Visual Arts Update

October is a month of changes. Changes in weather and changes for the natural world. We call this moon *pimahamowi-pîsim*, which means migrating moon. This is the time of year when animals prepare for the cold winter to come and Mother Earth dresses in her brightest colours for the last dance before the blanket of snow covers her. The leaves fall and the birds gather together and begin their journey south. Our Indigenous names for the 13 moons of the year are based on what is happening in nature. In some places, we call this moon *tahwaki-pîsim* or fall moon. In Cree, students have been learning songs in the language. Niska, Niska, Piminaw (Goose, Goose, Fly) is a song about the birds migrating. In the Cree Animal Song, students learn the names for animals like **mostos** (cow), **atim** (dog), and **sîsîp** (duck). The song **Ninêstosin** (I am tired) is a lullaby.

Bus Ridership



In October, students will learn school bus safety. They will learn how to safely cross streets to get to the bus, how to safely get on and off the bus, and to how to be aware of danger zones and blind spots.

They also learn how to behave while on the school bus. When our students go on field trips, they will know how to ride the bus safely and respond to emergency situations.

Physical Education Update

The start to our school year has been very exciting, positive and fun while in the gym. Throughout the month of September, students have been working on all sorts of individual and dual games such as; low organized games, soccer, transport skills and cooperative activities.

<u>Terry Fox Walk:</u> On September 27th, our whole school took part in our annual Terry Fox walk. Students and staff walked around our school grounds in support of Terry Fox and his vision of finding a cure.

<u>Grade 5 and 6 soccer</u>: September 27th and 28th, Grade 5 and 6 soccer teams participated in an afternoon soccer tournament. Both teams did exceptionally well and did a great job representing William Whyte Community School.

<u>Up next in the gym:</u> Early years students will begin familiarizing themselves with manipulative skills (i.e., overhand/underhand throwing, catching and dribbling) during individual, partner or group activities.

Middle years classes will be wrapping up their soccer unit with in-house tournaments and then we will be moving into small sided games with nitro-ball and volleyball.
