- √ Reading can open up new worlds and enrich childrens' lives.



The students will also be learning about the Sacred Teaching of Love. We will integrate visual arts to celebrate Valentine's Day.

The students have been just introduced to the new theme "Community Helpers" this term. As the students "travel" through the community, they will take part in a variety of exciting hands-on activities including the following: sorting tools used by community helpers, putting letters for postal delivery in numerical order ordering shoe size at the shoe store, discussing the mass and capacity of various items at the bulk food store, designing patterned jewellery shop, creating different pizza combinations at the Mulvey Pizza Parlour, creating different sundae combinations at the ice cream shop, using weekly poems to identify community helpers, to read basic sight words, to identify rhyming words, to recognize and discuss the function of question marks and exclamation marks, and to identify descriptive words. Our centres continue to be filled with hands-on, active learning opportunities. At the writing centre, students will write about what they want to be when they grow up. They will create restaurant menus at the arts and crafts centre, which they can use at the dramatic centre restaurant the students have voted and carefully named as Mulvey Pizza Parlour.

I wish to thank all of my students and the parents and guardians for your continued support throughout our Kindergarten journey.



Grades 1 & 2 - Mrs. S. Gomes

In Math, we will continue to work on building our math skills by working on some new addition and subtraction strategies. We will also continue to review many other math strategies that we have been working on since the start of the school year. Some of these are rote counting, counting backwards, counting by 2's, 5's and 10's, using number lines, and looking at different ways to show 10. We continue to work on our printing and reading skills as well.

In Language Arts, students are engaged in small and large group instructions. We are spelling word families and words with short/long vowels. We also continue to practice reading high frequency words, poem books, and short stories. Students will continue to practice writing sentences and short stories. It is so wonderful to see the students growing in all of these areas.

For the month of February, we will be using Valentine's Day to get us further talking about love and kindness. I am looking forward to all of the meaningful ideas, stories and thoughts that will come up during our classroom discussion.





Grades 3 & 4 Ms. E. Black

Our classroom goal this month is to collectively read 25 chapter books! That's one book per student and I'd like to challenge our own goal and say we will read MORE than 25 chapter books which should be a breeze since we'll be participating in I Love To Read month. Stay tuned for next months newsletter to see the final count! Reading every night for 15-20 minutes will help reach our goals; ...Drum roll please... introducing... 25 new poets at Mulvey School! Learning the differences between a simile and a metaphor, writing our own

poems, and increasing our vocabulary by learning the song about adjectives, nouns and verbs has kept us busy during our ELA this month. In Science we are learning that different animals have different adaptations that allows them to thrive in their natural environment. In Mathematics we are looking at different multiplication strategies to solve 2x1/2x2 digit questions. Counting something? Try counting by 2's, 3's, 4's, or 5's to practice skip counting; After our daily announcements one morning, we began asking questions about the Land Acknowledgement and the importance of acknowledging the Indigenous people who have lived and worked on this land historically and presently. In Social Studies we are exploring and learning about the history of Rooster Town, a local Urban Métis Community (1901–1961) and more about the history of the land we are on. To the right, are some photos of our matching friends since the school year has started!



Grades 2 & 3 - Mr. J. Truss

I hope all of you are doing well. This month we look forward to creating our assembly presentation on Diversity. Through developing the presentation the class will be learning about the importance of celebrating our own cultural identities, while also identifying the commonalities that we share with one another.

In Language Arts we will continue to develop our reading comprehension through "Read To Me" activities, and further enhance our writing skills through responding to the stories that are read to the class. We will also be beginning our novel study of Fantastic Mr. Fox.

In Math we will be remain working with the Dreambox program. This month we will also be studying graphing in class. We will be doing this through pencil and paper tasks that will also incorporate hands on activities to further develop understanding.

