Brock Corydon is an elementary school located in River Heights in Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada within the Winnipeg School Division. Our school has an enrollment of 300 students. We offer Nursery to Grade Six in our English program and Kindergarten to Grade 6 in our Hebrew Bilingual program. There is a daycare available for registered students starting at age four as well as before and after school care with the Rady JCC.

Our school is committed to developing academic and social skills in an inclusive nurturing environment. Programs are supported and enhanced through an extensive Resource Program, EAL Program, Library and Technology Resources, Basic French, Music, and Physical Education. Students are encouraged to take active roles in a variety of student leadership opportunities and to promote inclusivity, acceptance, and respect for all.

Brock Corydon has an active and dedicated Parent Advisory Council comprised of parent and grandparent volunteers who foster a community-centred environment for the school.

Priorities for 2020-21 & 2021-22

1. Students

To provide robust and comprehensive education, equitable access, diverse opportunity, and a supportive learning environment for all students to help them prepare for their journey with values of learning and social justice, and to be responsible community members both in the English and Hebrew programs.

2. Learning Outcomes

To maintain and enhance projects, initiatives, and enrichment programs to achieve and exceed grade level outcomes in literacy, math, and science. Using the triangulation of data to help inform decisions and provide guidance on specific next-steps, Brock Corydon will evaluate instruction, assessment methods and tiered-support to best meet student learning needs. Transition to middle-years schools will be enhanced through strengthened relations and processes.

3. Addressing Barriers to Learning

To further develop initiatives and innovative approaches addressing individual student needs and accessibility requirements, mental health issues, childcare needs, and nutritional needs.





Priorities for 2021-22

In addition to the priorities detailed to the left, we are also focusing on the priorities below.

- 1. Reading—using comprehension strategies to increase meaning and understanding.
- 2. Writing—word choice and conventions.
- 3. Numeracy—mental math strategies and increasing the accuracy and automaticity basic facts.
- 4. Hebrew—increase reading fluency and accuracy as well as speaking Hebrew consistently.
- 5. Strengthening the use and understanding of the data cycle to help indicate goals and next steps in Reading, Writing, Numeracy, and Hebrew language.
- 6. Facilitating opportunities for teachers to collaborate and learn from each other through weekly scheduled Professional Learning Conversations.

Our school theme will be "Healthy Minds, Healthy Hearts, and Healthy Living."

Every morning our students hear the daily intention over the morning announcements. These daily messages give students and staff a few moments to reflect upon the value of mindful and positive thinking and decision making. These intentions are written by Keith Macpherson and Charlotte Jackson of the Hearts and Minds Program.

Here are the intentions that highlight the 2020-2021 school year:

- "Look on the bright side of life. Remember that happy thoughts bring about a happy life."
- "Your thoughts help to shape who you are. By choosing to think good thoughts in the present, you are starting to create the wonderful person you want to be in the future."
- "Remember that we are all connected. When someone you know experiences success, try to celebrate it as if it were your own."
- "Create peace within you. You cannot control the outer world, but you can control your inner world and how you choose to look at what happens around you."
- "Learn from the past, and then let it go. Believe that in time things will turn out just fine"
- "Be still, be quiet, and listen to your heart. This is the moment when you can get inspired to do great things!"
