Dear Luxton Families,

Reflecting on the past month, I want to say how proud I was listening in on conversations between students and their caregivers about their progress and achievement during student-led conferences. I believe opportunities for *self-assessment* have the most powerful impact on supporting further learning. Students were able to showcase evidence of a range of academic, athletic, and artistic competencies.

feature feature some important changes. Two teachers have returned from leave. Room 9 has said a fond farewell to Mrs. Sampson and welcomes back Mrs. Tolentino. Room 16 bid adieu to Mme Litardi and welcomes the return of Mme. Toews. In addition, several new students have registered in grades 1-3, necessitating a rebalancing of classroom sizes. Thank you to students and families who have agreed to change classrooms.

After every school break it's always proactive for school staff to revisit the guidelines for being a responsible member of a peaceful learning

community. At Luxton, we will be affirming with students the guidelines for respectful, responsible and mindful behaviour. It's important that we teach appropriate behaviour, and if children need additional reminders to learn, they also have that opportunity.

Of course, even when we are proactive about setting healthy boundaries for student behaviour, there are occasions where problems still arise. We've been teaching students a strategy called "Stop, Walk, and Talk." In addition, we are using a series of lessons at Luxton using material from *Kids in the Know*, an acclaimed safety education resource for educators and caregivers from the Canadian Centre for Child Protection. An example of an important lesson from this resource is helping our youth understand the difference between secrets that you keep and secrets that need to be told to a trusted adult. 
COUNSELLOR'S CORNER

CELEBRATING FRENCH CULTURAL HERITAGE

In the first week of March, Luxton students and staff celebrated Festival du Voyageur week at the school. In classrooms, they learned about the development of the fur trade and the contributions of Indigenous people and French settlers in Manitoba's history.

We were treated to a concert by storyteller and musicians Tibert and Douzie, both proud members of the Métis community. They told stories and jokes and played traditional music like the "Red River Jig" with fiddle and mouth organ. Students stomped and clogged to the rhythm!







PINK SHIRT DAY

Wednesday, April 10th, is Pink Shirt Day. This year each student will create a uniquely patterned, pink, tiedyed shirt to wear and keep. **NOTE**: wash these shirts separately from other clothes for the first wash, as dyes can still leak the second time around (even though we washed them once).

Winnipeg's Canadian Museum of Human Rights is promoting the idea of being an UPSTANDER. What is an upstander? It's someone who chooses to support a person who is being abused or harmed. The upcoming International Day of Pink (April 10) encourages students, staff and community members to be upstanders. We mark the day at Luxton because we celebrate diversity and freedom. We stand against bullying and discrimination in all its forms.

Day of Pink started in Central Kings High School in Cambridge, Nova Scotia, when two senior students saw a freshman student being bullied for wearing a pink shirt. They organized fellow students to come to school wearing pink, standing in solidarity with their classmate.

At Luxton, our pink tie-dyed shirts will show solidarity for those who are picked on, made to feel different, or ridiculed. Teachers will discuss ways we can support and defend students who are subject to discriminatory (sexist, homophobic, racist) language or actions. We will promote safe ways to challenge such bullying and harassment and make Luxton a safe and healthy learning environment.



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SOLAR ECLIPSE – MONDAY, APRIL 8, 2024 / ÉCLIPSE SOLAIRE – LE LUNDI 8 AVRIL 2024







What are the hazards of viewing a solar eclipse?

Looking at the sun, including during a solar eclipse, can cause solar retinopathy, which can permanently damage the retina's light-sensitive cells at the back of the eye. Even a brief look at the sun during an eclipse can cause permanent harm to the eyes. A person may not experience any pain or discomfort while watching the event and still suffer severe damage as a result.

Symptoms may not surface until 12 to 48 hours after the event and could involve retinal burns, temporary or permanent vision loss and blurred vision. Once symptoms start, it is usually too late to reverse any resulting damage. If someone experiences any changes in their vision from watching the solar eclipse, they should immediately have someone else drive them to a hospital or to their optometrist to be assessed.

What is a solar eclipse?

During a solar eclipse, the moon moves between the sun and the Earth, partially or completely blocking the sun's rays. This means that the sun will appear less bright, and people will be able to look at it directly without turning away.



Schools and child care facilities are encouraged to have a basic plan to ensure that children, students and staff will be safe.

Keep a close eye on children during a solar eclipse. Their eyes are still developing and let in more light to the retina than adult eyes, so they are at higher risk of harm if they look at the sun without proper eye protection.

How can I safely observe a solar eclipse?

Indirect observation through a recording (for example, watching on television or streaming online) is the safest way to view an eclipse. Direct observation requires appropriate safety measures, including internationally-certified eclipse glasses. Sunglasses, camera lenses (including smart phone cameras), binoculars, telescopes or anything else that is not specifically made for viewing an eclipse are not safe.
