The Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) student committee has been working very hard to educate themselves and prepare to share their learning with Robertson School. For the month of November, the students will be participating in their own version of Jane Goodalls's **No Waste November** by focusing on reducing our personal waste. Personal waste can come in the form of over consumerism, continued use of single use items, excess food waste, textile waste through fast fashion, and the overuse of power. The ESD committee will share their learning at the November assembly as well as provide classrooms with their learning. In addition to sharing their learning, there will be a school wide **trash challenge** on November 13th. On November 13th students are encouraged to evaluate their daily personal waste and bring and produce the least amount of trash as they can.

Evaluating personal waste, local waste, and global waste can lead to small personal changes that will add up to having a large impact on Mother Earth and the seven generations to come. Finding ways to reduce waste strongly connects to the United Nations 17 goals for sustainable development.



The plan to sustain a no waste lifestyle is to:

- set a sustainable goal to reduce personal waste (food, clothing, single use items, water, or power waste)
- educate others about the impact that excess waste has on Mother Earth and its people
- continue to reach our goal even after the month of November is over

Reducing waste is not intended to be an overwhelming task. Rather, it is meant to be an opportunity to evaluate and reflect on daily habits.

Dear Families,

Did you know, according to Waste Reduction Week Canada (wrwcanada.com), only fifteen percent unwanted clothing items are collected and reused while 85 percent end up in landfills? In an effort to work towards a more sustainable future we will be collecting gently used winter items for others who are in need.

Our goal is to collect clean and gently used winter jackets, ski pants, mittens, gloves, scarves, toques, and neck warmers. We are collecting items for people of any age and size.

We also ask that you take note of items that your family may need as the donated winter items will be on display for families to look through and take what they need to stay warm in the winter opposed to purchasing new items. By finding a second home for winter gear, we are greatly reducing the impact that clothing has on the environment.

Greetings from grade 5/6 in room 103!

We are two months into the school year and we have been busy! Most mornings the students of room 103 participate in Morning Meetings where they practice friendly greetings, share a little about themselves, and participate in games and challenges. This allows them to work on communication and group work skills in a fun and safe environment.

We have already hosted our first assembly with room 101. Our focus was on choosing peace by being responsible and staying out of trouble. Many students had the opportunity to perform a small skit in front of the rest of the school.

In Social Studies, students worked in groups to research and present findings related to residential schools, Inuit culture, and arctic life as a way to develop a deeper understanding of the true story, <u>Fatty Legs</u> by residential school survivor, Margaret Pokiak.



In Science we are focusing on nutrition. Students now know how to evaluate nutrition labels in order to make informed choices for a healthy diet. They also created criteria to investigate similar food items. They will now use the information they learned to create a prototype to make a better product.

and One, Two, Buckle my shoe along with counting the boys and girls present each day in our.







Students have enjoyed painting fall trees using cotton balls, an activity that supports the development of their fine motor skills. We are so proud of the progress Room 147 students have made in these early weeks of school. It's wonderful to see them growing in confidence and building essential skills while having fun.

Grade 3/4 Room P1 News

It has been a great first two months in grade 3/4! Here is a glimpse into what we have been up to:

English Language Arts

- narrative writing telling our own true stories by balancing actions and dialogue, telling our stories bit-by-bit, using descriptive words and phrases, and including setting details
- setting classroom and individual reading goals

Math

- estimation making reasonable estimates using a referent
- representing numbers using concrete materials, pictures, and number sentences
- comparing and ordering numbers



Social Studies

- learning about maps and globes, oceans and continents, latitude & longitude, and hemispheres
- using a compass rose, map legend, scale, and coordinates

Science

conducting an inquiry into materials and structures- what they are, what their purpose
is, how to make materials and structures stronger

Art

- learning about two elements of art: line and texture, and how to create perspective
- exploring different mediums (ex. pastels, paints)



Health

 learning how to regulate our bodies and prepare our minds for learning by using mindful moments and breathing

During October, our classroom was lively with phonics activities as we focused on letter sounds and engaging in fun games and activities. These activities helped students better recognize and pronounce different letters which improved our reading abilities and confidence with new words. Alongside our phonics work, we also enjoyed counting collections in math, where we learned to count by 2's, 5's, and 10's using music and different math manipulatives. This made counting a fun challenge and helped us understand number patterns while strengthening our math skills.



As the month progressed, our exploration included seasonal changes and the sun's influence on our days. We learned about the sun's role in seasons and timekeeping. We also focused on learning about our local community. To kick off the unit, we started by observing the different elements in our local community, discussing how they change with the seasons, and how they connect to our everyday lives. This exploration fostered a deeper appreciation for our environment and encouraged students to be observant and informed citizens, tying together our learning experiences in a meaningful way.



October was a fun month of learning, and I look forward to seeing their growth and development in the coming months!

Room 104 News

Writer's Workshop

We have started off the year with our Units of Study writing program. Our first unit focuses on writing personal narratives. We began this unit by learning strategies for thinking of topics (think of a person or place that matter to you, think of times when you had strong feelings, and think of first times or last times). From these ideas, students have selected a seed story which will be developed over the course of several weeks. Using a mentor text, we explored the idea of using a story mountain as a way to plan out our stories, prior to writing. Lately, since we are so close to Halloween, students have carried over this learning as we have been working on some **spooky** stories. They are bone-chillingly good!

Math

In math, we started off the year learning about place value, and brushing up on our multiplication/ division facts and strategies. Having an excellent understanding of place value is so important for the math that is to come! Same goes for multiplication and division - especially for the Grade 6 students - as we go on to learn about factors and multiples. The Grade 4 and 5 students have also begun learning about different addition strategies, starting with the place value strategy. In addition to our math groups, students have enjoyed solving open-ended problems in groups using our vertical non-permanent surfaces.

Social Studies

Every single day before school starts, students stand to listen to the Land Acknowledgement. It also plays prior to the start of sporting events and other important conferences and celebrations. Why is it so important that we have a Land Acknowledgement? The students in Room 104 have been delving into this question the last couple of months and they have an answer for you! After learning about treaties in Manitoba and some indigenous history including residential schools, students created their own Land Acknowledgement. Their own personal acknowledgements include the following:

- Name and cultural background
- A statement of recognition (Why we need a Land Acknowledgement?)
- Acknowledgement of the land we are on
- A promise
- Appreciation for Mother Earth

We encourage you to think about what your own Land Acknowledgement might include!
