Robertson's Food Drive

Did you know that 49% of the hungry people in Winnipeg are children? Harvest Manitoba is an organization that provides food to families in need across Manitoba. Harvest Manitoba has provided over 250,000 lbs of nutritional food to families in need. Not only did Harvest Manitoba inspire us to create this food drive, we were also inspired by UNESCO'S 17 goals for sustainable development. The 2 goals we were specifically inspired by were, #2 Zero Hunger and #17 Partnerships For The Goals. The intention of Zero Hunger is to end hunger, achieve food security and improved nutrition and promote sustainable agriculture. The intention of Partnerships For The Goals is to strengthen the means of implementation and revitalize the Global Partnership for Sustainable Development.

With all of this inspiration, we have come up with an idea that we are very excited about, we would like to initiate a **Robertson School Food Drive**. The excitement has spread all of the way to Andrew Mynarski school as they will also be hosting a food drive in collaboration with Robertson School. Both schools have come together to host a friendly competition to see who can collect the most non-perishable and non-expired foods. The winner will be determined by which school has brought the most weight of food. All of the donated food will be made into hampers for Robertson and Andrew Mynarski families in need. Afterwards, the remainder of the food will be donated to Harvest Manitoba. Collection of non-perishable (non-expired) food items will take place **December 2-13.**

In P2 we have spent the last several months getting to know each other and creating strong connections as a classroom community, here are just a few highlights from the last few months!



In ELA we have been hard at work exploring a variety of fairytales and identifying four important steps: the set up, the small moment, the trouble within the story as well as how it wraps up. We continued the exploration with writing our very own adapted fairytales and designing a book cover to match! We have very brave writers who are willing to share their creativity at every step of the writing process. We also have the honour to write to a veteran for Remembrance Day.

For science and social studies we studied building materials and communities. We explored how we are connected to the community and as a final project created piggy banks that look like our homes! We matched it with a poem from our home and made a lovely display!

Inquiry "How do communities/land change over time?"

We started our inquiry with a walk around the community, thinking about what the area would have looked like 50 years ago? 100 years ago? 200 years ago? This led to our reflection about the structures and materials that have been used to build the houses and roads. We noticed natural structures like birds nests and types of grasses. The next step in our exploration







was to test materials for strength, flexibility and durability. We have begun designing purposeful structures like tables, cat towers, bird houses and bridges to build and test.

Art "Interconnectedness"

We connected with and appreciated the cultural influences that have impacted modern visual art styles today such as the Papunya Tula Art Movement in Australia. We used painting techniques to create leaf paintings that incorporate the Papunya Tula style and many other elements of art such as line, shape, and warm/cool colours.

Reading shouldn't be a chore. Intentionally read with your child and discuss the books they are reading. It helps them develop basic language skills and expands their vocabulary.

reader and writer.

Make Reading a Part of Family Time

Why not make reading a part of your valuable time with your kids? Here are some ways to integrate reading into your daily family activities:

- Play a boardgame
- Read a recipe and cook something yummy together.
- Create a comfy reading space in your home.

Room 152 News

As we approach the end of this term, we want to take a moment to thank Mrs. Montero and Ms. Liyah for all their hard work and dedication to our class. They've been such a big help since September, and we will miss them both when their student teaching time here finishes.

In Math, we have been exploring various ways to represent numbers using a concept circle. This method helps students visualize numbers through pictures, symbols, words, and real-life examples. One of the strategies we've focused on is "making 10," which supports students in developing their addition skills. We also have regular "Number Talks," where students share their thinking and strategies for solving problems. The lessons and questions are adapted to meet each student's needs, ensuring that everyone can work at their own pace and level.





We also spent time learning about Remembrance Day and discussing what peace means. To share our thoughts, we created a bulletin board about peace, which is now displayed in the school. In addition, we had visits from community helpers, such as firefighters and police officers, who taught us about the important roles they play in keeping our community safe.









In ELA, students have been engaged in Literacy Centers, which include phonics practice, using the Everfi program, reading Epic books, and both independent and partner reading. These activities support literacy skills and foster a love of reading.

We're excited for the upcoming winter concert and look forward to sharing our song about Hanuka!


