### **ADMINISTRATOR'S MESSAGE**

s we welcome December, I want to share how fortunate I feel to have joined École Sir William Osler last month. From the start, the students, staff, and families have been incredibly welcoming and inclusive. This is truly an environment where children are supported and can learn, grow, and thrive.

November was a busy and memorable month. Students were actively engaged in their learning, and the school was buzzing with energy. Our Remembrance Day ceremony provided a meaningful opportunity for reflection and respect, and the Family Movie Night was a highlight. To help reduce the number of lost items, we kindly ask that all winter clothing, water bottles, and containers be

clearly labelled with your child's name. Labelling makes it much easier for us to return items quickly.

We are hoping to recreate our "enchanted forest" in the schoolyard again this year. Families who have a real Christmas tree and are willing to donate it after the holidays are encouraged to do so. We also welcome connections to tree lots that may have leftover trees. Depending on snow conditions, we will create small groves throughout the yard or place trees along the fence. Volunteers will be needed in the spring to help with removal.

The last week of school before the holiday break will be filled with festive activities, including holiday bingo, spirit week, and a school-wide holiday sing-along. We look forward to celebrating together.

Our Polar Bear Club will begin in January. This optional program encourages students to enjoy outdoor play even on colder days. ### **Room 5 to the Winnipeg Art Gallery**

On Wednesday, November 12, students from salle 5 took the public bus to the Winnipeg Art Gallery (WAG).

The tour was facilitated by FOUR French-speaking guides, who split our group into two. We toured the Visible Vault which is the LARGEST collection of Inuit Sculptures in the World, housed under ONE roof, Abraham Ahghik Ruben, and Inuvialuit artist, had many sculptures on display, which captured the imagination of many students.

Then, we sketched the various fossils we saw IN the actual limestone rocks that are in the floors and walls of the WAG. Our trip culminated in a fun collage art project, where we took our sketches and used ripped pieces of old magazines to add another dimension to our sketches.

It was a great day of learning outside of ÉSWO, that consolidated our learning of Rocks, Minerals and Fossils.





### **Cold Weather Clothing**

The days are getting much colder. Please send your children to school so they arrive just before the bell rings at 8:20 a.m. School staff are outside to supervise children at 8:10 a.m. each morning.

Students are expected to be outside for both recesses, at lunchtime, as well as before school.



Please remember to put a t-shirt under the warm layers of sweatshirts and sweaters so students don't get too hot.

Please help by making sure that they dress for the weather as well as for the school.

### School Closures & Transportation Cancellations Due to Severe Weather

The decision to close a school is made by the Chief Superintendent.

The decision to close all schools is made by the Chief Superintendent (or designate) in consultation with other Superintendents in Winnipeg and with the Chair of the Board of Trustees.

Transportation will be cancelled if the weather drops to –35°C (without the wind chill) or –45°C (with the wind chill) by 6:15 a.m. Schools will remain open but transportation will not operate.



School and/or Transportation closure announcements will be advertised on the Winnipeg School Division website.



#### **Frostbite**

Frostbite is a localized injury caused by cold in which the affected tissues are frozen. It most commonly affects the toes, fingers and face (nose, ears, cheeks and chin).

With continued cold, the blood supply to the extremities is steadily reduced, accelerating the freezing process. As circulation becomes impaired, sensation in the affected area is lost. Unless the tissue is rewarmed quickly, the skin and superficial tissues actually begin to freeze solid. If the conditions persist, the freezing enlarges and penetrates further.

Dressing warmly and staying dry are essential to prevent frostbite. Children should wear:

- a hat
- a neck tube or other covering for the face (covering the mouth and nose)
- · mittens or gloves
- sleeves that are snug at the wrist
- warm and water resistant proper fitting outerwear and boots.

At the first sign of redness or pain in any skin area, remove the child from the cold or protect any exposed skin, as frostbite may be beginning. Any of the following signs may indicate frostbite:

- a white or greyish-yellow skin area
- skin that feels unusually firm or waxy
- numbness

**Frostnip:** a mild form of frostbite. Skin is yellowish or white but soft to the touch. There is a painful tingling or burning sensation in the warmth.



**Frostbite:** a more severe condition where skin and underlying tissues are frozen. Skin is white, waxy, and hard to the touch. There is no sensation.

For early signs of superficial frostbite move the affected person to a warm room as soon as possible. Warm the affected area gradually through direct contact with body heat (i.e. place a warm hand against the affected area). Do not raise the temperature of the affected area much above body temperature. Severe frostbite should be treated by trained medical personnel.

### **Cold Weather Conditions**

Below is a guideline provided by the Winnipeg School Division for keeping students indoors for recess. The Superintendents of the school divisions in Metro Winnipeg have determined that the temperature reading used will be that of **Environment Canada at The Forks location**.
