
Grade 4 to 6 Track (Elementary Relays)

Hello from the music room!

December has been a great month of music making at RHS! Students have been hard at work. The 4s, 5s, and 6s have worked on songs in small groups. Some groups shared their work with the school at our first Spirit Week concert, and some students chose to share with their classes or record a video. The 1-3/4s have been busy working on songs that they will share in the upcoming winter concert. The 5/6s have been helping their buddies learn their songs. It



has been a great chance for leadership. The younger students love learning from their buddies and the older students love sharing their knowledge and skills with the younger students. It has been exciting to see the community across the grades! Our older students are so enthusiastic in helping! They bring a positive, supportive, and kind attitude to our young ones. It's great to see how our older students are giving back to their community here at RHS!

Students in N-3/4 will be holding winter concerts in the new year on February 8th. Our students have been hard at work preparing covers of songs that they know and love as well as french originals that they are creating. Ms. Daniels and Mme. In the new year we will get excited for our 3rd Annual RHS StreetFest and look to build on the success from last year and make some changes to continue improving the format. We will limit students in grades 4-6 to two songs with their bands in order to run a tighter event. This is a chance for students to showcase their best work to their families and our community.

Recess jams continue at morning recess and afternoon recess. Students in grades 4-6 are always welcome to come down and work on their projects or get a jam started in the morning and/or afternoon recess. In January we will dedicate some lunch hours to prepare for our upcoming Open House.

This year we are looking at starting a "Be an Upstander" Song Writing Club. The Be an Upstander program is run by the Human Rights Museum. This year they are running a Beyond the Beat exhibition. Here is some info about the program.

"The school programming for Beyond the Beat runs parallel to our Be an Upstander program. An upstander is someone who recognizes injustice and uses their strengths, gifts and abilities to create change. The Beyond the Beat exhibition features upstanders who used and continue to use their musical abilities to help raise awareness and take a stand against injustices.

The Be an Upstander Showcase is an annual event which amplifies students' voices and work for human rights. Students are invited to share their work in the Museum galleries and talk with visitors about how they are taking action to turn injustice into justice. Inspired by the Beyond the Beat exhibition, this year the showcase will expand to include a music element allowing students who have been working on music projects for human rights to perform what they have prepared. This year's showcase will be May 23, 2024 at the Canadian Museum for Human Rights."

This will be our first go with a music club like this so we will dive in and see what happens! This club will be open to students in grades 4-6.

Thanks for the continued support! Our music community is always growing and developing. Our students at RHS work hard and it's paying off. Keep it up!

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE LEARNING LAB - Mme Zurrin

Term 2 is off to an exciting start! There is so much learning to celebrate! This month, I would like to highlight learning that is taking place in three areas.

Historical Thinking and Inquiry - Grade 4 French and English

(Room 113 and Room 114 (Grades 3 and 4), and Room 117)

Students and Teachers are collaborating with Ms. Clara Kusumoto, a Division Program Support Teacher with Professional Support Services (PSS). The focus will be on the Inquiry process and historical thinking concepts.

Inquiry is the dynamic process of being open to wonder and coming to know and understand the world. Inquiry-based learning is the process where students are involved in their learning, create essential questions, investigate widely, and then build new understanding, meaning, and knowledge. Students will learn about the Question Formulation Technique (QFT) and will learn and apply the QFT to deepen their knowledge, produce rich questions, and investigate topics related. 
Looking forward with the end goal in mind, students will apply their skills to create and develop an inquiry project/presentation that will showcase their learning by the end of Term 2.

Language and Writing - Grade 1 (Rooms 120 and P5)

Students and Teachers are collaborating with Ms. Lori Brinkman, a Division Program Lead with Professional Support Services (PSS). We look forward to working on developing language and writing skills in the classroom. More information will be forthcoming.

Design Thinking and STEAM - Grade 5/6 Team French and English

All Grade 5 and 6 students will be collaborating with Mme Tina Hellmuth, a Division STEAM Support Teacher (French Immersion and English). Students will use the Design Thinking Process as well as their communication and problem-solving skills to engage in creative, collaborative, and critical thinking challenges. As their learning evolves, students look forward to showcasing their skills and talents at the end of Term 2.

As the Literacy and Numeracy Support Teacher, I look forward to working with staff and students in various capacities to support the learning around these projects.

QUIET RECESS

Many of the skills that students engage in everyday, such as learning, socializing, communicating, and listening, are rigorous tasks. Most students need moments in their day to reset their nervous system and take a break from the stimulation of a classroom environment. Typically, this break occurs several times a day during outdoor recess (if our winter permits (a)). Students get an opportunity to burn some energy, play, make connections with others, and regroup. However, not all students need to regulate their bodies with movement. Many children need a quiet moment and a calm space where they can re-charge their social battery and re-connect with themselves. This is why at Robert H. Smith we have restarted **Quiet Recess.** Students who choose to participate enter the dimmed library in silence with a quiet, independent activity to do



(drawing, colouring, reading, writing, meditating). We have roughly 70 students who participate each recess which validates the decision to offer this choice to our students. We want to teach kids to respect their own needs and the needs of others, as well as begin to understand how their body works, and what they can do to be the best learner in the classroom.

