



When a child misbehaves the first time, a verbal warning will be given. The second time, a written letter will be sent home. Within this letter it will state that your child will be removed from the Lunch Program. Then you will need to make alternate arrangements for your child. In the event of a serious incident - your child WILL BE REMOVED immediately without warning.














# Room 116 (Grade 5/6)

# 1. TO CREATE INTEREST BY BUILDING CONNECTIONS:

- Curiosity Corner: Where Magic Meets Learning! Welcome to our Curiosity Corner, where every morning kicks off with a thrilling challenge! From mind-bending science magic to enchanting math puzzles, students dive in to solve the mysteries of the day.
- Morning Circle: Feel the Spark! In our Morning Circle, we check in on how everyone's feeling! Students place their name tags under different emotions, letting us know if they're ready to learn or need a little extra support. This simple act not only helps us connect but also strengthens our classroom bond. Let's light up the day together!
- Dive into the Microbial World! The students explore the hidden wonders of the microscopic universe! With our microscopes, students create their own slides and unleash their curiosity to unearth the fascinating world of microbes. Who knows what tiny treasures await?
- <u>2. 



























### 3. CREATIVE STEAM CHALLENGES:
