I took the partial IB programme at Kelvin, taking only IB Biology and English, but found taking even just two classes to be very beneficial. It certainly was a higher workload than my friends who weren't in the IB programme, but I felt much more prepared once I came to university. I found that I have a lot easier time analyzing and understanding works in my first-year English class compared to my peers, since there is a lot less specific help and direction from professors. I have had no problem with the amount of reading and felt that in some ways, my English course in high school was harder. I will say that the English department at Kelvin, especially, does a great job of getting the most out of every work that they can. We studied a variety of different things, from novels, to plays, to poetry, and at times would only spend a week or so on each work. However, I feel that I got good understanding of each work before we moved on.

I have found the IB staff to be extremely helpful with anything you need, whether it is a question about credit transfer, improving your grade, or just some academic or life advice. They have been some of my favourite teachers that I have had Kelvin because they care about each student individually. The programme is very organized, I remember being surprised when I first joined at how Mrs. Decelles (the IB Coordinator) kept track of everything, and seemed to have the answers to any questions we had, sent in an email, before we even had a chance to ask them!