In Science we have started we will be learning about "states of matter". The class will gain a greater understanding of solids, liquids, and gasses and how matter can change from one state to another. In Social Studies we will be completing our unit on mapping this month. We will use the concepts learned to better our understanding of the various regions of Canada. We will also be discussing, and learning about how the environment and geography impacts people.

Grades 1 & 2 Ms. A. Cruzada

For our academic activities: In Language Arts, we will continue to do guided reading and small group instruction using activities on Read To Me Framework. For Social Studies, we are learning about the Seven Sacred Teachings, and we started with the beaver that teaches wisdom. We had great discussions on how to make good choices, and ways on how to give respect and kindness to all the people that surround us. In Math, we learned about skip counting by 2's, 5's and 10's, place value, equal/not equal and continue to work on adding numbers with and without regroupings, while practicing mental math strategies. For Science, we learned about four seasons in Canada and different forms of energy, including light, heat, electrical, and motion.

Lastly, students are excited for our upcoming field trip on the 13th of February to the Royal Aviation Museum of Western Canada and learn the history and wonders behind the science of flight while having fun.



Grades 1 - 6 AP - Ms. L. Costello

The students persevered through the cold weather and are looking forward to warmer days to spend outside. They are looking forward to getting back on the sleds and playground. The students have been busy working on their speech goals and using their communication devices on a daily basis. We have been playing both group and cooperative games to help with taking turns and playing together. A fun activity we have been doing is playing with shaving cream on the tables. Everyone loves the feel of squishing it between their fingers, and the tables are so clean afterward. The students will be starting Music Therapy with Bang a Beat again this month and we are all so excited to see Ms. Rowena again.







Grades 5 & 6 - Mr. B. Kussin

This month we will continue our look into the classification of living organisms. This is always a popular and interesting topic for students to explore. Canadian history will continue to be our focus in social studies as we continue to learn about the First and Second World War which will eventually lead us onto the topics of understanding stereotyping, prejudice and discrimination and work our way toward the Holocaust. In Math, we are continuing to build on understanding of multiplication, division, factors and multiples and in Language Arts, we will continue to improve our writing skills by integrating topics and issues from other subject areas through our continued practice of Reading Eggs. We will also be preparing for the Grade 5/6 camp at Camp Cedarwood! There already is quite a bit of excitement and anticipation that has been generated. We are all looking forward to this event!! Also, remember this month is I Love to Read Month! Children become better writers and more literate the more they read so please impress upon your child that reading and comprehension is one of the key indicators of success.



Grades 4 & 5 Mr. B. Papineau

In January we began learning about the first inhabitants of Canada and North America. At this age group, students learn theories about origins, cultural groups and survival, and the differences between Indigenous groups over the six main regions in Canada. Upcoming in February we will probably also start learning about Family Life education, which includes topics about growing up, puberty, and safety; If parents have any questions, they can contact Mr Papineau at the school. For February's Black History Month, we are sharing the class novel "Beatrice and Croc Harry," by Canadian author Lawrence Hill.

As well, we have continued working hard in all subject areas: solving math problems as well as regular skill assessment and practice; and learning new writing techniques in our Read to Me groups, and how to include important and interesting details in our written work. Finally, we created, filmed, and presented our assembly presentation about problem solving for the end of the month, 'What do You do With a Chance,' and we hope you all enjoyed that. 


Grades 2 & 3 Ms. K. Rosenberg

I hope you are all getting out to enjoy our Winnipeg winter! In social studies, we are learning about mapping and the continents. Students have also been exploring the features of structures in science.

