle Years students delighted audiences with *Shrek Jr: The Musical*. Senior students mentored younger performers, building leadership and collaboration skills. Fine Arts Night showcased visual art, choir, and jazz band performances.

Deep Learning Experiences:

Students participated in a middle years' inquiry fair, conducting research on a topic of personal interest and presented their findings to an audience.

Students competed in the Envirothon Provincials and gained valuable knowledge about environmental issues and the skills needed to address them.

Our Communities of Practice (Inclusion, Calls to Action, Assessment, Deep Learning, Diversity and Equity) has resulted in staff learning that will continue to impact teacher practices.

Students in the Indigenous Art course curated and presented an art exhibition titled 'Indigenous Garden' at an external gallery space, showcasing their creative expressions."

Parent and Community Involvement

The school's partnership with Riverview Health Centre continues to evolve. Students planned and led recreational activities for residents, with adaptations for residents with additional needs and completed a project which included interviews with residents about their lives.

A partnership with Sustainable South Osborne Community Co-op was initiated to allow students the opportunity for Hands on Learning about environmental awareness, horticulture and community engagement. Free Press-Learning-to-grow

Monthly food hampers were provided to families through donations from Manitoba Harvest and Second Harvest.

Drum making and full moon ceremonies were led by a student's parents and attended by staff, parents and students.

Parents, students and staff offered teachings at the National Day of Awareness and Remembrance MMIWG2S. Students played an integral role in planning the event as well as leading in song, dance, learning and offering smudging throughout the day.

We opened the school year with a Welcome Back Barbecue to connect with families in September.