REGISTRATION FOR 2024/2025

NURSERY

Students registering to begin Nursery in September 2024 must be four years of age by December 31, 2024. A **Birth Certificate, Manitoba Medical Card** and **Proof of Residency (Property Tax Bill)** must be presented at time of registration.

Nursery is considered part of the English track program and, therefore, priority will be given to those within the English catchment area. Those students outside the catchment area will be placed on a waiting list.

KINDERGARTEN

Students registering to begin Kindergarten in September 2024 must be five years of age by December 31, 2024. A **Birth Certificate, Manitoba Medical Card** and **Proof of Residency (Property Tax Bill)** must be presented at time of registration.

Please keep in mind that there are two separate, yet overlapping, catchment areas for French Immersion and English Kindergarten. Priority will be given to those within the catchment area and others will be placed on a waiting list.

Parents of students who are **presently** attending the École Robert H. Smith School Nursery Program and who wish to enroll their child in one of the École Robert H. Smith School Kindergarten programs for the fall **do NOI need to attend** the regular registration session for Kindergarten in 2024. They will receive a letter asking them to indicate their intentions for the next year at the beginning of January 2024.

CLASSROOM NEWS FROM ROOM 120 - GRADE 1 (Mme McMurray)

CLASSROOM NEWS FROM ROOM P4 - GRADES 2/3 (Mile. Saunders)



VACATION PLANNING

We are entering a time of year when many of our families are able to get away for a winter holiday. We ask that you let both the office and your child's teacher know of any anticipated travel with as much advance warning as possible. Teachers often work to ensure that specific project times are avoided or try to manage their ongoing assessments of learning around any such extended absences. We are often asked about student homework while children are away and recommend that children continue to read and write daily if possible (keeping a journal, or writing postcards, for example). Dropping Students Off and Picking Students Up

The morning and afternoon routines of dropping students off and picking them up from school has created some safety concerns for our students. We hope to mitigate these concerns with your support.

Morning Drop-Off and Afternoon Pick-Up:

Ash Street:

- If you are stopping on the street without parking to drop off or pick up your children, please use the Stop, Drop and Go Zone on **Ash St. heading northbound.**
- When you arrive at the Stop, Drop and Go Zone, please turn your hazard lights on to indicate you are dropping off a child and pull to the side of the street. Have your child/children exit on the curbside.
- Please do not use the Stop, Drop and Go Zone if heading southbound on Ash St. We would like to discourage southbound traffic on Ash St. as much as possible, but should you find yourself heading southbound on Ash St. please pull over to park and ensure your child is safely able to cross the street.

Oak Street:


- Please do not stop to drop off or pick up your children on Oak St. as this is our school bus zone.
- If you need drop off or pick up your children on Oak St. please enter Oak St. from the Grosvenor intersection, park your vehicle in the direction of parked traffic and walk your child across the street.
- Please avoid using the staff parking lot and alley as a turn-around spot. Again, backing up in these spots creates a dangerous situation for young children crossing the street.

Staff Parking Lot

The staff parking lot is not to be used for student drop off or pick up. Many families walk through the parking lot to

access the early years entry door and having vehicles pull in and back out creates a very dangerous situation.

We thank you for your cooperation and your continued support in keeping our students safe in and around the school.





COLD WEATHER GUIDELINES FOR ÉCOLE ROBERT H. SMITH SCHOOL

Please see the Winnipeg School Division guidelines for recess periods and/or patrol duties during inclement weather. The windchill reading used will be that of Environment Canada at The Forks https://weather.gc.ca/city/pages/mb-36 metric e.html.

Please become familiar with the Cold Weather Guidelines. You may want to place these guidelines somewhere visible for the winter months, it explains when we have indoor recess and when our patrols can and cannot go outside.

In the event we have no patrols going outside due to the windchill indicated, we will have staff members go out and assist us at 8:30 am and/or 3:25 pm. Thank you for your support and understanding.

OFFICE ENTRANCE LOST & FOUND

Every year we have numerous articles which are placed in our Lost and Found and never claimed. All unclaimed articles are donated, at the end of each month. It would help us to return lost articles if outer wear (footwear in particular) and lunch kits were labeled with your child's name.

Do not Walk, Skate, or Play on Frozen Retention Ponds

Retention ponds are never safe to use for winter recreation activities. Ice conditions can change quickly without warning, and falling through the ice can be deadly. Remind your children to stay away from frozen retention ponds. Keep dogs on leashes when walking near a retention pond so they don't run onto the ice.



Do not walk, skate, or play on frozen retention ponds. Talk to your children about staying away from the ice.



Do not place hockey nets, benches, light structures, or any other items on a frozen retention pond. To report a structure or item on a retention pond, contact 311.



If you see someone on a retention pond, call 911.

Water from snowmelt or nearby water main breaks can drain into retention ponds. This water is often mixed with street salts, which can cause ice to melt and thin unevenly. This water enters retention ponds from underneath the ice, resulting in thinning of ice that can't be seen from the surface.