We have been very busy in our classroom over the last month. We have been finishing up learning about all the different systems in the human body. We have continued to add to Mr. Jeff Systems and he is looking great. We really had a lot of fun building him. We decided that the



next topic we are going to learn about is Simple Machines. We are excited to get going on that and are planning some fun projects. In math we are multiplying!! We are learning to use arrays to show our thinking and practicing our multiplication facts. Playing dice games at home where you roll two dice and have to multiply the numbers together is a great way to practice our facts. In ELA we are continuing with our intermediate read to me model. Some of us are practicing paragraph writing and working with informative texts while others are doing a novel study and working on predictions. We are all using a program called Reading Eggs which is helping to solidify all we are learning. In Social Studies we have begun talking about the fur trade. We have looked at the different animals that were important in the fur trade and talked quite a bit about how to build the best trading post possible. Don't forget that February is I Love To Read Month. Ask your child to tell you all about the fun activities we are planning

and encourage them to read as much as possible. We are keeping a tally of all the books we are reading for the month. Let's try to get that number as high as possible.



Grades 5 & 6 - Ms. C. Fraser

We are entering into the most exciting time of the school year, at least for grade 5 and 6 students. The excitement at this time of year begins to rise as the anticipation of winter camp is around the corner. We have started to discuss what can be expected at winter camp, watched videos, and heard exciting stories from the grade 6 students that attended last year. Get ready to have some very excited and eager kids coming home and wanting to get ready for camp.

In class we have begun to learn about the human body and are discussing the various systems within the human body that make it run so efficiently. This will come in handy as we do a lot of outdoor activities at camp and we will be learning about how our muscles, bones, and body systems help us to be able to do these activities. We will be tying our Social Studies to our human body studies when we delve into the wild, crazy, and a bit gross history of disease. We will be looking into where these diseases originated around the world, how they may have affected people (different classes), the spread of disease in terms of geography and how it travelled,

Coach Program - Mr. M. Jefkins

The daylight hours are getting longer, can you feel it? Our school days remain full and fun. We finished our second novel of the year, Touching Spirit Bear, and are now enjoying Reboot. Spirit Bear was a nice fit with our current social studies theme of the Fur Trade and our Science focus on Canadian animals. In the story characters come up with dances to represent the animals found in the local wilderness. They followed up with carving representations of these animals on their totem poles. We examined the furs of many animals, including beaver. Did you know that one of the official symbols of Canada is the beaver? It was a very important animal in the fur trade and inspired lots of European immigration. Our Indigenous Initiative teacher, Norway, brought in a Bison, also known as Buffalo, hide. We had a

lesson on Respect, from the Seven Sacred Teachings, which is represented by the Buffalo. In art Ms. Brenna is teaching us how to glaze our own plates. It was a big project but so

worth it. We can't wait to show you the final results. We continue to work hard on our assignments and play hard at recess and choice time.



The Grade one and two students have had a wonderful start to the 2024 year! We started off in January finishing off some units, such as Celebrations and Traditions in Social Studies, Blends and Digraphs in English Language Arts and Daily and Seasonal Changes in Science. We also started some of our new units, such as Five Senses and Measurement. We will be continuing to learn about these units into February. We will also be starting some new units in February; in Social Studies will begin our inquiry into My Community. We will be taking a closer look at jobs in our community as well as places in our community. In ELA we have been focusing on Other Vowel Patterns: this includes words that have 'oo'. 'ea'. 'igh', etc. Students have also been practicing writing on their own, and sounding out words they don't know how to spell. This will become a big focus for the class as we move into February.

In January we enjoyed our first jungle gym Friday and the students all loved it. Norway from the Link's Indigenous Initiatives team has been sharing stories with the students and we are learning more about the seven teachings. Students have been working so hard on Daily 5 activities and are showing so much growth in reading and writing. We are finished up the novel Restart as our read aloud. In February we are really looking forward to going on our annual ice fishing trip! We are also excited to see how much our Roots of empathy baby Leo has grown and what new things she can do. In Social Studies and Science we are learning about the fur trade and about fur bearing mammals. We are also looking forward to all our guest readers for I Love to Read month.







Kindergarten AM/PM Ms. H. Dumond

Lots of learning took place in January. We learned to recognize, print, identify sounds for the letters Cc, Kk, Gg, and Ww.

Students were introduced to a computer program called "Reading Eggs". This program focuses on beginning reading skills as well as phonics. Each student has their own account where lessons are geared toward their own individual level and their progress is recorded.

