# A Message From Administration...

We truly value your ongoing support and partnership in your child's education. On December 8th, administration will also be sending a survey to families to see how you liked this format.

We would like to say Thank You to all who came out to support our annual Scholastic Book Fair. The Book Fair enables our children to have books at home to read, while raising money to help Robertson School purchase learning resources for all the students to enjoy! Azzy in room 152 won \$25 worth of books for himself and \$25 worth of books for his classroom. We were able to raise a total of \$1090 for the school for books in the classrooms and library.

# **Physical Education News**

Some information regarding exciting events that will be taking place for our students in the new year as well as some programming details about our Physical Education classes. With the Soccer tournaments completed for the year, up next will be Volleyball. The school Volleyball teams will begin practices in January in preparations for the annual Winnipeg School Division Volleyball tournament that will be held in February. Students will bring more information home regarding this event as we get closer to the date. Intramurals will continue to run during the lunch hour until the end of April followed by the Robertson Running Club in May in preparations for the Winnipeg School Division Fit Run event which will be held in June. Finally, preparations for the annual Robertson Track & Field day will also take place in June.

Greetings from Room 103!

We are three months into the school year, and we have been busy!

In writing, we have been working on personal narratives and quick writes, with a focus on developing our editing and punctuation skills.

We spent about a month reading books of choice and then moved into a four-week Book Club. Students chose a book by Gordon Korman and met with their groups to discuss character traits, how characters treat one another, and the cause-and-effect relationships between people, places, events, and a character's behaviour.

Our focus in math this term has been on place value and multiplication, along with some review of subtraction and compatible numbers to 100.

In Social Studies, we explored the Bering Land Bridge theory and learned about the Indigenous peoples who lived on this land for thousands of years. In Science, we completed a unit on weather and wrapped it up with a group project on severe weather.


Finally, in Art, we completed an in-depth unit on the elements and principles of art. We applied our knowledge by critiquing the work of other artists, identifying what we are drawn to in their pieces, and incorporating those inspirations into our own artwork.



# P2 Sends Greetings!

Wow! Has it been a busy term in P2! We spent the last several months getting to know each other, and it is so amazing to see the leadership and care the students show to each other.

Academically we have been thriving in Mathematics, and have completed several math investigations and had plenty of math talks together. So much so that their hard work was and progress was recently spoken about during a major math PD!



In Writing we have explored both narrative writing and letter writing. We have produced 'spooky' stories and have written letters to a Veteran as well as important people in our lives.

For Science and Social Studies we have explore magnetism and other forces that attract and repel! We also explored what it means to belong and how we belong in personal, community and world circles.






# Learning in Room 152

In Math, students have been using Cuisenaire rods to help them understand efficient strategies like part-whole boxes and number lines. They are practicing how to make "friendly numbers" that end in 5 or 0, also called benchmark numbers. We have also been working with compatible number pairs to 10, 20, 50, and 100, as well as solving addition and subtraction story problems to help students make real-life connections in math.



In Science, students are finishing their study of the four seasons and will soon begin learning how animals adapt to their environments, with a special focus on polar bears for our class animal project. Students are excited to research and create their own informational books about polar bears, exploring their habitat, life cycle, appearance, diet, and other interesting facts.





Daily phonics is a key part of our classroom routine. Students are eager to learn new letter blends and are applying these skills in both reading and writing. We explore phonics through a variety of ways, including large and small group lessons, hands-on phonics activities, shared class poetry, and simple decodable books that help build their confidence and reading fluency.





In Social Studies, we recently finished our All About Me stick projects. Next, we'll begin our unit on holidays from around the world. As we "travel" to different countries, students will use pretend suitcases, boarding passes, and their own passports to make it feel like a real trip. They are excited to learn about new celebrations and share what they discover with other Grade 1 and 2 classes.

We were happy to have a community helper visit our grade 1 and 2 classes to talk about fire safety. A





big thank you to Lee for spending time with us! She did a wonderful job keeping the students interested while teaching them what firefighters do, the gear they wear, what number to call, and what to do in case of a fire. The students really enjoyed learning how firefighters help keep our community safe.

Dear Families.

We've had a wonderful and busy month of learning in Grade 1/2! Here is a look at what we've been working on across our subjects:

## Science - Seasonal Changes

Students have been learning all about **seasonal changes** and how they affect the world around us. To show their understanding, they created beautiful **plasticine art pieces** that represent the four seasons. The creativity and attention to detail were amazing to see! Next term, we will begin exploring **Northern Manitoba**, with a special focus on **polar bears and their habitats**.



#### Social Studies - All About Me

In Social Studies, students created an **All About Me art piece** that included their **name, favourite hobby, culture, family members, and traditions**. They proudly shared their work with classmates and families during **student-led conferences**. It was wonderful to see how confidently students celebrated who they are and the people who are important to them! Next, **we will be studying holidays around the world**, learning about how different countries celebrate special events.









# Math – Patterns, Number Lines & Cuisenaire Rods

In Math, we wrapped up our unit on **patterns** and have now moved into learning with **number lines** and **Cuisenaire rods**. These tools are helping students deepen their understanding of **part–whole relationships** as they think about **addition and subtraction strategies**.







# **English Language Arts – Writing & Phonics**

In ELA, students have been busy **writing personal stories**, exploring characters and ideas in creative ways. We have also been practicing important **phonics skills** to continue building strong reading and writing skills. Students are becoming more confident in sounding out words, recognizing patterns, and expressing their ideas in writing.

Thank you for your ongoing support and for celebrating your child's learning with us. We look forward to another exciting month ahead!


The chill in the air reminds me that it is time for Robertson School's Winter concert! This year's show is called, "The Best Winter Ever!"






