OPEN HOUSE AND WELCOME TO NURSERY / KINDERGARTEN

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

École Luxton School promotes active, healthy lifestyles. One engaging way to interest students in fitness for life is friendly competition with other schools. On February 27th, nearly 40 Luxton Bobcats from grades 4 – 6 participated in the 2024 Athletics Manitoba Elementary Relay Races. The competition introduces elementary and middle years students to track and field events. In the Shuttle Relay, eight team members ran 40m each, back and forth in shuttle style. The



lap relay engaged four team members each running one complete lap around the oval. Other students participated in shot put and long jump team events.

Previously, Luxton students have attended two volleyball events at other schools. Next up, three-on-three basketball! ARTS EDUCATION

Dear Luxton families!

During the month of February our students have been learning to play Djembe - an African drum. They learned numerous techniques and rhythms, played individually and in a group. During the classes, the students also learned about the continent of Africa.

The djembe is one of West Africa's best-known instruments. This goblet-shaped drum is traditionally carved from a single piece of African hardwood and topped with an animal skin as a drumhead. Africans say that the drum contains three spirits. The belief is that the djembe drum contains the spirit of the tree from which it was made, the spirit of the animal whose skin is played, and the spirit of the carver or the one who cut the tree and the people who assemble the drum.



GETTING THE MOST FROM STUDENT-LED CONFERENCES


Student-led conferences are an opportunity for students to show caregivers what they know and can do at school. They are taking a big risk in sharing, and many will be nervous. Let's make certain it's a nurturing experience.

First, it must be said how important it is for caregivers to attend the conferences. It is possible that a busy schedule may get in the way, but then have a grandparent or auntie or some other significant adult bring the child to the conferences. I've seen students prepare for several days for student-led conferences, only to find out their caregivers were unable to attend. The children were quite upset by not being able to present their learning.

One tip for making the most of the conference is simply to **notice and name**. Good feedback starts with recognizing and describing out loud what children know and can do. For instance, you might say "*I see you've got a strategy for adding two-digit numbers*." There's no judgement there, just a recognition of what the child is showing in their math folder: noticing ("adding two-digit numbers") and naming it ("a strategy").

Asking **open-ended questions** is also a productive way to engage in a positive conversation. Here are some possibilities:

- → How do you feel about your learning so far in math?
- → What can you do better now than you could at the beginning of the year?
- → Is the math you're doing too easy, too hard, or just right?
- → What do you want to get better at doing?
- → How can you extend your practice at home? How can I help?



- → This sample shows you are really made an effort. Are you focusing on your schoolwork in math class and concentrating on getting better?
- → Tell me about participating in solving math problems. Do you share ideas and contribute?
- → Do you feel confident about getting better math?

The teachers will provide students with a guide to the conference. If the dialogue goes well, students will feel heard, supported, and motivated to try even harder and achieve more.

On February 15th, we celebrated the 100th day of school by eating 100 pieces of cereal and making necklaces out of 100 pieces of pasta.








GLOBAL PLAY DAY