We have been using card games to learn math skills including number recognition and more/less/same. While playing games with their peers, students have also been practicing sportsmanship. We are learning to win and lose gracefully.

In January, students created an art piece inspired by the artist Wassily Kandinsky.

We have been reading stories by the author Todd Parr. His books have wonderful messages highlighting diversity, feelings, and acceptance.







Welcome to Ms. Brenna's Artists Alley

Welcome back once again to Ms. Brenna's Artists Alley! All grade groups have begun work on their next clay/glazing projects or have been making good progress on their Famous Artists Unit. The Gr. 1/2 class are continuing to learn about Piet Mondrian. Once they have finished making their complex images simpler and simpler (or as Piet would say "more true"), they are starting to make a window catcher using their straight line Mondrian style drawings.

The Gr. 2/3's are continuing to learning about clay and specifically about carving, which is the removing of clay. They have practiced carving their patterns into a flat tile of clay, next they are starting on their candle dishes, into which they will carve their patterns. Highlighted in this week's artist alley are the Grade 3/4's and COACH students. They have been hard at work on their Habitat plates. Most students have started the glazing process after having done a look draw of their habitat as well as a circular drawing of their habitats. I'm so excited to be seeing such good work from everyone! Meanwhile the Grade 4/5's have started the book binding process for their memory books with any luck we will have some finished books ready to end off "I love to read month". The Grade 5/6's are continuing their famous artist art piece replications. Most students are starting work on their good copies. The results are looking very promising, your hard work in the planning phases is really paying off. I am just blown away with all the hard work everyone is doing on their

various projects. Everyone has been super focused this month! Keep it up.

away. They also shared how to effectively and confidently take risks and see chances as opportunities to try new things. The students presented their video during a Monday morning assembly. Here are some images from their video:











Make plans to celebrate Manitoba's Louis Riel Day, Family Day February 19, 2024 with your family and friends.

Louis Riel was a passionate Métis leader. He was a catalyst in the events that occurred making Manitoba become Canada's fifth province joining confederation in 1871. Louis Riel had a dream of a civilized world that embraces all cultures and is celebrated by all Manitobans on Louis Riel Day.

Why Remember Louis Riel?

Louis Riel is recognized as an advocate of justice for the Métis people, but he represents much more. He helped lay the framework for minority rights and cultural cooperation, and is one of the founders of Manitoba. It is very important to remember Louis Riel's contribution to Canada.




A resolution was passed by parliament citing that Louis Riel was one of the Founders of Manitoba on March 10, 1992. In numerous communities in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Ontario, Riel is commemorated in the names of streets, schools, and other buildings (such as the Louis Riel School Division in Winnipeg). The student center and student area at the University of Saskatchewan in Saskatoon are named after Riel. Highway 11, stretching from Regina to just south of Prince Albert, has been named Louis Riel Trail by the province; the roadway passes

near Batoche. One of the student residences at Simon Fraser University in Burnaby, British Columbia is named Louis Riel House.

Riel House National Historic Site in Winnipeg explores the life of Louis Riel and his significant contribution to protect social, cultural and political rights.

On September 26, 2007, the Manitoba legislature passed a bill establishing a statutory holiday on the third Monday in February as Louis Riel Day, the same day some other provinces celebrate Family Day, beginning in 2008. The first Louis Riel Day was celebrated on February 18, 2008. This new statutory holiday coincides with the annual event of the Festival Du Voyageur in Winnipeg.



Black History Month

Black History Month occurs during the month of February. It is a special time to reflect, and consider all of the important contributions and events that have created the Canada we live in today, and to celebrate the achievements and culture of Black Canadians.

