administration will be following up with attendance concerns.



We are looking forward to this movie night and hope to see you there!



Greetings from Grades 5 and 6 in room 103!

The last three months have been busy. We were engaged in winter writing tasks, completed a novel study, helped with the Winter Concert, presented our research about a human body system, and learned about the perimeter and area of objects. We went on a field trip to the Winnipeg Art Gallery and learned about local indigenous artist, Lita Fontaine.






We have now jumped into a new year and are starting fresh on many new topics. We have rocketed into a new unit about Space. Students have already presented their findings on planets and important vocabulary words. In Social Studies, we have started a unit on Water. Students are learning about the significance of water to Canada's Indigenous peoples, water equality, the source of our drinking water, and water conservation. We are working on descriptive narrative writing and noticing how good word choice will help the reader visualize what is

happening in a piece of writing. And finally, in math we are working on patterns and algebra and will soon be learning all about fractions.

Book Sharing

Looking for a new book or wanting to purge your existing home library to make room for new books? Well, we have the perfect opportunity for you. The Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) student committee invites you to participate in our **book sharing** event.

During a few Education For Sustainable Development (ESD) committee meetings, the topics of consumerism and the cost associated with purchasing new books were discussed. In the spirit



of the upcoming I Love to Read month and sustainability, the ESD committee has decided to host a book sharing event. The book sharing event would eliminate the barrier of the cost associated with purchasing new books, reducing the number of books in landfills, as well as increasing access to literature.

This is a perfect opportunity for students to pick out a new book. Perhaps they will find a book written by one of their favourite authors or pick a book that looks interesting to them. The book sharing event provides students with the opportunity to access literature at no cost.

The book sharing event is also a sustainable practice as it works towards 5 of the United Nations 17 goals for sustainable development. Below are the 5 goals the ESD committee is working towards by hosting the book sharing event:





Reading not only improves your imagination, reading is directly connected to creativity and writing.



Books are available at no cost which removes the cost barrier associated with purchasing new books.



Fosters the sustainable practice of reusing and repurposing items.



Resisting the need to participate in consumerism by creating a second home for items that are still functional opposed to purchasing new.



Books are finding new homes opposed to being thrown in the landfills or resold for money.

The ESD committee is looking for the support of the Robertson School community. We would love it if you could take a look through your personal library and donate any books that are still in good condition so that others can enjoy the stories as much as your family did.

Room 147 News - January Highlights

We've had an exciting and busy month in Room 147! Our students are continuing to grow and develop new skills in both literacy and math while enjoying our winter-themed activities. Here's a glimpse of what we've been up to:

Literacy & Language Arts:

Our focus this month has been on writing names, and students are making great progress! We've explored fun and engaging ways to practice, from writing names in salt and sand to using shaving cream. Traditional tools, like markers and paper, have also been part of our routine.





In addition to name writing, students are practicing letter sounds and printing the alphabet. We've used whiteboards, booklets, and even food coloring in snow to make learning more interactive and enjoyable! Students have been practicing their inferencing skills by analyzing pictures and discussing the setting in stories. We've also been listening to a variety of books and checking comprehension through group discussions.





Math Adventures:

This month, our math activities have been full of hands-on learning! We've worked on making equal sets, counting forward and backward to 10 (and beyond!), and using tools like ten frames. Students have been building their numeral skills with playdough and exploring patterns during calendar and center time. Additionally, we've practiced subitizing by recognizing dot patterns on dice.

Winter Fun & Exploration

Our winter theme has provided opportunities for creative expression and scientific exploration. We experimented with snow and observed how temperature affects it. Students also enjoyed mixing different colors in the snow and noticed how blending two colors creates something new.

We've been keeping warm with a variety of fun snowman-themed art and counting activities, and the students have been engaged and excited to learn through the seasonal lens!

English Language Arts



In writing, we are nearing the end of our second Unit of Study - informational writing. So far, students have each written a book about an expert topic. They learned to plan their book using a Table of Contents, include information in many forms, use text features to draw attention to specific information, and craft strong leads and conclusions. We are working to research and write one final informational piece about a common illness (integrating health learning). We continue to make progress in our phonics/morphology groups and are growing our love of reading across many genres

Math

We are working on describing and applying mental math strategies for addition, using tools such as empty number lines, 100 charts, and base 10 blocks to model our thinking. We are also learning to solve problems in small groups using the Thinking Classrooms approach.



Social Studies

Throughout the month of December, we worked with our student teacher, Ms. Shemluk, to learn about Canadian citizenship, personal identity, leadership, and conflict resolution. We had a great time integrating drama into these concepts, especially compiling our learning into a puppet show!

Science

Ms. Shemluk also worked with our class on a unit about Forces that Attract and Repel, including magnetism, static electricity and gravity. We are now learning about the steps of the engineering design process - ask, imagine, plan, create, and improve - to create bridges.

Health

We are learning about daily habits and responsibilities for leading a physically active and healthy life, Including how to prevent common illnesses and diseases.



Art

We continue to study and experiment with the seven elements of art and a variety of mediums to create visual art. This term, we have also been exploring how to use our bodies to communicate through fun drama games and activities. We are excited to work with the Royal Winnipeg Ballet through the Shared Dance program for the remainder of the school year!

January has been a month full of learning and fun, and we can't wait to share what we've been up to!

Animal Inquiry Project

This month, our students learned about animals. They worked on projects to find out what animals need to survive and where they live. Each student "adopted" an animal and created a home for it, which helped them think about the environment.

To help them learn about money, students had to budget enough money to purchase their animal and their home. The students enjoyed "shopping" for things to take care of their animals, making it a fun way to learn about managing resources.









Winter Art Project: "If I Was Trapped in a Snow Globe"

Creativity shone as students participated in an art project called "If I Was Trapped in a Snow Globe." They designed their own snow globe scenes, bringing a bit of winter magic to our classroom.





Looking Ahead: February

In February, we will keep exploring our animal projects. Students will learn more about their animals and gather information to write about them, which is an important goal for the month. We will also be busy with events like I Love to Read, Valentine's Day and 100 Days of School. The month will be jam packed with lots of learning and growing.

THINKING CLASSROOMS


We continue our learning through collaboration by frequently asking important questions, testing theories and consolidating ideas.




LEARNING BUDDIES
