Greetings from grades 5 and 6 in room 103!

We have been having lots of fun researching, creating, and showing our understanding. We have researched, created, and shared many presentations for our Space and Water units. We dove into Book Club for the first time and it was a huge success. We chose books, not by the cover but by the blurb on the back of the book. We then set (and met) reading goals and enjoyed having conversations with our group members about our new favourite novels. Our writing over the last couple of months has focused on personal narratives as well as note-taking and information writing for our research projects. Math has been all about hands-on activities. We used a variety of tools to help us understand and explain our math thinking in fractions and we've been using rulers and protractors to create art that shows our understanding of lines, 2-D shapes, and angles.

English Language Arts

In writing, we just completed a fantastic exploration of poetry, including reading and writing 5 senses poems, shape poems, cinquain poems, and more! This month, we are moving into our fourth and final Unit of Study - fairy tales! Students will read/listen to classic fairy tales and fairy tale adaptations. They will adapt either The Three Billy Goats Gruff or Little Red Riding Hood by making changes to characters, setting (time and/or place), or plot (problem/solution). Then, they will adapt a fairy tale of their choice, and finally create their own original fairy tale. This unit is a lot of fun, as students get to really use their imaginations and solidify their understanding of narrative writing.

Math

Over the last two months, we have been working on multiplication and division. Grade 3s learned ways to represent multiplication/division - equal groups, arrays, skip counting, and repeated addition/subtraction. Grade 4s worked on strategies such as doubling/halving, repeated doubling, doubling and adding a group, and using patterns to solve multiplication and division problems with larger numbers. We will be finishing the year together by working on fractions and decimals.

Social Studies

We did some exciting learning about Ancient Egypt with our student teacher, Ms. Shemluk, throughout April. We even created pyramids using clay! This month, we will finish our exploration of World Communities by studying Zimbabwe before wrapping up the year with an inquiry into Treaties in Canada.

Science

We explored Light by conducting lots of hands-on experiments to observe and describe properties of light. Our final unit - Habitats and Communities will be enhanced with an exciting field trip to the Assiniboine Park Zoo, where students will participate in the program Worldwide Webs: Predator and Prey Relationships.

Health

We have been learning about helpful and harmful substances and factors that influence our decision making (such as peer and media pressure).

Art

We continue to participate in the RWB Shared Dance program - engaging in a variety of dance and drama activities that explore how we can use our body to communicate ideas, thoughts, and feelings.











Welcome to Room 134

In April, Room 134 proudly hosted the school assembly. The students were excited to take the lead and share what they had been learning. Their focus was on the power of asking questions. They spoke about how asking questions helps them learn, grow, and make better choices. Through their thoughtful personal reflections, the students in Room 134 showed that curiosity plays an important role in learning and growing. Great job to all the students for inspiring us to stay curious and ask questions!

In English Language Arts, the students have been working hard to learn the art of information writing. They have been exploring how to research a topic, organize their ideas, and share what they know clearly and interestingly. From animals and space to sports and famous landmarks, students chose topics they were passionate about. They practiced writing strong introductions, using headings, and adding fun facts to keep their readers engaged. They enjoyed playing Literacy games!



In Math, the students have been working hard to develop a strong understanding of multiplication and division. Through hands-on activities and visual strategies, they are learning how these operations are connected and how to solve problems in different ways. To explore multiplication, students used arrays, repeated addition, skip counting, and number lines to represent and solve equations. These strategies help students see that multiplication is just adding equal groups and make it easier to understand how numbers work together. When learning about division, students used arrays and base ten blocks to model how a number can be split into equal groups. They also began to see how division and multiplication are closely related—for example, understanding that if $3 \times 4 = 12$, then $12 \div 4 = 3$. This connection helps strengthen their number sense and problemsolving skills.



It's been exciting to see students explain their thinking, try different strategies, and discover that math can be both fun and meaningful!

Habitats and Communities- The students have been exploring the fascinating world of Habitats and Communities. They have been learning about how animals meet their needs for food, water, shelter, and space in different environments, and how living things are connected in these ecosystems.

We can't believe it's already MAY! Only 2 more months remain. Our class has truly become a family this school year. We will be sad to bid our farewells to our fellow Grade 6 students at the end of June, but know that they will make us proud in their future endeavors.

<u>ELA</u>

Upon return from Spring Break, students began to learn about free verse poems. Free verse poems are not like your traditional rhyming poem. They are not constrained by specific rules. Instead, free verse poems focus more on imagery, sound, and description. Students learned that free verse poems sometimes contain alliteration and personification as well. To try out this learning, students wrote free verse poems about SPRING. We also read the story, "Ish" by Peter H. Reynolds and created crumple paper watercolour backgrounds to display our poems on.

<u>Science</u>

We are currently preparing for Robertson School's very first annual Science Fair which will take place on May 22nd. Students have selected a topic of their choice and will be using the scientific inquiry process. This method will involve making observations, formulating questions, conducting research, developing hypotheses, designing experiments, collecting and analyzing data, drawing conclusions, and communicating findings. We can't wait to share our findings with the judges, our school community, and our families!

Spring Concert

On Thursday, April 24, Room 104 (or should I say - The MasterChefs) performed their rendition of "Hello" by Lionel Richie in front of a full audience at our Spring Concert night. Months of preparation went into this show and we are so proud of each and every one of them. As Gordon Ramsay says, "The secret ingredient is always love," and we sure do abide by that.



A Glimpse into Room 149

April was a busy and exciting month in our classroom, filled with curiosity, creativity, and hands-on learning.

Animal Inquiry Project

Each student researched an animal of their choice and created an *informational* book featuring their animal's appearance, diet, habitat, fun facts, and a glossary. To showcase their learning, students then designed a diorama that represented their animal's habitat and sculpted their animal out of plasticine—what a fantastic job they all did!



Social Studies - Mapping

We've been learning how to locate our local community, city, and province on a map. Students practiced identifying where they live and started to understand how their place fits into the bigger picture of our country.

Math - Parts Whole

We've been diving deeper into *Parts and Whole* with the support of Ms. McGee. Using tools like Cuisenaire rods and other manipulatives, students worked on breaking down numbers and understanding how they fit together. These activities have helped to build their number sense in a fun and meaningful way.



Looking ahead to May, we'll continue exploring in all subject areas. In Social Studies, students will compare Prince Edward Island to Winnipeg, noticing similarities and differences in geography, and culture. In Math, we'll continue our work with Parts and Whole before transitioning to working with number lines to support addition and subtraction strategies. For Writing, we're excited to begin our Series Stories! Each student will create their own character and write a series of short stories featuring them.

Students in room 147 have been working on a variety of skills. Above are some highlights of working with our Learning Buddies designing a basket to hold the most eggs!

We continue to work on counting collections. We are currently working on counting pom poms, seeds, and "raindrop counters" through center activities. In addition, we continue to practice using number sentences to add or subtract with adult help. Students have been working on looking for patterns in the environment and replicating patterns through sounds and actions, as well as pictures.

Some of our learning has been focused on Indigenous culture and practices. We are currently reading a very interesting book that has shown us all about different trees and the importance of the birch tree to the Indigenous people for making a variety of things. Students have learned about different animals and plants as well.

In Language Arts we have been practicing tracing letters and identifying parts of our name that have been cut into segments. We have also been working on drawing pictures with details to tell a story.