"The story of Black History Month dates back to 1926 in the United States. At that time, an African-American historian named Carter G. Woodson founded a week that focused on celebrating the accomplishments of African Americans. He decided on a week in February because two important men were born in that month. The first was Frederick Douglass, a former enslaved person in the 1800s who spoke out for the freedom of enslaved people, as well as equal rights for women. And the second was Abraham Lincoln. As the 16th president of the United States, Lincoln fought for the freedom of all enslaved people throughout the country. While Woodson's idea began as a one-week celebration, it eventually became a month-long event called Black Heritage Month in the United States in 1976. And in 1995, Canada's government officially recognized February as Black History Month." (CBC Kids, 2024)

This year's Black History Month theme, as reported by the Government of Canada is, Black Excellence: A Heritage to Celebrate; a Future to Build, and we are thrilled to learn about some of those excellent individuals this month. Potato Soup

Ingredients

3 1/2 cups (about 2 large) russet potatoes, peeled and diced

1 1/2 cups (9oz) cooked honey ham, diced

1/2 cup celery diced small

1/2 cup onion diced small

4 cups (2 15oz cans) chicken broth

5 tablespoons butter

1/4 cup and 1 tablespoon (44g) all-purpose flour

2 cups milk, (any percentage)

1/4 teaspoon black pepper and Salt

Instructions

Boil In a large pot, combine potatoes, ham, celery, onions, and chicken broth. Bring to a low boil and cook over medium heat until vegetables are fork-tender, 10 to 15 minutes.

Make the roux

In a medium saucepan, melt butter over medium heat and whisk in flour. Cook, stirring constantly until flour is golden, about one minute. Slowly add in milk, continuing to stir so that no lumps form and cook until mixture is thick, about 5 minutes.

Combine

Pour flour and milk mixture into the soup and stir. Add pepper, and salt to taste. Serve and enjoy.

School Attendance Information for Parents

Why Is It Important to Encourage Attendance Everyday?

Regular school attendance helps children to maximise the educational opportunities available to them, and prepares them to reach their full potential ensuring they acquire the skills to prepare them for their individual path beyond graduation.

Building good habits as early as pre-school, parents must take all measures to ensure their child/ren attend(s) school regularly.

Parents, caregivers, and students are all responsible for making sure students are on time and ready to learn.

Types of Absences

- **Excused Absence**: refers to any time both the parent/caregiver and the school approves an absence. In some cases, documentation from the parent/caregiver may be required so that the school can excuse an absence. Examples include a note from a parent/caregiver or health care provider.
- **Unexcused Absence**: refers to any time a student is not in class or participating in a school activity without approval by the parent/caregiver.

Chronically Absent or Chronic Absenteeism: refers to excessive absences of a student for any reason, whether excused or unexcused. Chronic absent in 10% of school year 19 days missed. Server chronic is 20% of school year, 38 days missed

What Parents Can Do to Support Presence and Engagement at School

- Talk to your child about the importance of going to school everyday.
- Set an example of what good attendance looks like.
- Help your child get organized for school the night before; encourage your child to keep a daily to-do list.
- Have regular bed time and morning routines.
- Follow personal health practices that reduce the risk of your child becoming ill and promote healthy lifestyle practices such as regular exercise.
- Connect with your child's school early in the school year; establish a collaborative relationship with your child's teacher(s).
- Get involved; join your child's school council and participate in school community events during and after school.
- Be interested in your child's learning; ask questions, celebrate accomplishments.
- Ensure the school has current contact information.
 Avoid scheduling medical appointments and vacation when school is in session.

SafeArrival for Families FAQ

What is SafeArrival?

SafeArrival is an absence management system that improves student safety and makes it easy for you to let the school know about your child's absence.

You are asked to report your child's absence in advance whenever possible using one of these convenient methods:

SchoolMessenger app (free)

- Provide your email address to the school.
- 2. Get the app from the Apple App Store or the Google Play Store (or from the links at https://qo.schoolmessenger.ca).

- 4. Select Attendance from the menu, and then select Report an Absence.

If you hang up before this is given the absence will be cancelled and will not be reported to the Whenever an absence is reported or updated, you will receive a confirmation notice by email (assuming you have provided your contact information to the school).

If you don't report your child's absence in advance, the automated notification system will try to contact you (using the communication preferences if you have set them up in the SchoolMessenger app). This may include push notifications to the app, email, phone calls. You will be asked to provide the reason for your child's absence immediately. You may do so using the phone line, website or mobile app.

If an absence is not explained within approximately 20 minutes of the time that the school starts the notification process, school staff will follow-up to make sure that your child is safe. If you try to explain an absence using SafeArrival, but are then told that it is past the cut-off time, please contact the school directly.

If you don't want to receive notifications when your child is absent, be sure to report your child's absence in advance.

If you do receive notifications of your child's absence, be sure to provide the reason as quickly as possible, using one of the 3 methods listed above or during the phone call notification itself.

Absences can be reported in advance:

- 24 hours/day
- 7 days a week
- For any school day in the school term
- Up to the cut-off time on the day of the absence.



Morning Drop Off and Afternoon 3:30 PM Dismissal

We would like to remind our families that there is supervision for students beginning at 8:45AM in the morning on the Mulvey playground. Our marvelous students have been excellent at lining up at their classrooms' numbers painted on the hardtop next to the side of the school on the hardtop. Students will be able to begin coming into the school at 8:45 AM.

During 3:30 PM dismissal, we are respectfully asking that you greet your children at 3:30 PM in the fencing on the hardtop next to their classroom number so that our students are safely dismissed to a parent/guardian/family member/caregiver.

Please keep the front area of the school and the staircase entrance way to the school playground and field clear for easy access to and from the hardtop.



Student Bus Safety

School Bus Ridership is practiced at schools, but the Transportation Department would like all to be aware:

For Drivers

- Flashing yellow lights on the school bus mean the bus is getting ready to stop and load or unload. You need to slow down and get ready to stop.
- Flashing red lights mean the bus has stopped and children are getting on or off. It is illegal to pass a school bus from either direction once it's stopped and has its lights activated unless there is a physical barrier (such as a median) between your vehicle and the bus.
- As soon as the bus driver turns on the flashing red lights, drivers coming from both directions must immediately stop at least five metres from the bus and remain stopped until the lights stop flashing, the STOP arm folds away and the bus begins to move.
- Be extremely cautious around school buses and remember young children are nearby and move quickly.

For Parents

- Educate your children about bus safety etiquette.
- Teach them to stay away from the three danger zones the front, sides and back of the bus by staying at least three meters away from the school bus.
- If children must cross the street, they must never cross behind the school bus, they should seek the
 driver's permission, take five giant steps past the front of the bus and make sure the driver has seen
 them before crossing.
- Teach them to watch for other traffic before crossing the road.
- If children drop something near or under the school bus, they should never attempt to retrieve it without the driver's permission.
- Ensure that they get to the bus stop at least five minutes before the school bus arrives.
- Teach them to never run after the school bus if they arrive late at the bus stop.
- Teach them to take five giant steps away from the road when the school bus is approaching.

Bus Route Cancellations:

During the year there may be times when inclement weather affects bus transportation and school opening. School bus transportation for all school divisions in the City of Winnipeg is cancelled when the wind chill reaches -45°C by 6:15 a.m. based on the 6:00 a.m. Environment Canada readings at the Forks, Winnipeg. The temperature readings can be found at the Environment Canada website. When bus transportation is cancelled in the morning, it will not resume later in the day even if weather conditions improve. All major Winnipeg media outlets are contacted in the early morning and are asked that they broadcast and/or post bus cancellation information and it is posted on winnipegsd.ca.

Transportation clerks also inform families when busses are cancelled through School Messenger so it is very important for families to provide their child's school with an <u>updated</u> email address and/or cell phone number.

Closed school announcements will be posted on the <u>winnipegsd.ca</u> website and broadcast by major Winnipeg media outlets.
